Resolutions call for Palo Duro project vote

A decision to request a public vote be extended to Ochiltree county for the purposes of joining the Palo Duro River Authority and the appointment of a new city finance director were main items of business for the Perryton city council, meeting Tuesday night.

As was planned, the city council met jointly with the county commissioners to discuss the Palo Duro annexation question. By resolution, both bodies concluded that the residents of Ochiltree county should have the opportunity to vote at an election to determine the annexation.

Representatives of the two groups will meet with the PDRA board of directors this coming Wednesday to hand them the resolution. The local governing bodies have requested that an election be called April 6 — the same day as the city council and school

board elections.

In the respective resolutions, the governing bodies committed to support the April election, including the informing of the general public of the annexation question and the tax limitation to be authorized by such an election.

Originally, the PDRA board had intended to include Ochiltree county in the authority but stopped short of calling an annexation election in this county because of questions that had been voiced here. Annexation elections were held in Moore county and Stinnett, with the measure passing in both.

Mayor pro tem Doug Hale led the discussion at the joint session, which attracted Judge Howard Stone as well as commissioners Jack Kile, Johnie Luthi, and Myron McCartor. Also in attendance were Braden Karber and Dean Slaughter. Slaughter vocalized his

support for the dam and water distribution plan. He said that he knows each of the four directors of the PDRA and said they were conscientious, honest men.

It has been estimated that the dam project will cost \$55 million. These costs will be divided throughout the authority. The April election would ask the voters of Ochiltree county if they wanted to join the authority and were willing to authorize a maintenance tax, up to 6 cents per \$100 valuation. If this is successful, the bond issue would then be brought to the voters. It is thought the PDRA expects to hold the bond election in August.

Much of the public rub in Perryton has come about from a lack of information on the project from the PDRA board to local officials. At a session in Spearman a couple of months ago, the city voiced its need to have concrete facts and figures. It is unknown whether definitive plans exist.

Whatever the case may be, city and county officials believe local citizens are entitled to a vote on the question.

Vocational Agriculture Program is threatened by T.E.A.

"Learning to Do, Doing to Learn, Earning to Live, Living to Serve" has been the motto for the Texas Future Farmers of America since the state received its first charter in 1929. From the very beginning vocational agriculture and the FFA have been looked upon as essential education maintaining a link with the important agriculture economy of the state.

According to Chris Kountz, past president of the Texas Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association, "The very existence of these programs is being threatened by Texas Education Agency administrative actions and reformulation of vocational education funding to schools."

"Based on the new funding formula provided by House Bill #72 this past summer, a vocational agriculture program will have to maintain an average of 65 students in order to receive adequate funding, and in many schools, depending on the experience of the teacher and local economic factors, the number of students will need to be greater to maintain funding levels. In the rural areas of the Panhandle and South Plains the schools will not be able to pick up the slack caused by the loss of funding. At the very best, the

quality of the programs will severely deteriorate."

"Another devastating blow to vocational agriculture has been the proposal to close the area vocational education offices. The offices which are located in Plainview, Big Spring, Houston, Stephenville, Denton, Sulphur Springs, Austin, Waco, Crockett and Corpus Christi provide the necessary coordination and quality control for the vocational programs in the high schools," says Kountz.

"The Occupational Education Specialist (Supervisors) located in the area offices are the important link between local and state activities."

State Rep. Jerry Clark of Buna, a former state FFA president, says the Texas Future Farmers of America program will be severely crippled if the structure of the area occupational specialist is done away with.

FFA members in Texas currently number more than 60,000 in 949 FFA chapters. The area specialists coordinate leadership events, judging contests, workshops, and conventions involving more than three-fourths of the Texas FFA students. In addition, the area staff conducts inservice meetings

for vocational agriculture teachers and provides technical assistance to schools in developing curriculums and maintaining program standards.

Ronnie Teichelman, Occupational Education Specialist for Texas Education Agency's Area I office in Plainview which serves Spearman High School says there are three essentials that must be met if vocational agriculture education is to survive in many Texas schools.

"We've got to get vocational funding channeled back to the small schools. Secondly, the area offices have to be saved. And finally the teacher training supplement has to be funded to the colleges and universities."

"Without the teacher training supplement, the universities such as Texas Tech would not be able to sponsor judging contests and teacher improvement workshops."

According to Teichelman, vocational agriculture programs such as the one in Spearman High, under the direction of David Scott and Gary York will not be able to maintain the same high standards that the people of Spearman have become accustomed to.

While in Spearman, students

earned \$81,718.64 in 1983-84. This is money pumped back into the local economy.

Vocational Agriculture Education in Texas is in trouble. It will take a united effort from the people to preserve what has become a tradition for more than 50 years. If you would like to help, contact David Scott or Gary York, your local vocational agriculture teacher for more information.

Collector of the Month

Collector of the month at the Hansford County Library is Wayne Groves, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Groves. His collection of cameras will be on display at the library through February.

Wayne started collecting cameras in 1979 when he was 10 years old. His first camera was a Kodak Instamatic purchased at a garage sale for a quarter. He continued to add to his collection by picking up any camera, regardless of age or condition. Wayne's two requirements for additions to his collection are that they are inexpensive and that they are different from others in collection.

In 1982 the Groves' lost their home in a fire, and Wayne lost most of his collection. A few of the older cameras were on loan to the Stationmaster's House Museum. Two of his most prized cameras are charred remains retrieved from the ashes of their home. One is an expensive Cannon A-1 belonging to his dad, and the other is an old folding Kodak that was given to him a week before the fire by

his Great-Aunt Nova (Schubert) Bair. She had received this camera as a gift when she graduated from Spearman High School in 1935.

After the fire, Wayne continued to collect cameras and now has over 60. The most expensive camera he has purchased is an old reflex bought in an antique store in Borger for \$10.00. He has left the price tags on many of the cameras to remind him of the cost. Because of rapid camera improvements and new technology, cameras such as Polaroids, selling new for a lot of money only a few years ago, are frequently sold for \$2 or \$3 at garage sales because their owners have purchased later, improved models. When Kodak came out with the disc camera, the number of Instamatics for sale cheap increased.

The older 8 MM and Super 8 movie cameras are also being used less, as more people are getting home video cameras.

Wayne is still trying to replace some of the unusual cameras he lost in the fire. One was a long-nosed

Polaroid, called the Square Shooter. It was designed to take close-up pictures and sold for around \$35. However, it was not made for very long. He is still looking for older flash bulbs and camera accessories.

Wayne has picked up a number of duplicate cameras when he finds a real bargain. These are used for trading material. If anyone has any cameras, projectors, dark room or related equipment you no longer use and would be interested in trading or selling, Wayne would appreciate hearing from you.

PICTURE PERFECT — Display favorite photos in a simple, easy to make shadow box. You need a lightweight oblong box — suit or dress size — and some handsome gift wrap. Make this a contrast to the decor of the room where the display will hang, or a color that blends well. Cover box, top and bottom, and cut squares in the top for the pictures. Tape these to the underside of boxtop and outline cutouts on front with tape. Glue a hanger to the short side at the top and hang your photo box.

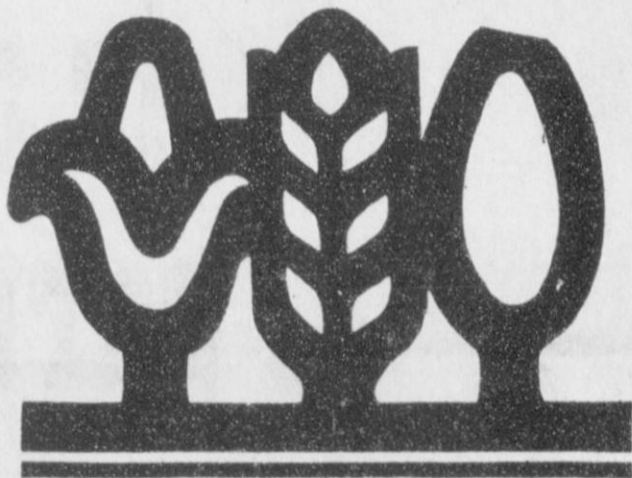

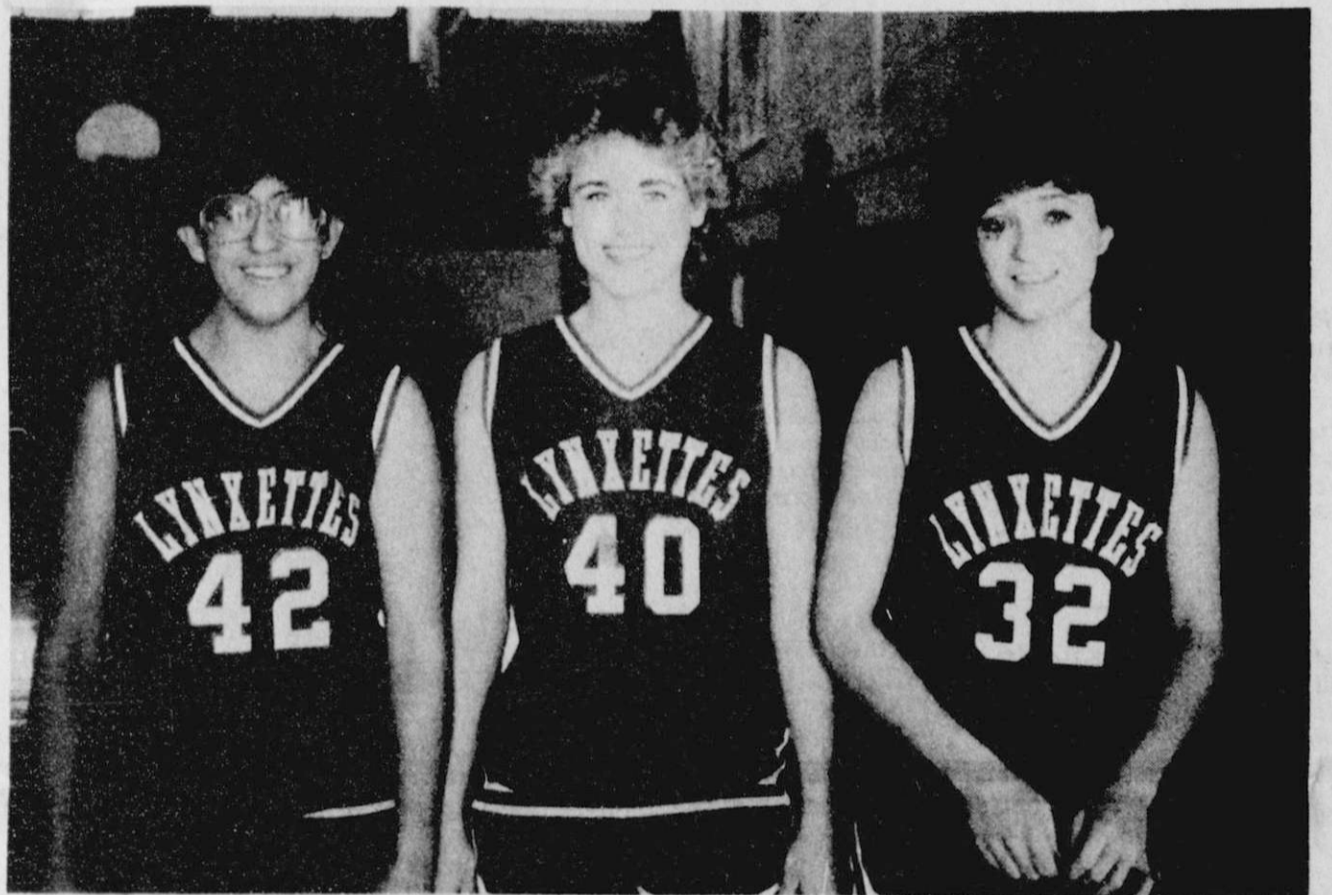

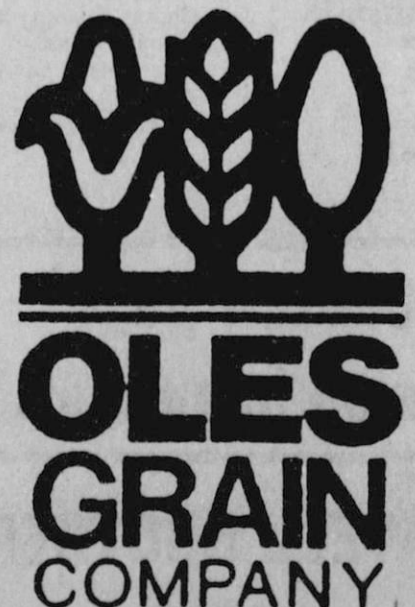
