Absentee vote opens for April 12 runoff election

Absentee balloting in the Democratic and Republican runoff election opens Monday at the Hansford county courthouse in Spearman and will run through Friday at the close of business hours.

Actual balloting will be Tuesday, April 12 for the runoff which has only one race on the Democratic ticket and five on the Republican ballot.

The only restrictions for balloting in the runoff comes if a voter cast a ballot in the March 8 primary election. Then they must vote in the primary runoff of the party they cast their original ballot on March 8.

However, if a voter did not vote in the Super Tuesday election, then they may vote in either primary runoff.

The only race on the Democratic tickets is for Texas State Senator between H. Bryan Poff, Jr. and Mel Phillips, both of Amarillo.

The winner of that runoff will face Republican Teel Bivins in the general election in November.

The race drawing the most local interest is for the Republican nominee for 84th district attorney where two Borger men -- Stephen F. "Steve" Cross is vying for the nomination with Phil Black.

The winner of that race will be opposed by Democratic John LaGrone in November's general election.

Cross carried Hansford county by a wide margin in the March 8 primary where incumbent Gene Compton was eliminated. The three men -- Cross, Black and Compton -- split the Borger vote almost equally and Cross's landslide win in Hansford county, along with a good showing by Black put those two men in the runoff.

Amarillo's Beau Boulter will face Wes Gilbreath of Houston to decide the Republican opponent against Democrat Lloyd Bentsen.

Bob Price of Pampa and Larry Milner of Amarillo are vying for the Republican nomination for H.S. Representative of district 13. Bill Sarpalius of Canyon is the Democratic nominee there.

Price has held the U.S. Representative office in the 1970's before losing that seat. He has also served as Texas State Senator as well.

This is Milner's first venture into the political arena.

Other contested offices in the April 12 runoff will be between P.S. "Sam" Ervin of Dallas and Ed Emmett of the Austin area for Texas Railroad Commissioner.

The Justice of the Supreme Court, Place 2 nomination for the Republican party will be decided between Ronald S. Black of Missouri City and Nathan Hecht of Carrollton.

The Hansford county clerk's office will be the location for all absentee balloting. The office is open from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Proceeds from the event go to support the American Heart Association's research, education and community service programs in Texas.

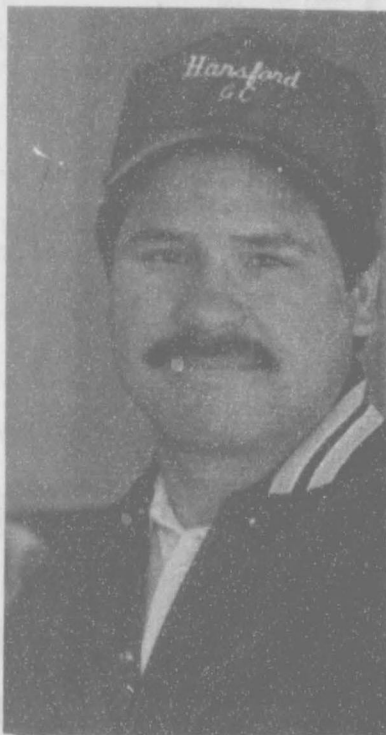

4-inch snow, winds usher in Easter holidays

Mother Nature got in her own special April Fool's joke, turning Good Friday into a spring-time winter wonderland as three inches of wet snow greeted Hansford county residents to begin the day.

Highways across the Panhandle area were drifting and travel was being discouraged according to a report early Friday morning from the Hansford county sheriff's office.

Intermittent snow flurries continued throughout the morning Friday as the spring-time snow storm continued to accumulate as of presstime.

But the weather forecast remained optimistic for the Easter weekend with high temperatures forecast in the 50's for Saturday and in the mid-60's for Sunday.

The Tri-State High School Rodeo event scheduled for Easter Sunday at the Oscar Archer Rodeo Arena in Spearman, was moved to the indoor rodeo arena in Dumas due

to Friday's snow storm. Easter cowboy services will begin at 10 a.m. Sunday with the high school rodeo events to get underway at noon.

The Spearman rodeo was to open the Spring circuit of the TSHSRA rodeos, but that was cancelled due to another snow storm which blanketed the area.

An Easter Egg Hunt, sponsored annually by the Spearman Moose Lodge, was forced into cancellation by Friday's snowy weather. The hunt had been planned for early Saturday morning.

Meanwhile, snow plows were busy on highways throughout the Panhandle area as the snow continued to fall as far south as Canyon.

Spearman city crew were busy once again, moving snow from city streets in an effort to keep them clear.

No reports had been received at presstime of any Easter worship service cancellations for Sunday.

5555 or come by the office and pick them up.

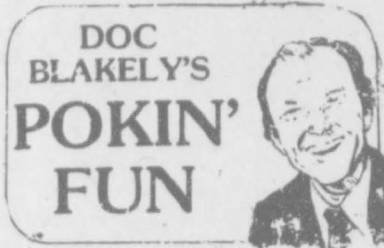
The survey is being requested of those who have only one rental property and those who may have many properties. The Chamber wants to maintain as complete a list as possible of available housing.

Think about this statement deeply and it'll really blow your math, economics, and grammar: "Nothing makes cents."

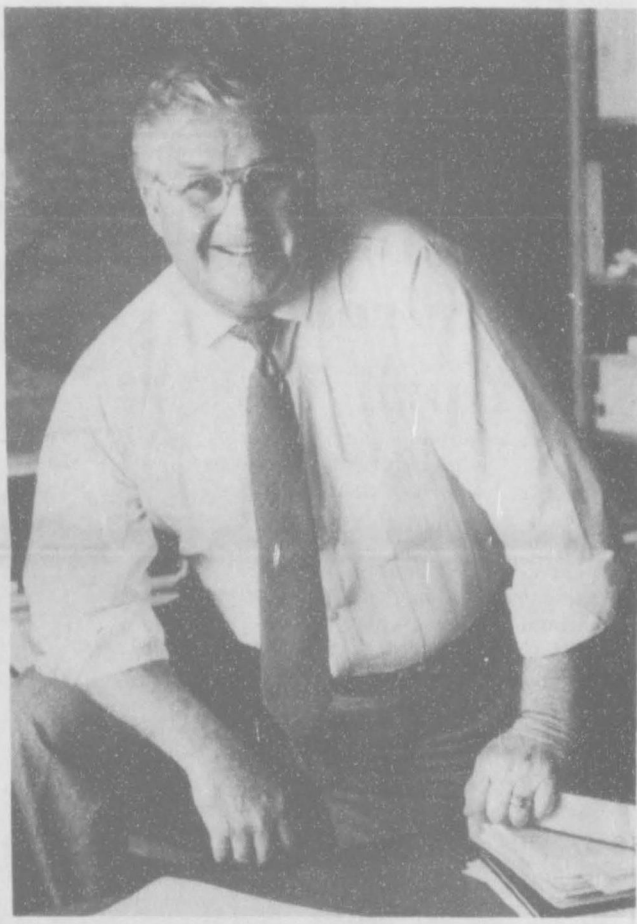

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor:

I am writing concerning the front page article you wrote "Dam bid \$1.2 million over budget".

As an explanation for the bids being over the budgeted amount of \$16 million you stated "Bidders at the Wednesday bid opening noted increased cost of supplies such as concrete due to the out-of-the-way location of the dam site".

It seems strange to me that \$1.2 million over budget can be laid on one product. Especially since that product is not the greatest amount that will be used.

First, you must define the term concrete. Concrete is a mixture of cement, river rock, sand and water.

Cement is made of lime, iron, silica, alumina components and gypsum. Many people mean to say cement when they say concrete. (Which may have been the case

here.)

Let's make some comparisons. The amount of concrete to be used in this job is around \$500,000. The amount of cement for the earthen dam is \$1,364,000. That makes almost 3 times more cement used compared to concrete, and you say concrete is the product with greatest cost???

Spearman is an out-of-the-way location for many materials. Nearly everything used in Spearman is imported (except wheat and cattle). Transportation makes products in our area much higher than Amarillo or Dallas.

Many people can save money by buying their needs in Amarillo or Dallas, buy when they add their cost of going there and transportation back home, the product is much higher. (Unless they don't figure their time and expense

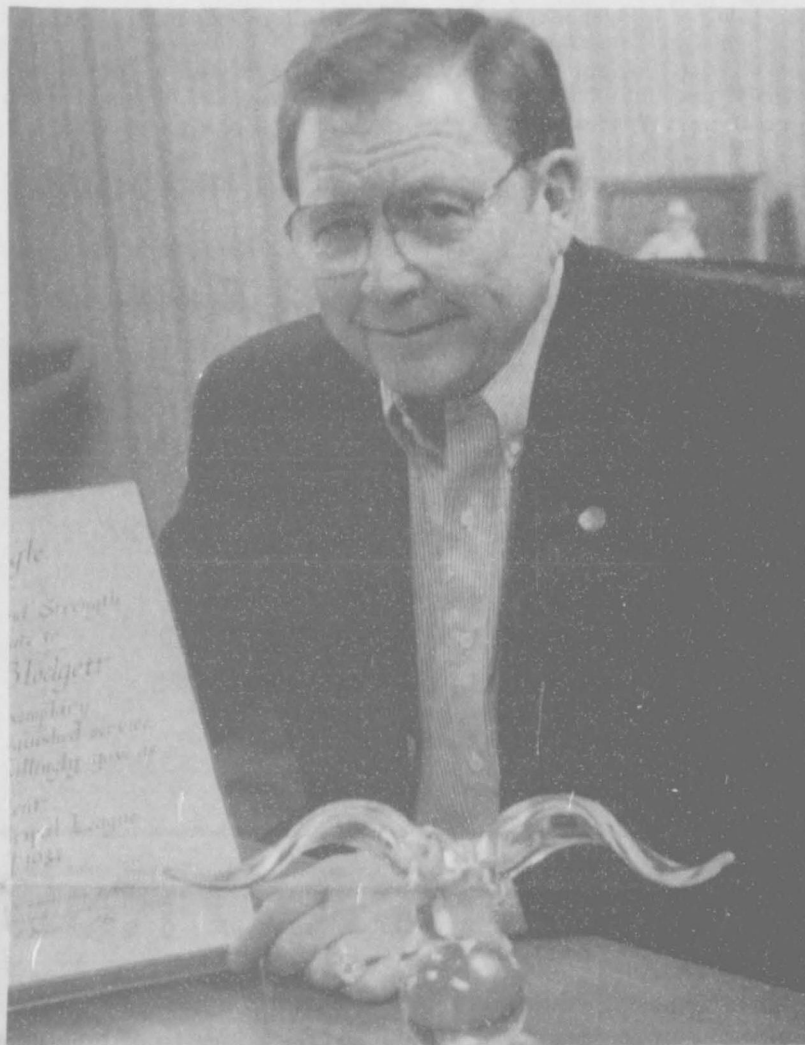

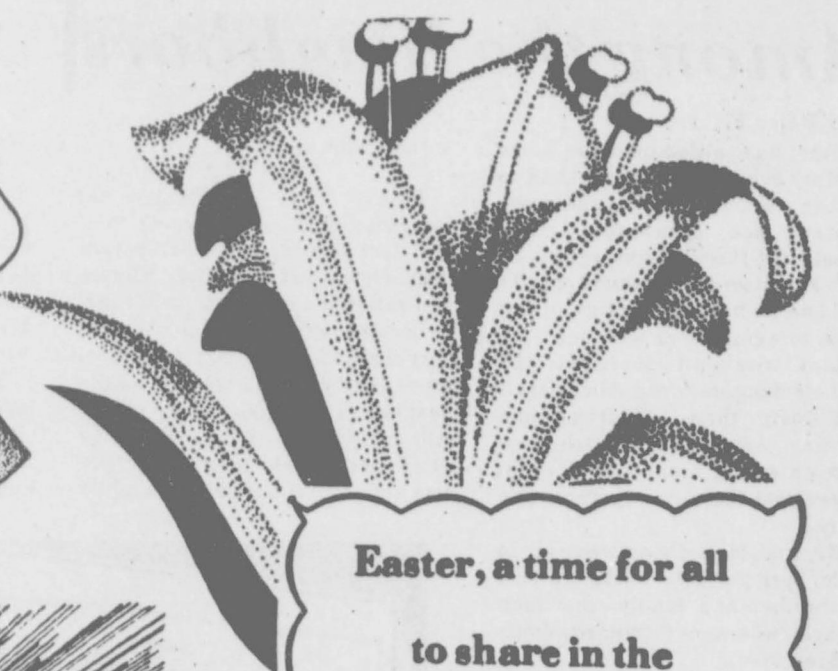

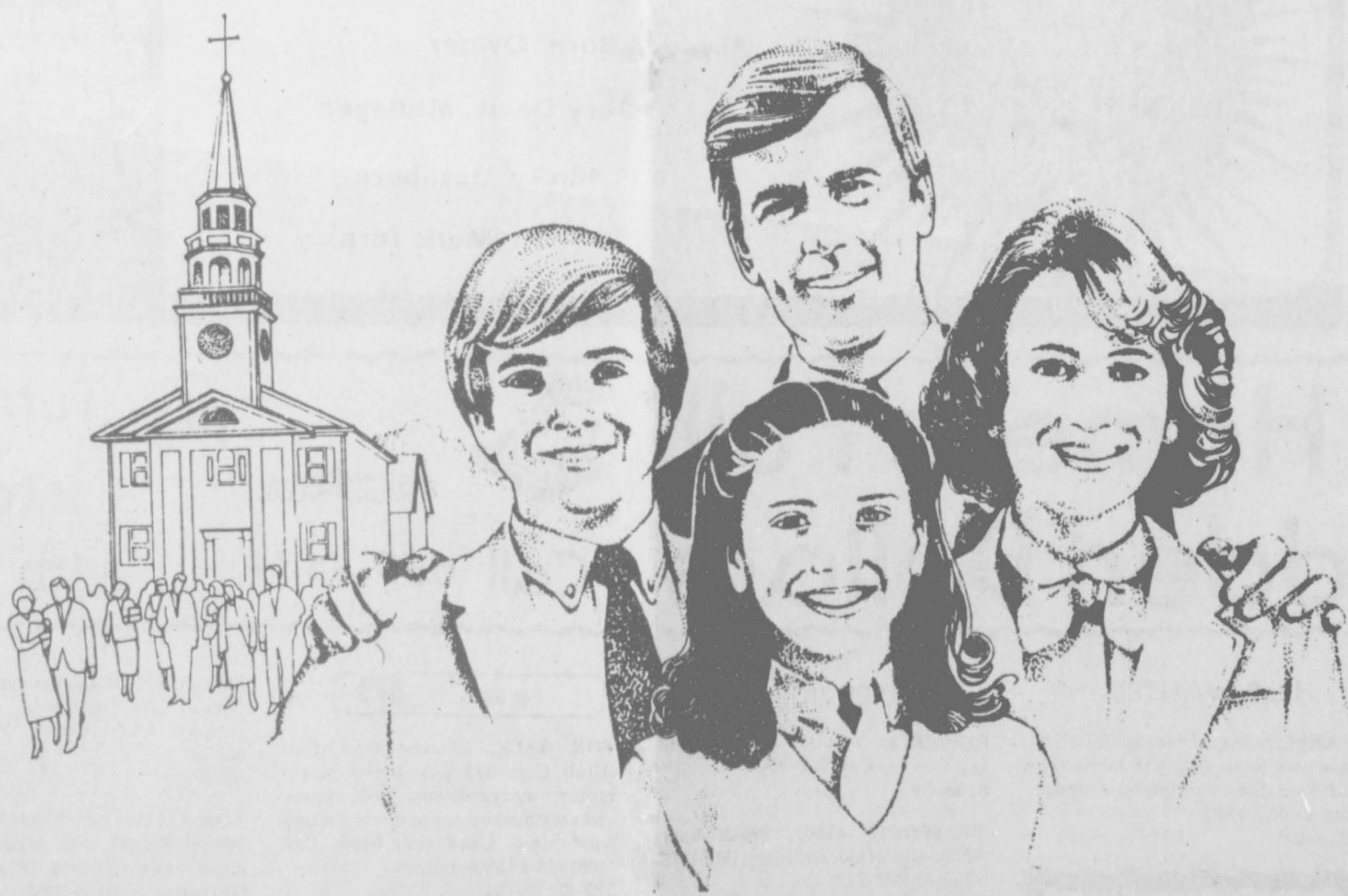
