Election Nov. 6

The Constitutional Amendment Election will be held Tuesday, November 6 from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. for the

registered voters of the county. Proposition No. 1 would require the Secretary of State to appoint a convenient number of Notaries Public for the state, which would change the present practice of appointing Notaries Public by county. It would also increase the Notary Public term from its present two year limit to a term of four years.

Proposition No. 3 would allow for legislative review of process of rulemaking by the

than 200 agencies in the executive department, all of whom

act independently of such re-view and would eliminate much of the unnecessary red tape and many of the ridiculous guidelines coming from many of the exe-cutive department

Proposition No. 3 on the ballot would authorize the legislature to provide for the guarantee of farm and ranch loans by the sale of general obligation bonds of the state of Texas. The amendment would allow the egislature to issue and sell onds called Farm and Ranch Loan Security Bonds of the state of Texas not to exceed \$10 million. All money from bond sales would be deposited in a separate fund with the State

Treasurer and administered by

guarantee loans used for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate, and for advancing to the borrower a percentage of the principal and interest due. The commissioner of agriculture would be required to charge at least 6 percent interst on such

To qualify for these guaranteed loans, one must be a Texas resident and have a net worth of less than \$100,000. The intent of this amendment, according to Representative Bob Close, is to romote the small family farm. Unless you are born into a farm, it is practically impossible to get into farming these days and we hope this amendment would alleviate some of the problems the small farmer faces in today's unsteady economy.



DECA Club Meets

Worley J. Smith, and Marketing and Distribution Education students at Spearman High School, Spearman, Texas are helping the University of Texas at Austin field-test the new Advanced Marketing Curriculum (AMC) this school year. Worley Smith is one of 70 teachers in Texas selected to evaulate the curriculum developed by the Instructional Materials Center (IMC) at The University of Texas.

The curriculum being tested is the second year in a two-year series for Marketing and Distributive Education students. The AMC, being used by over 2,000 students, will help students develop supervisory and man-agement competencies related to marketing and distribution. The first year in the series, the General Marketing Curriculum. covered basic competencies needed for entry-level occupations. It is now widely used throughout the United States.

Units of instruction in the Advanced Marketing Curriculum include: the marketing function, merchandising and buying, promotion, management, careers in managem and supervision, and careers in professional selling. Materials IN THE FIELD TEST INCLUDE A STUDENT MANUAL, PRO A STUDENT MANUAL, PRO-JECTS, ACTIVITIES, PRE-TESTS, POST-TESTS, HAND-OUT MATERIALS, AND SEN-TENCE TEACHING OUT. LINES. Specific competencies and objectives are given for each unit.

Each teacher-coordinator and each student in the field test will evaluate each unit. In addition, the pre-tests and post-tests will indicate learning gain from the field test. Results will

Reformation Day is Wednesday, October 31. The word reformation means correcting, making better. On October 31, 1517, Dr. Martin Luther finished writing 95 statements about wrong teachings of the church which he believed should be corrected. He took the large sheet of paper on which he had written the statements or theses which he wanted to debate with the theological community and nailed it to the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany. In this way Luther was letting the professors at the University of Wittenberg know that he wanted to talk about these statements with some of them; the door of the Castle Church was the bulletin board of the university. In those days it was the custom to write out statements to be discussed and nail them to the bulletin board so that the professors could

The statements were written in Latin. Someone translated them into German and printed

read and study them before

they came together to talk about

them. Soon many people had copies. This was the beginning of the Protestant Reformation Today the Protestant churches celebrate October 31 as Reformation Day. On this day we thank God for using Martin Luther to give back to the world the Bible and its message of salvation by faith alone.

October ushers in the final quarter of 1979; is one of nature's more beautiful months. It gets its name from the Roman eight, for it was the eighth month in the ancient Roman calendar.

For Americans it is a month filled with historical dates and birthday anniversaries. The 1st is the 55th birthday of President Jimmy Carter. The 4th is the birthday anniversary of Rutherford Hayes, 19th President of the United States, who was born at Delaware, Ohio, in 1822. Hayes followed U.S. Grant to the White House in 1876. It took the electoral votes (Republican) of three occupied Dixie states to give Hayes a one-vote margin, votes highly dubious because federal troops there propped up infamous Reconstruction administrations (the origin of solid Democratic voting when federal troops were withdrawn).

But Hayes was an honorable man and as President he withdrew federal troops from the Southern states (a deal for the electoral votes involved such a pledge, it's said). He served only one term, by choice, and his record was a good one. He died in 1893 and the state of Ohio now owns his Freemont estate.

The 4th is also Missouri Day as well as a feast day in the Catholic Church in memory of Francis of Assisi, who died on the 3rd in 1236. Chester Arthur, the 21st President, was born at Fairfield, Vermont, on the 5th in 1830, the son of a Baptist clergyman from Ireland.


The first permanent German settlement in America took place at Germantown, Pennsylvania, on the 6th in 1683. The Chicago fire occurred on the 8th and 9th in 1871. Leif Ericsson is remembered in many areas on the 9th, as the discoverer of America in the year 1000. The 11th is Pulaski Day, in memory of the great Polish-born patriot. Columbus Day, on the 12th, is now a national holiday; his discovery opened the New World to trade and colonization. The 14th is the birthday anniversary of Dwight Eisenhower, born in 1890 at Denison, Texas.


