Dalhart Wolves Cinch 1-AA With 45-6 Win Over Lynx

Beef, speed and football savy wrapped up the District 1-AA championship for the Dalhart Wolves as they whipped the Spearman Lynx 45-6 Friday in Dalhart Dalhart.

With some players outweighing Spearman players by 75 to 100 pounds, the Wolves just ran over and through the Lynx for the first half, then pulled off after scoring a touchdown early in the third quarter.

Spearman got its lone touch-down late in the first quarter on a 93-yard drive that featured a 48-yard gallop by Ken Shufeldt and a 41-yard pass and run from Dave Clement to Shufeldt for the touchdown.

Over Half Million Dollars In Building This Year

It has not been spectacular, and no one has probably been impressed, but there has been over a half million dol ars of construction in Spearman this year.

This figure does not include the more than \$150,000 spent in remodeling the junior high

school plant and completing the h gh school campus. During the first 10 months the City of Spearman issued a total of \$616,740 in residen-tial and non-residential buildtial and non-residential building permits.

Residential building totaled \$555,540 during the 10 months and non-residential building was \$61,200.

In the ten months of the

year there have been building permits issued in only six. There were no residential permits issued in January, May, June or August. April was the big building month with \$ 370,000 in residential and \$12,600 in commercial.

In February permits were \$25,940 in residential and \$6,000 commercial. March had only \$93,100 in residential permits. In May the commercial permits were \$2,000. July had only \$29,000 in residential permits and August had \$40,600 in commercial. In September there was \$27,500 in residential and Oc In September there was \$27,500 in residential and October was the small month with \$10,000 in residential permits.

Biggest Draft Call in 12 Years Authorized for December

State draft boards will be authorized in December to draft any young married man without children, regardless of the date he was married, to

fill the biggest Texas draft call in more than 12 years. This was announced Wed-nesday by Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, who said the

new policy pertained to men 19 through 25 years old. The state draft quota for December calls for 1,714 men, the biggest since June 1953, when a call for 1,749 was made on Texas boards.

The November quota has been increased from 1,231 to 1,446. The December quota of 1,749 is the state's share of a national call of 45,224 men, 40,200 for the Army and 5,024 for the Marine Corps. No married man with chil-

dren, or an expected child, will be selected to fill the De-

cember call. "Draft boards, of course, must have the information about children," Colonel Schwartz said, "and an unborn child must be certified by a physician Otherwise, a young husband and father may find himself selected." The state draft director ex-

plained that childless married men will be ordered for in-duction when boards exhaust pools of examined and accept-able single men 19 through 25 years old.

Approximately 9,000 men will be sent for pre-induction mental and physical examina-tions in December. The De-cember local board quotas for induction and examination are induction and examination are scheduled to be mailed to the boards on or about Nov, 10.

Childless married men may be forwarded for physical and mental examinations in both November and December, as well as men down to age 18 years, 11 months if necesary.

Inductions are scheduled to proceed throughout each week in December.
