## Dalhart Wolves Cinch 1-AA With 45-6 Win Over Lynx

Beef, speed and football savvy wrapped up the District 1-AA championship for the Dalhart Wolves as they whipped the Spearman Lynx 45-6 Friday in Dalhart.

With some players outweighing Spearman players by 75 to 100 pounds, the Wolves just ran over and through the Lynx for the first half, then pulled off after scoring a touchdown early in the third quarter.

Spearman got its lone touchdown late in the first quarter on a 93-yard drive that featured a 48-yard gallop by Ken Shufeldt and a 41-yard pass and run from Dave Clement to Shufeldt for the touchdown.

Although running was almost a suicide assignment, Shufeldt went into the valley of death 16 times and picked up 90 yards. He gained 71 yards against the Wolves' starters.

Fullback Clayton Cochran had

no luck going into the Dalhart line. He tried 10 times for 10 yards. In the fourth quarter, Jerry Holton picked up 20 yards on four carries.

Dalhart settled the contest in a hurry by scoring the first five times they had the ball.

James Longford almost went all the way on the opening kick-off before being pulled down from behind by Skipper Robinson on the Lynx 42. On two tries into the middle of the Lynx line the Wolves gained little as guards Hal Shufeldt, Monte Lusby and linebacker Lynn Buzzard gave up only four yards on two tries.

On third down at the 38, Asher Issacs rolled out to his left, his blockers pinned the right defensive side of the line and he raced 38 yards to score. He passed to Don Cantrell for the extra points but Rennie Berry got there with the ball and it

fell incomplete.

Four plays later Dalhart took off from their own 34. Danny Bush, 205 pound fullback, ram-bled 54 yards before Berry, a 137 pound defensive back, could get tangled up in his feet.

Four plays later, Issacs scored from five yards out to make the score 12-0. He passed to Ricky Cunningham who let the ball get away from him.

This time Spearman held the ball for five plays on a 13 yard run by Shufeldt. Clement punted to the Dalhart 46. On the second play, Issacs passed to Terry Combs. He took the short pass, eluded numerous tacklers, ran over a few and scored on a 54 yard play. Cunningham kicked the point to make the score 19-0.

## Over Half Million Dollars In Building This Year

It has not been spectacular, and no one has probably been impressed, but there has been over a half million dollars of construction in Spearman this year.

This figure does not include the more than \$150,000 spent in remodeling the junior high school plant and completing the high school campus.

During the first 10 months the City of Spearman issued a total of \$616,740 in residential and non-residential building permits.

Residential building totaled \$555,540 during the 10 months and non-residential building was \$61,200.

In the ten months of the

year there have been building permits issued in only six. There were no residential permits issued in January, May, June or August. April was the big building month with \$370,000 in residential and \$12,600 in commercial.

In February permits were \$25,940 in residential and \$6,000 commercial. March had only \$93,100 in residential permits. In May the commercial permits were \$2,000.

July had only \$29,000 in residential permits and August had \$40,600 in commercial.

In September there was \$27,500 in residential and October was the small month with \$10,000 in residential permits.

# Biggest Draft Call in 12 Years Authorized for December

State draft boards will be authorized in December to draft any young married man without children, regardless of the date he was married, to fill the biggest Texas draft call in more than 12 years.

This was announced Wednesday by Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, who said the new policy pertained to men 19 through 25 years old.

The state draft quota for December calls for 1,714 men, the biggest since June 1953, when a call for 1,749 was made on Texas boards.

The November quota has been increased from 1,231 to 1,446.

The December quota of 1,749 is the state's share of a national call of 45,224 men, 40,200 for the Army and 5,024 for the Marine Corps.

No married man with children, or an expected child, will be selected to fill the December call.

"Draft boards, of course, must have the information about children," Colonel Schwartz said, "and an unborn child must be certified by a physician. Otherwise, a young husband and father may find himself selected."

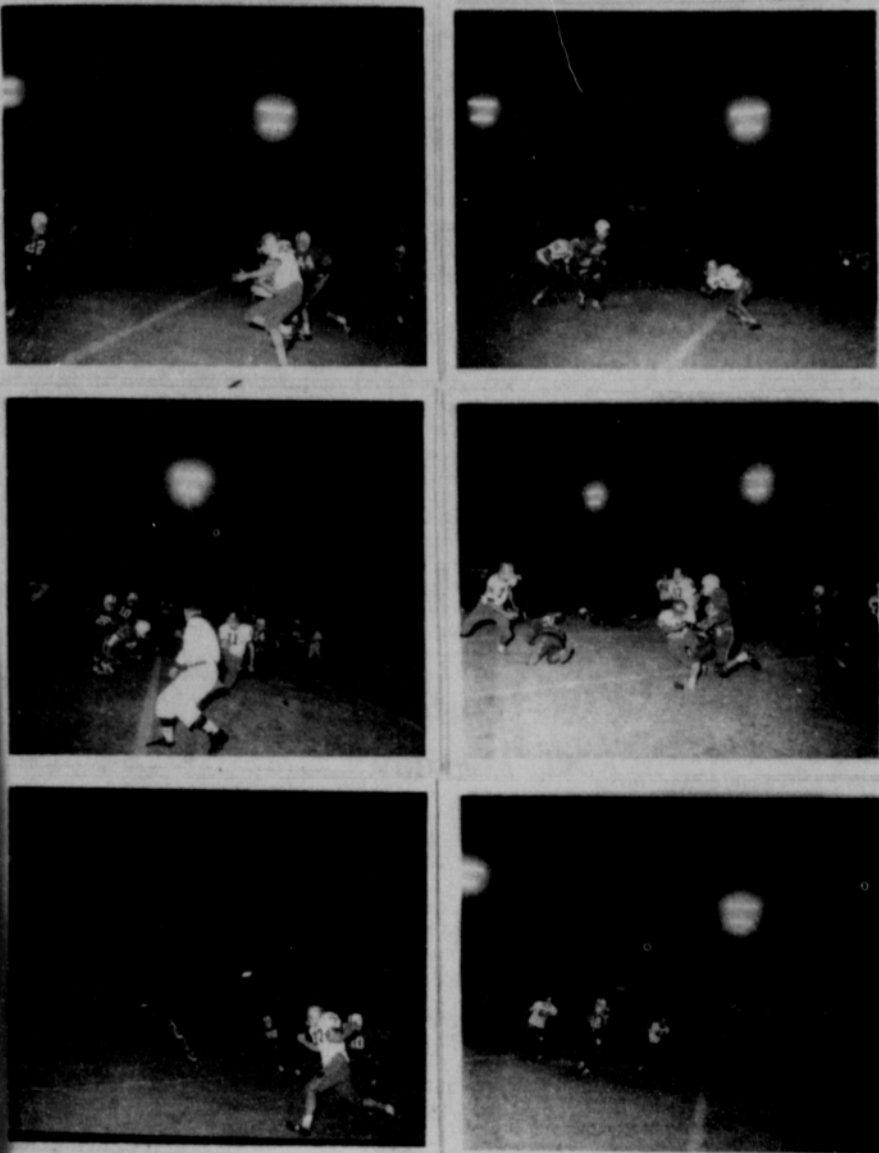
The state draft director explained that childless married men will be ordered for induction when boards exhaust

pools of examined and acceptable single men 19 through 25 years old.

Approximately 9,000 men will be sent for pre-induction mental and physical examinations in December. The December local board quotas for induction and examination are scheduled to be mailed to the boards on or about Nov. 10.

Childless married men may be forwarded for physical and mental examinations in both November and December, as well as men down to age 18 years, 11 months if necessary.

Inductions are scheduled to proceed throughout each week in December.
