
New Head Coach Hired



JIMMY DUNCAN

The Spearman School Board in a Wednesday night meeting chose Jimmy Duncan, who has been head football coach at Vega High School for the last 12 seasons, as the new Athletic Director and Head Coach of Spearman High School.

Duncan succeeds Preston Smith, who resigned to enter private business.

Duncan is a 1956 graduate of Amarillo High School and was graduated from West Texas State University in 1963.

He taught at Wildorado for 11/2 years before going to Vega where he has been for the past 15 years.

Duncan, who has been chosen Panhandle Coach of the Year three different times has a 87 win, 36 loss and 6 tie record as a football coach. His teams have won six district championship and were state runner-up

It is not definite when the Duncan's will move to Spearman. Supt. Cunningham said the administration hoped he would be here sometime in May. Duncan's wife Tommye was raised in Estelline. They have one daughter, Tashia who is a 7th grader.


Cunningham said that the board had 25 firm applicants interested in the job here over period of 10 days. Head coaches from some 4A schools had appied for the position.



Deadline Corn Crop

The Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC) announced today that farmers in Dallam, Sherman, Hansford, Ochiltree, Hartley, Moore and Hutchinson Counties have until April 30 to apply for all-risk insurance on

their 1979 grain sorghum crops. According to Ben A. Jordon, Jr., Regional Director, a number of significant improvements have been made in the insurance coverage for 1979 crops, including a substantial increase in the amount of protection offered on grain serghum.

The FCIC program is design ed to provide protection against natural hazards such as drought, insects, hail, disease and excessive moisture. Coverage extends from the time a crop is seeded until it is harvested.
