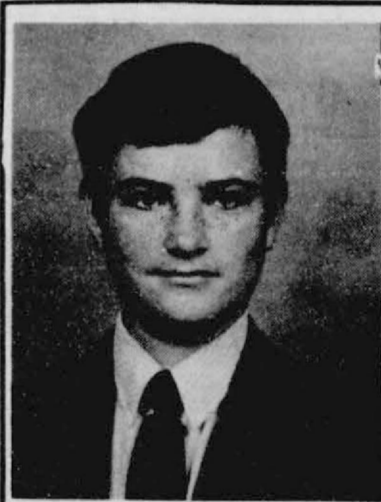
**Pringle-Morse graduation set**

A "bump-out" may sound like a new dance craze, but it's not. A bump-out--or bay window--is simply an easy way of gaining a little extra square footage without making major structural changes in your home.

A family may only need a few extra feet of room in a particular area of the house. Rather than remodeling they may find that an enlarged eating nook or sitting space in a small bedroom will suffice. A glassed-in greenhouse-style bump-out will also add light to dark spaces and "expand" the room without a major renovation.

Unlike conventional additions, a bump-out "hangs" onto the side of the house, which saves the cost of excavating, pouring foundations and building main support walls.

Bump-outs also allow a landowner to avoid the setback building code restrictions, that sometimes pose a problem on small urban or suburban lots. In some communities, setback ordinances

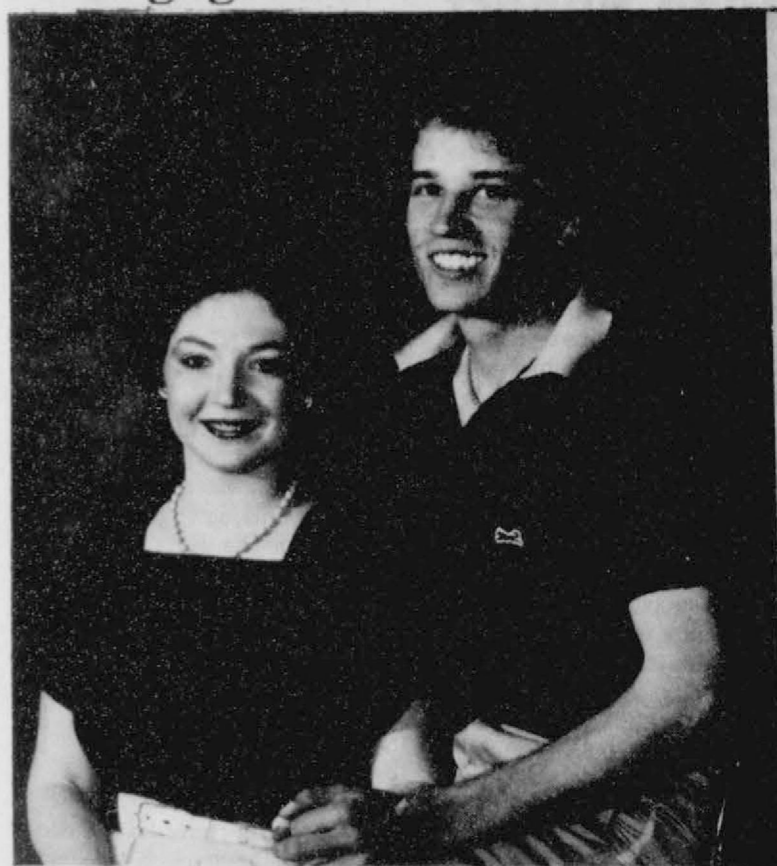
apply only to additions constructed on a foundation.

Installing a bump-out area is not a do-it-yourself project for the inexperienced. Consult two or three contractors for simple design and price estimates. Consider hiring an architect if the addition requires close matching with other trim and distinctive structural materials. A bump-out that does not fit the character of the house is worse than none at all and may actually reduce your property value.

A very simple idea whose time has come, bump-outs are an ideal alternative for many families faced with too little space and tight finances.

They're not yet aware that American farmers, and small planters, are often unable to find a small U.S.-built tractor that will do the job they need done. As a result, Japanese and European-built tractors have invaded the U.S. market.

By and large, owners are happy with them, and wonder why U.S. companies didn't offer such small, handy and less expensive tractors years ago.

Unless more U.S. firms offer small, competitive quality tractors, tillers, etc., more and more of that market will go to foreign makers.

No quotas, or tariffs, will be justified if domestic firms lose this market because they don't remain competitive in quality and design, and price.

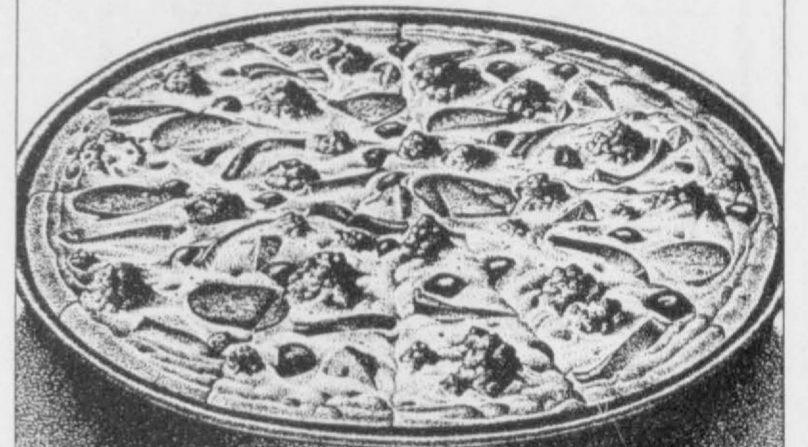

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## Memorial Day/ACS Memorial Program

Memorial Day is the time for remembering someone held dear and the American Cancer Society announced today that it can also become a time for turning losses into victories.

According to Fran Maupin, for the Hansford Unit of the ACS, Memorial Day is an appropriate time to make memorial contributions in memory of a loved one lost to cancer. "We call them 'Living Memorials,'" said Mrs. Maupin. "A gift today may spare others tomorrow."

Contributions to the American Cancer Society are used to sponsor the organization's attack on cancer through balanced programs of research, education, patient services and rehabilitation.

The ACS is the largest source of non-government cancer research funds in the country. The current ACS research investment in Texas alone is more than \$4.2 million in grants at hospitals, universities

and medical institutions throughout the state.

According to the latest figures released by the society this spring, cancer survival rates are rising steadily. The 1984 edition of its annual "Cancer Facts and Figures" indicates 48 percent of all cancer patients will survive 5 years or more after diagnosis. This compares with 41 percent just 5 years ago in 1979.

"We are winning the fight," said Fran. Progress is being made but we've still got to do more. I think our memorial program remains a convenient and dignified way of turning losses into victories."

### Wheat Field Day Set

A Wheat Field Day will be held on May 24 at the USDA Convention and Production Research Laboratory at Bushland, Texas. Field tours to various research plots will start at 1:00 p.m. Dr. Bob Stewart, Director of the Research Facility, invites everyone interested in wheat varieties and production practices to attend.

Hybrid wheat will be featured at the event. Dr. Kenneth Porter, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Small Grain Breeder, has an irrigated nursery with 20 new hybrids he recently produced. Another nursery has 12 hybrids from commercial companies. Similar hybrids are being grown on dryland. Pure line wheat varieties as well as barley and oat varieties will be shown in other irrigated

and dryland nurseries. Dr. Frank Petr, Texas Agricultural Extension Service Area Agronomist, will discuss barley varieties. Gary Peterson and Jon Simmons will show visitors the dryland small grain nursery that has over 5000 plots.

At another tour stop, Dr. Steven Winter will explain his irrigated wheat grazing trial. He is comparing two planting dates, four varieties and five removal dates for cattle. He is measuring both forage production and grain yields from the various grazing treatments.

Dr. Allen Wiese, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Weed Scientist, will show a no-tillage system in a wheat-sorghum-fallow cropping sequence. Yields from no-tillage are being compared to sweep tillage in the wheat-sorghum-fallow cropping sequence. Reggie Jones, USDA Soil Scientist, will describe how he measures runoff from the cropping experiment. Jones said, "We anticipate the tillage system that saves the most water will produce the highest yields". At

the same location, Dr. Wyatt Harman, TAES Research Economist, will discuss the economics of using no-tillage farming systems.

The Field Day is being sponsored by the USDA, Agricultural Research Service; Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and Texas Wheat Producers Association.

Dr. Stewart said "Researchers at Bushland have greatly improved wheat varieties and culture and they are anxious to show their results to producers."

Texas Kid Express may come to Spearman

The group known as the Texas Kid Express was a feature of the Guymon parade last Saturday. Texas Kid Express is under the direction of Bruce Parr of Friona, Tx. It is owned and sponsored by Baker & Taylor Drilling Co. of Amarillo and Spearman, Tx. The Drilling Co. is under the directorship of Spearman's own Max Banks.

Hansford County citizens who regularly attend the Pioneer Days Celebration in Guymon were so impressed with the

Texas Kid Express that they have called the newspaper asking if this fantastic group will be in Spearman on May 26 for the Spearman celebration.

For those planning to attend the Spearman celebration on May 25 and 26 they are reminded that the Texas Kid Express includes 7 pioneer modes of travel. A red Concord stage coach, the Cadillac of transportation of its day was built new last July at a cost of \$40,000. It holds 15 passengers,

9 inside and 6 on top. It is pulled with 4 Palomino mules wearing brass studded harness.

An unusual freight wagon, which comes from Northfield, Minn. dating back to the capture of the James boys in Northfield, will be pulled by a yoke of 10 working oxen. The five pair weigh 1 1/4 tons each. They have large horns and are red and white in color with the exception of a 2500 pound "Paul Bunyan Blue." The team is worked in true oxen fashion, guided by

voice command. This wagon has a capacity of 20 people.

Two four-seated red and black surreys, one with fringe, is part of the contingent. The surrey with the fringe will be pulled by a team of paint horses and the open top surrey will be pulled by stocking-leg mules. These two vehicles hold 12 people each. A two-seated surrey with the fringe on top is included in the group. This will be pulled by a Bay Amish buggy horse. This holds four people including the driver.

### Hansford County Brucellosis Free

AUSTIN--About one-third of the counties in Texas--76 to be exact--are free of brucellosis, figures from the Texas Animal Health Commission reveal.

Most of the counties free of the disease are in the Class B Area of Texas, which contains 141 counties in the western half of the state. In Class B, there are 72 counties free of brucellosis, which is more than half of the Class B Area.

Four counties are free of the disease in the Class C Area which is the eastern half of the state made up of 113 counties. The four counties free of the disease in Class C are Marion, Newton, McMullen, and Jim Hogg.

In the Class B Area, there are almost 60,000 cattle herds; of that number only 145 are under quarantine.

In the Class C Area, there are

more than 102,000 cattle herds; of that number 1,710 are under quarantine.
