Lee Has No Comment

Hansford County Judge Johnnie C. Lee, after reading a report in an Amarillo newspaper that the Texas Supreme Court Wednesday, April 12, upheld an Amarillo Court of Civil Appeals ruling that county commissioners precincts must be contiguous and can't be split or "checker-boarded," reported Friday he had no comment. He added that he had checked with the lawyer representing the county in the case and the lawyer also had no comment because he had not received his copy of the opinion.

The decision came in a suit filed by Gruver housewife Ruth Gumfory

She filed the suit in 1976 in 84th District Court at Spearman after Hansford County Commissioners redrew their precinct boundries. Two of the precincts were split in two parts.

Mrs. Gumfory challenged the redistricting and sued County Judge Johnnie Lee and Commissioners Joe Day, Joe T. Venneman, B. W. Renner and George C. Lowe.

She based her suit on the unconstitutionality of the redistricting, under both state and District Judge Richard N. Countiss of Spearman ruled against Mrs. Gumfory, but she appealed to the 7th Court of Civil Appeals in Amarillo.

That body of three judges ruled in favor of Mrs. Gumfory. The appeallate court said in that permitting such a division of a county - splitting precincts into non-contiguous areas - would place another "gerrymandering tool" in the hands of county commissioners.

Associate Justice Carlton B. Dodson, who wrote the civil appeals opinion, said the Hansford County commissioner's method of dividing their county encourages "checkerboarding" and "spot zoning" of commiss-ioners' precincts "which we decline to judicially approve."

The Amarillo court said it held the phrase "commissioners' precincts" as used in the state's constitution to mean "that such precincts must be territorially contiguous."

Hansford County commissioners appealed that ruling to the Texas Supreme Court, which upheld the appeals court in a decision filed yesterday.

Maintenance Program Policy

The policy for a property owner's maintenance program for the City of Spearman has been announced by City Manager Mark Neff.

The City will provide dump trucks overnight to residential citizens who are cleaning their property, garages, etc., at no cost, on a first-call, first-served basis. City employees will drive the truck to the citizen's home at the end of the work day and pick it up the next morning. Residents will not be permitted to drive the vehicles but may use them only as stationary

Residents desiring this service may reserve a truck by calling City Hall at 659-2524 between 8:30 a.m. and 4:00

p.m., Monday through Friday. Citizens desiring a truck par-

ked at their residence over the weekend can get the truck delivered Friday afternoon, and it will be picked up the following Monday morning.

The following rules will govern this program

No garbage will be permitted on trucks. (Definition of garbage-Garbage consists of household waste used in the preparation, cooking, handling, consumption or storage of putrescible materials. Any item that comes in contact with food or drinks.)

2. No dead animals or animal

3. All small items such as leaves, ashes, paper, rags, yard

trimmings, or similar items that will blow off the truck shall be bagged and tied or boxed. 4. The truck will be placed at

the desired location by City

personnel and will not be moved

except by City personnel.

5. Residents are requested to have at least 1/2 load when they request the truck and are encouraged to participate with

their neighbors to fill the truck. These rules must be complied with in order for the City to comply with solid waste lanfill regulations, and failure to do so will be just cause to deny future service to you.

During the ten-week course at Great Lakes, Ill., students received instruction on the basic medical procedures used by hospital corpsmen as they assist Navy doctors and nurses.







City Emergency Plan Given

Severe Thunderstorm season is upon us and with it comes the threat of Tornados. The City of Spearman has recently updated its Emergency Operations Plan, which will be put into effect to observe potential dangerous weather, to provide warning to the citizens of Spearman of impending danger from storms and to provide care for citizens and operation of the city in the event a disaster occurs.

Upon receipt of information that our area has been placed in a tornado watch, the following procedure will be taken:

A. Police Chief, Fire Chief, City Manager, and Civil Preparedness Coordinator will be made aware that a watch has been posted for our area.

B. Police Chief, Fire Chief, City Manager, and Civil Preparedness Coordinator will notify their personnel that they may be called out for weather watch operations.

C. At any time a threatening or dangerous storm cloud is approaching Spearman or conditions are rapidly getting worse, the Civil Preparedness Coordinator may put the weather watch plan into effect.

Once the plan is put into effect, personnel will go to their assigned areas that are located both inside and outside the City limits. These personnel may be members of the Police Department, Fire Department and

The Emergency Operations Center (EOC) is located at the Police Station and once the spotters reach their assigned locations, they will report that they are in position and what the storm looks like.

Spotters will give the following information to the EOC: 1. Any change of direction in

2. Any change of amount

rainfall in the storm. 3. Any hail in the storm estimate of size and amount

5. Any funnel activity seen in the storm

D. Should a Tornado be spotted approaching the City, a decision to sound a warning to the public will be made by the Police Chief, based on information received from the spotters, and the National Weather Service. Should it become necessary to sound a warning,

the warning will be:

A 5 minute steady blast on all the sirens with the high-low yelp on the Civil Defense siren. Local radio (KBMF/FM) and TV(SCA-TV) will carry the warning also. In addition a channel interruption hot line from the EOC to the cable TV transmitter which can be used to over-ride all channels on the cable system is under construction at this time and will be used to announce special warning messages as soon as it is

operable. When the warning is sounded, all citizens should:

1. Take Cover, Immediately! 2. Do not go outside to look around, you may get hit by flying debris.

Do not call the Police Department; listen to radio and TV for information.

4. Stay under cover until all danger has passed. If possible, an all clear signal will be sounded on the sirens. It will consist of 4 blasts on the sirens. It is very important that all

citizens know the warning and all clear signals and that they have a place to take cover if threatening conditions approach; It May Save Your Life! If you live in the city and need


On March 16th, Union Equity export elevator at Deer Park, Texas on the Houston ship channel loaded its one billionth bushel of grain going on the Walter Rice an American ship bound for Israel. Of this billion bushels, 913 million bushels was wheat, the remainder was milo, corn, soybeans, and rice. This 913 million bushels of wheat would produce 63.9 billion loaves of bread (using a one pound loaf this would be 20 slices per loaf) this would produce 1 trillion 270 billion slices of bread. 1,270,000,000,000 slices of bread.

Wayne Slovacek, Vice President in charge of the Houston operation and has been since the construction of the elevator. He previously worked for several years at the Enid, Oklahoma plant. He was born and raised in Booker, Texas. The Perryton Equity was one of the first four organized members that furnished capital to organize Union Equity. 


