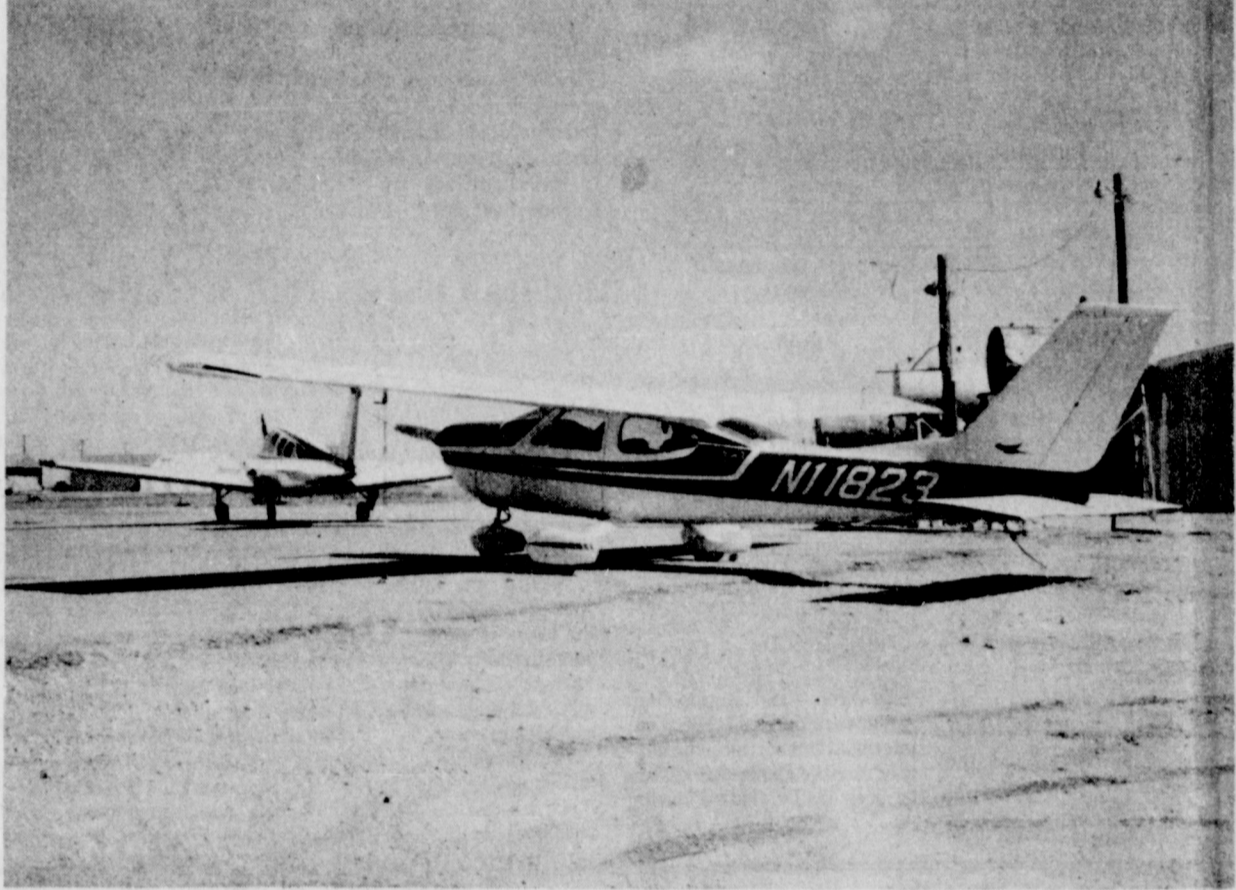

City Has New Police Chief!

Acting Chief of Police, Sgt. Jimmy Jackson was named permanent Spearman Police Chief by the Local City Council, Tuesday night.

Jackson, 25, has been acting Chief since the registration of Former Chief Steve Wisniewski, January 8th.

The new chief, formerly of Amarillo had been first appointed as a Patrolman, by former Chief Wisniewski. He then advanced to the Rank of Sergeant, a position he held, when named acting Chief, early in 1979.

The appointment, effective immediately, was made after the council reviewed a number of applications. City manager Lenis Simpson, who under City Ordinance nominated Jackson, said the council gave the acting Chief their approval in the light of the administrative questions, evidenced during his almost 3 months in an "Acting capacity."

The naming of Jackson results in a patrolman vacancy on the local force.

J.W. Burges Services

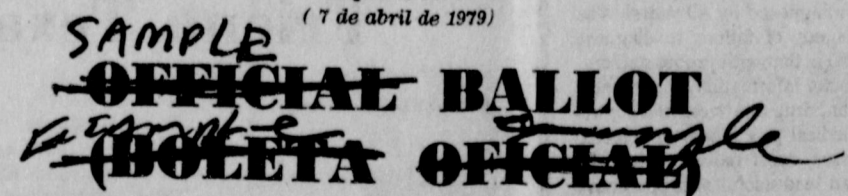
Services are pending with Boxwell Brothers Funeral Directors of Perryton for J.W. "Shorty" Burges, 62, who died Thursday in Perryton.

Library Week To Be Observed

During the week of April 1-7, libraries all over Texas will be joining others throughout the United States in observing Library Week. Many will be having special activities during the week. The Texas Library Association is coordinating plans for these activities.

In his proclamation designating Library Week, the Texas Library Association is coordinating plans for these activities.

In his proclamation designating Library Week in Texas, Governor William P. Clements noted that 1979 marks the 140th anniversary of the proclamation establishing a library for the Republic of Texas in 1839. This is also the 70th anniversary of the creation of the Texas Library and Historical Commission, the governing board for the Texas State Library.

Public, school, academic, and special libraries offer a wide variety of kinds of services and kinds of materials to Texans. It is estimated that the 4,000 individual libraries circulated more than 50 million items last year. These ranged from picture books for children just learning to read through films and other non-print materials to rare manuscripts that scholars use.

This year Texans have a special opportunity to speak out on what they want their library services to be. Texas delegates to the White House Conference on Library and Information Services were selected in November, 1978. In the months before the White House Conference that begins on October 28, 1979, these delegates will be gathering information so they can represent Texas most effectively at the national Conference.

Dramatic changes have taken place in Texas in recent years. Because they are the institutions charged with providing information, libraries must keep pace with these changes. Library Week provides an opportunity for Texans to visit their libraries and to discover what libraries have to offer them.

Myasthenia Gravis Clinic Scheduled

A free clinic for diagnosis and treatment of Myasthenia Gravis will be held April 6 & 7, 1979 in Amarillo, Tx at the Texas Tech University School of Medicine Regional Academic Health Center, 1400 Wallace Blvd. The clinic will also provide consultation services for persons already diagnosed as having Myasthenia Gravis. Bernard M. Patten, M. D., will conduct the clinic. Dr. Patten is Chief of Neuromuscular Disease and Vice-Chairman of the Department of Neurology, Baylor College of Medicine, Houston, Texas. He is also a Clinical Associate Professor, University of Texas Medical School at Houston, as well as a member of the Medical Advisory Board for the National Myasthenia Gravis Foundation.

This clinic was conceived as a memorial to Edie Brooks, daughter of Mr. & Mrs. Frank Brooks of Amarillo, who died at the age of 9 as a result of Myasthenia Gravis. Myasthenia Gravis is a neuromuscular disease characterized by periods of extreme, sometimes fatal weakness. This disease can masquerade as a vitamin deficiency, anemia, emotional disturbance, brain damage or diseases of the throat, eyes, lungs, limbs or heart, since function of any or all of these may be affected by MG. Some of the symptoms include drooping eyelids, double vision, loss of balance, difficulty walking, abnormally high nasal voice, difficulty chewing and swallowing.

Although the actual testing for MG is relatively simple, there are several factors that make it difficult to diagnose. One is that the physicians standard formula of "plenty of bed rest" does help the myasthenic - temporarily - often misleading the doctor in his diagnosis. Another problem in diagnosis is the MG can come and go.

Myasthenia Gravis can strike anyone, at any age, and at any time and people can have the disease for a number of years and never be properly diagnosed. One man in California went undiagnosed for 40 years! The tragedy of failure to diagnose MG is that with proper patient - doctor information, communication, drug treatment and certain medical procedures in selected cases, most patients with MG can lead useful and productive lives.

The Edie Brooks Memorial Clinic is being coordinated by the XI RHO MU Chapter of Beta Sigma Phi and the Northwest Texas Chapter of the Myasthenia Gravis Foundation. It is sponsored by High Plains Baptist Hospital, Northwest Texas Hospital and School of Nursing, St. Anthony's Hospital, Southwest Osteopathic Hospital and Texas Tech University School of Medicine. Other organizations

supporting the clinic include the Amarillo Area Foundation, The Plan Development Committee of the Panhandle Health Systems Agency and Metropolitan Ambulance Service. For more information concerning the clinic or to make an appointment to be seen by Dr. Patten during

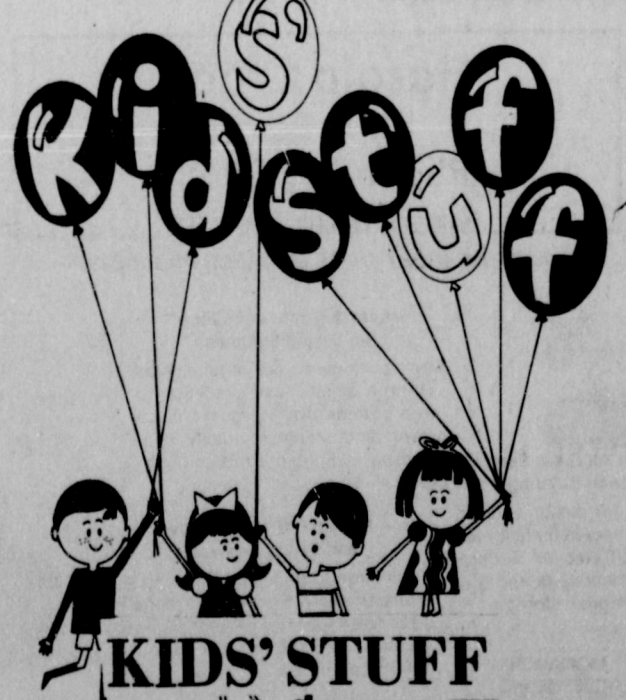

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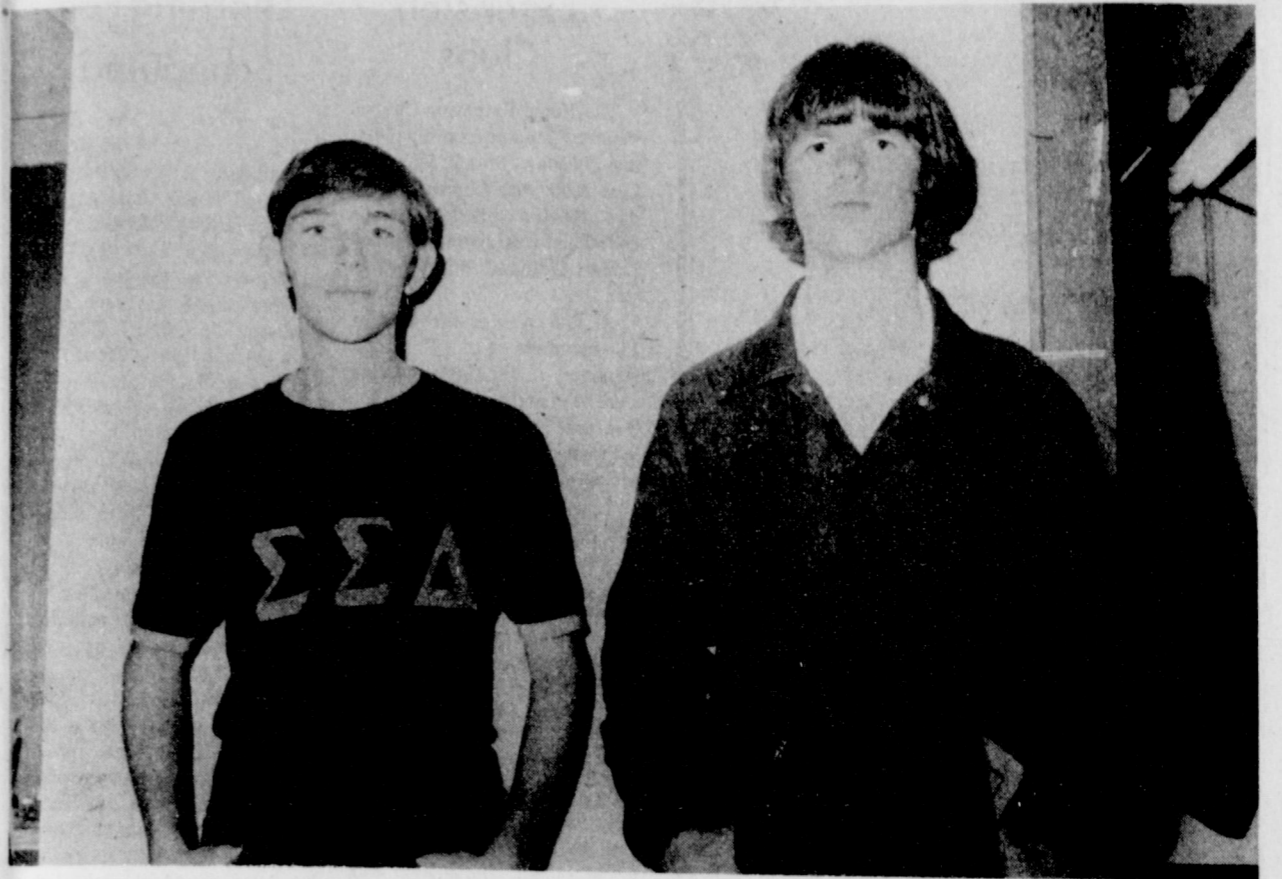

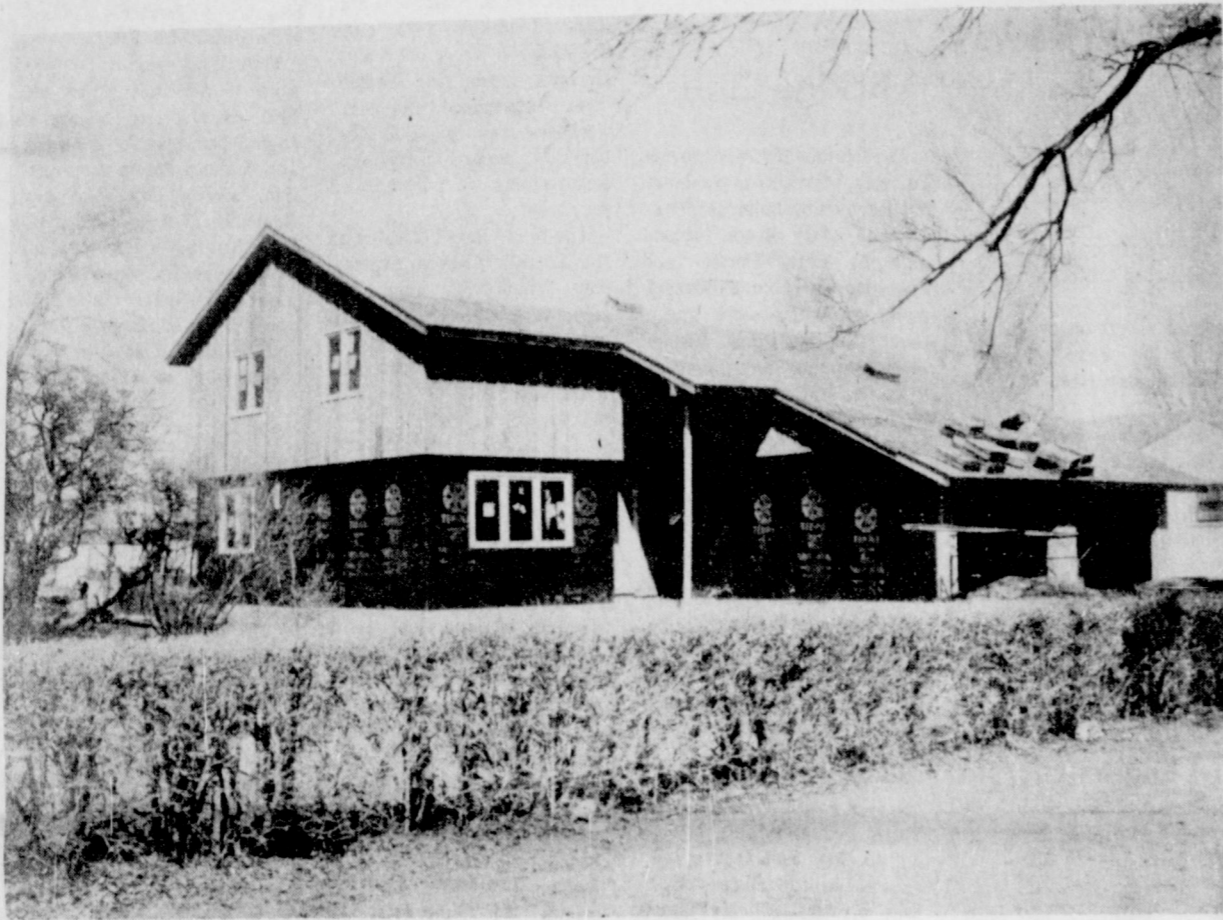

A White House task force has called for reducing Americans' exposure to man-made radiation, particularly medical X-rays. It urged doctors to be cautious in ordering X-rays and encouraged patients to keep their own personal records of X-rays and take X-rays with them when they switch doctors.

ON FIRE ARMS

The Treasury Department dropped proposed firearms regulations after thousands of letter writers claimed the rules were the first step toward nationwide gun registration. The regulations, proposed last March 21, would have required serial numbers stamped on every firearm by manufacturers.

ON RULE CHANGE

The Senate changed its rules, for the second time in four years, to make it easier to cut off filibusters. The new rule provides that all debate must stop within 100 hours--one hour per senator--after three-fifths of the senators have voted to halt discussion of an issue.

EXTRA EARNINGS

The Senate has voted to let members increase extra earnings--above the annual \$57,500 salary--by \$16,375 a year for honorariums, and possibly more for other endeavors.

MEN & ALIMONY

The Supreme Court has ruled that states cannot exclude needy men from being paid alimony on the same basis as women.

MONDALE ON BUDGET

Vice President Walter Mondale has declared the Carter administration's vigorous opposition to a balanced-budget amendment, saying the government needs flexibility in order to manage a sometimes cantankerous economy.

CANCER INCREASING

Marvin Schneiderman, a statistician with the National Cancer Institute, told Congress the rate of cancer in America is still increasing, but there is an encouraging drop in incidence and mortality among those under 45.

ON HOSPITAL COST

President Carter has pledged to lead the fight against the hospital lobby and win passage of a hospital cost control bill that "offers us one of our best opportunities to bring down the rate of overall inflation."

ABOUT YOUR HOME

For a golden-brown crust on bread and pastry, brush top of dough with unbeaten egg white before baking.

To determine if a refrigerated or thawed frozen casserole is heated through-out, insert the blade of a table knife in the center for a few seconds. If the tip of the knife is really hot to touch when removed--the casserole is ready to serve.

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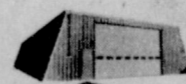
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
