SPEARMAN MAN IS CANDIDATE



R. C. Porter

SPEARMAN—R.C. Porter, a 56-year-old Hansford County farmer, became the first announced candidate today for the Republican nomination for state representative from the 64th district in the May 1980 primary.

For the past three terms the post has been held by Bob Close.

Porter is a U.S. Navy veteran of World War II. For the past 12 years he has been a trustee of the Spearman Independent School District, and has been on the SISD school board for seven years.

"As a farmer who has supported the American Agriculture movement," Porter said, "I will stress the fact that agriculture is basic to the economy of this district. When the farm prospers, so does Main Street."

"As a school board member I will point out that the young people of the community are its future—which makes the school and its personnel the most important business in town."

"I am alarmed at the rate at which Austin and Washington are assuming control over local schools. My general philosophy of government is that of Thomas Jefferson, who taught that government best which governed least."

"The courthouse and the city hall are about as far away as most governmental functions ought to be from the people. Therefore, I am opposed to any legislation which enlarges state government, and I favor any legislation which returns power to the local level."

Porter said that he expected to finance most of his campaign himself, and that such contributions as he may receive will be limited to \$25 from each individual or organization, "...so that none can feel they own more than \$25 worth of me."

Merchants Seminar On Hot Checks To Be Held

John L. Hutchison, Hansford County attorney, R. L. McFarlin, Hansford County Sheriff, and Spearman Police Chief Jimmy Jackson, in cooperation with the Spearman Chamber of Commerce Retail Merchants, will co-ordinate a seminar on crime prevention which will include handling hot checks, shoplifting and building security. This seminar will be held on October 9, 1979, at 7:00 P.M. at First State Bank. The program is free and a free booklet covering some of the subjects presented at the program will be given to those in attendance.

The purpose of the program is to familiarize local merchants with the technicalities of theft by check laws and ways of preventing shoplifting, burglaries and thefts. The theft by check laws require that a specific type of notice be given to those giving worthless checks, as well as certain requirements concerning identification of the accused and of the merchandise for which the check is given. Sheriff McFarlin will present a segment of the program which will set out the many ways shoplifters use to steal goods. Spearman Police Chief Jimmy Jackson will also discuss some of the precautions merchants can take regarding building security to prevent nighttime thefts and burglaries.

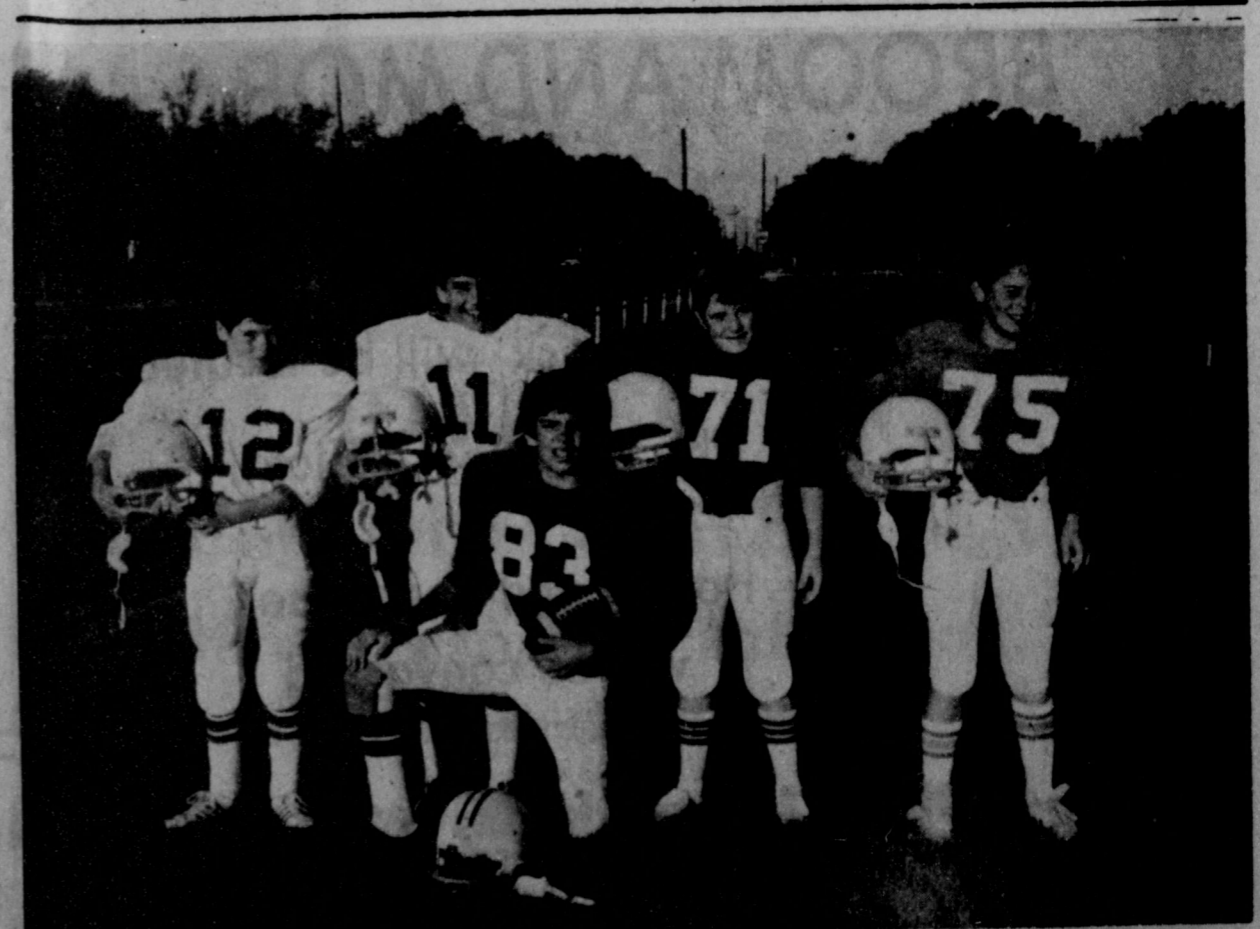
The Spearman Post Office will be closed Monday, October 8, in observance of Columbus Day.

DOOR-WINDOW BURGLAR PROOFING

There are two simple devices that will help prevent burglars from "ripping off" your home. They are a solid door and windows with burglar-resistant glazing.

A good, solid-core door is cheaper than a door with windows or thin panels in it, and it eliminates a problem of a burglar breaking through the door and unlocking the lock from the inside. Burglars can come through a window, but they prefer to come through the door. It looks much less suspicious to the passerby.

Windows can be protected with burglar-resistant glazing (glass or plastic). A do-it-yourselfer can apply a frame of

Autograph Party Planned

University of Oklahoma Press will have an autograph party for Donald E. Green, author of "Panhandle Pioneer" on Sunday, October 7 from 2:00 to 5:00 p.m. at the Golden Spread Center. A percentage of all books sold that day will go to the Golden Spread Center.

Donald E. Green, who grew up on a Texas Panhandle ranch and received the Ph.D. from the University of Oklahoma, is professor of History and Director of the Southwestern Studies Program in Central State University, Edmond, Oklahoma. He is the author of several books and articles on the Panhandle-Plains region of Texas and Oklahoma.

"Panhandle Pioneer" is the story of Henry C. Hitch, his ranch and his family. In the history of the tristate Panhandle region—the three corners of Oklahoma, Texas and Kansas—the saga of Henry C. Hitch and

his ranch is also the story of the social, cultural and economic fortunes of the region.

Late in the nineteenth century young James Kerrick Hitch left his home in Tennessee for the High Plains and a hoped-for fortune. After ten years spent working and learning as a maker Series of the University of Oklahoma Press. It was published in August.

Land, the fertile subirrigated valley that was to be his Promised Land.

It was Henry Charles Hitch, James' son, who was to turn the valley and its adjoining uplands into an empire. Henry and the rest of the Hitches were a hardy, long-lived family who eked out a subsistence, raising cattle, borrowing money, going broke several times, flourishing at other times, lending money to neighbors. Always optimistic about the future of the Panhandle, the Hitches were willing to

take risks, willing to borrow large sums of money, willing to experiment and change. Henry's genius and hard work paid off. In time the family owned 30,000 acres of land in three states.

After building their cattle empire, the Hitches moved into farming. By 1930 they had become the largest wheat producer in the state of Oklahoma. After World War II they drilled irrigation wells to raise feed-stuffs and by the 1950's had one of the first large feedlots in the

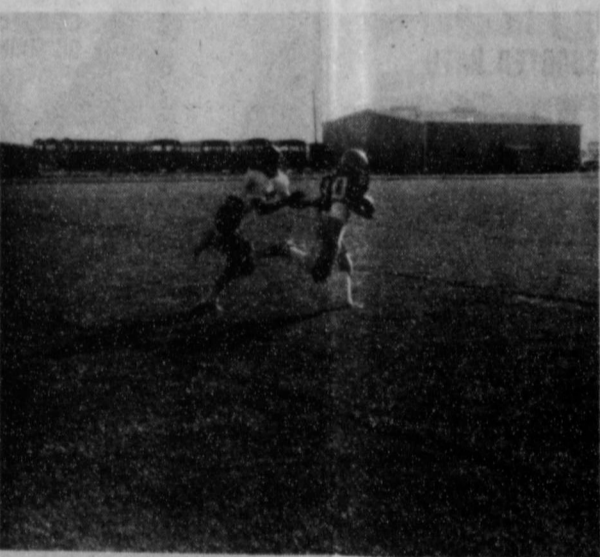

National Fire Prevention Week

October 8-14 is National Fire Prevention Week, but this observance shouldn't be necessary. Common sense dictates that fire prevention should be a year-round custom.

Unfortunately, common sense about fire hazards appears none too common, so one week is set aside each year as a reminder.

Fire Prevention Week originated because of a fire that shouldn't have happened. On October 9, 1871, carelessness sparked a fire in a modest midwest home. It didn't seem threatening or uncontrollable, but by the next day, more than 2,100 acres of Chicago were burned, claiming more than 200 lives and direct losses in excess of \$168 million.

On the same day, the worst forest fire in U.S. history broke in Peshtigo, Wis., claiming 1,152 lives and burning more than 1.28 million acres.

As a reminder, Fire Prevention Week is observed annually on the anniversary of the Chicago and Peshtigo tragedies. In 1922, it became a national observance by presidential proclamation. The proclamation stated: "Fires are not deplorable accidents, but the consequences of neglect and carelessness."

Texans have a big stake in the observance of Fire Prevention Week.

Last year, volunteer fire departments throughout the state reported to the Texas Forest Service that more than 6,320 fires occurred outside incorporated city boundaries with a total land damage in excess of 265,600 acres. The majority of these rural fires were natural cover or non-structural fires, with debris burning accounting for more than 50 percent of the fires. More than 30 percent of all improved structural fires were rural residences.

In forested areas of East Texas, the Texas Forest Service was called to control more than 3,500 fires that burned 48,794 acres. This was the highest occurrence in the past 10 years.

October and November are normally dangerous forest fire months in Texas. If rainfall is below normal, the situation will be critical this year, according to the Texas Forest Service. Even after a rain, forest fires can start easily. The fuel in forests dries much faster than most people realize, especially on windy days. Most fires can start within a day--and in some cases, within a few hours--after a moderate rain.

If fire prevention is not practiced year long, common sense should dictate that it must be practiced at least during the next few months in Texas.
