

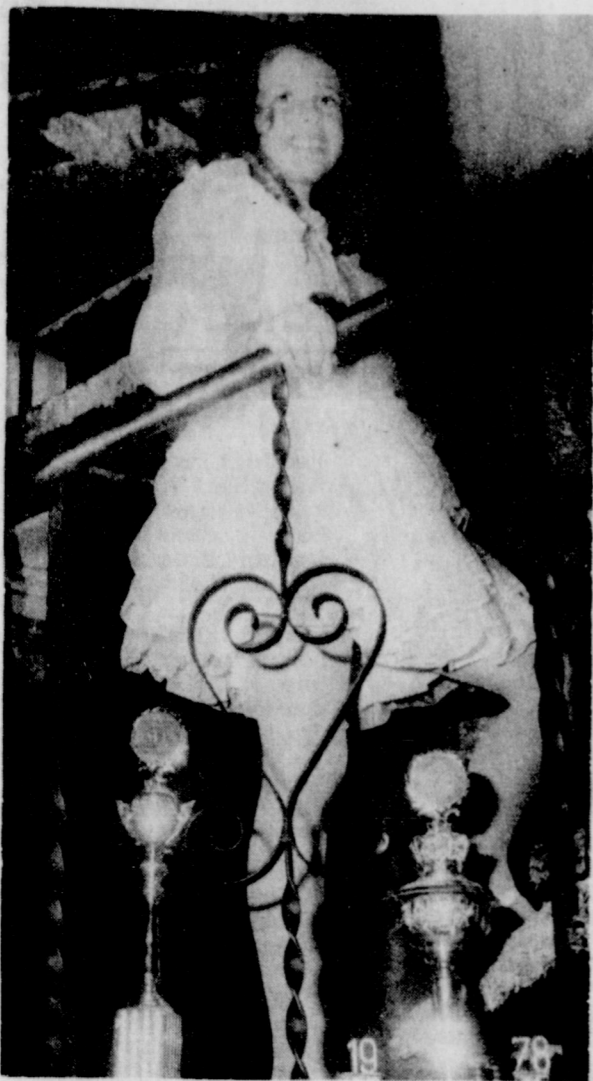

## Glaucoma Tests To Be Given

Glaucoma, when it strikes you don't feel a thing. But after a while you can't see a thing either. The cause and cure of this treacherous eye disease are unknown. But, if caught in time, glaucoma can be treated and checked. For this reason the Spearman Lions Club and the Panhandle Branch of the Texas Society to Prevent Blindness will co-sponsor a free screening for the "Sneak Thief of Sight" in the Fellowship Hall of Spearman First United Methodist Church, 407 South Haney, on Thursday, October 5, from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m.

Glaucoma is characterized by increased fluid pressure within the eye. This pressure destroys blood vessels and nerve fibers in the eye resulting in eventual blindness. It is an insidious process which nibbles away at vision without pain or noticeable symptoms. Sights destroyed by glaucoma cannot be restored; thus early detection is imperative.

To measure pressure within the eye at the free Spearman screening, members of the Top O' Texas Medical Society will give a simple, painless with an instrument called a "tonometer." The test takes only a minute-but "it is a minute that can mean a lifetime of sight to someone in Spearman," says R. L. Kleeberger, M. D., medical chairman of the screening, warning that an estimated 94,000 Texans have the disease and only half of them may be aware of it.

The screenings are approved by the Top O' Texas Medical Society.

Also participating in the program as a public service will be members of the Lions Club and their wives and members of the Spearman Chamber of Commerce.

## 1978 Busy For Sheriff's Department

Recel Eugene Bryant 26, of Spearman was charged in County Court with the offense of possession of marijuana after his arrest by Sheriff McFarlin and deputies the morning of August 28, 1978. Mr. Bryant was assessed a \$250.00 fine and a 6 month sentence which was probated.

Joe Morgan was arrested in Guymon, Oklahoma on a felony warrant issued by the Hansford County sheriffs office charging unlawful use of a motor vehicle. He allegedly took a 1973 Chevrolet pick-up from Spearman belonging to Albert Mackie. Mr. Morgan is awaiting extradition back to Spearman at this time.

James Howard Brandes of Canyon was arrested by sheriffs deputies on a felony warrant issued out of Randall County Texas for theft by check. Mr. Brandes has been released by posting a \$500.00 bond.

Leroy Knight, 42, of Spearman was arrested by sheriffs deputies for leaving the scene of an accident. Mr. Knight was released pending a court hearing.

The sheriffs office continues its probe into the theft of \$580.00 from the Co-op in Spearman. \$460.00 has been recovered but further investigation is continuing at this time.

Margaret Rose Smith, 35, of Gruver was arrested by sheriffs deputies. She was wanted in two states, Oklahoma and Nebraska. Both were for obtaining property under false pretenses. She has been released to the Oklahoma authorities.

Alex Ruana of Dumas was assessed a ten year sentence by a Hansford County jury, on August 31. The trial was moved to Spearman by a change of venue from Moore County. Mr. Ruana is at this time awaiting formal sentencing by 64th District Judge Metcalf.

## Sheriff's Report

In the first 8 months of 1978 the Hansford County Sheriffs office has returned to the merchants \$4281.61 in worthless checks and monies. They served a total of 229 civil papers. There was a total of 16 grand jury indictments. Through the past 8 months there also have been 80 arrests.

Among the arrests were: Public Intoxication - 16; Theft by check - 20; Aggravated Assault - 3; Enticing a child - 1; Criminal non support - 1; Felony Theft - 9; Runaway - 2; Mental - 3; Burglary - 5; Harrassment by Phone - 1; Disorderly conduct - 1; Fugitive - 2; Probation Violation - 1; Possession of marijuana - 7; Excessive speed - 1; No drivers license - 1; Simple assault - 1; Abusive Language - 1; Hindering arrest - 1; False report - 1; Driving while intoxicated - 1; Leaving the scene of the accident - 1.

The sheriffs office also investigated 27 accidents in the county. There were no fatalities.

## Field Day

The latest research on cotton varieties, corn, irrigation, and weed control will be featured attractions for the 69th annual field day of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station for Lubbock and Halfway. The event begins at 1 p.m. Tuesday, September 12 at the research site, 14 miles west of Plainview.

Hansford County producers will find the program particularly applicable, said Garland Stewart, county Extension agent.

Research efforts at the Lubbock and Halfway station focus especially upon the needs of producers in Hansford County and throughout the High Plains of Texas.

The annual field day alternates between the TAES locations at Lubbock and Halfway, Stewart said. Field tours will be conducted throughout the afternoon, with tractor-drawn trailers shuttling visitors to key demonstrations.

The field day is a cooperative presentation of TAES, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the High Plains Research Foundations, the Science Education Administration of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, and the National Weather Service.

Principal stops on the tour of the Halfway station will feature reports on irrigation effects on corn, tests of new cotton varieties, research on weed control, effective management of farm labor, and a new mobile trickle irrigation system, Stewart said. During the stops on the tour of the 320-acre research site, Experiment Station scientists and Extension Service specialists will answer questions and discuss problems with the visitors.

The field day also will present a display of machinery and equipment by area implement dealers.

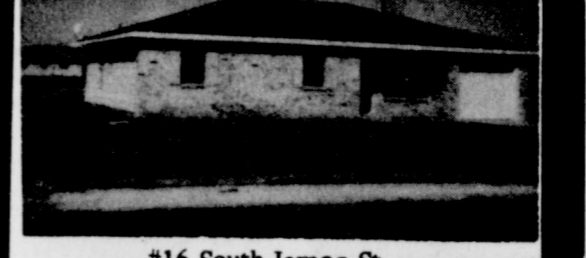

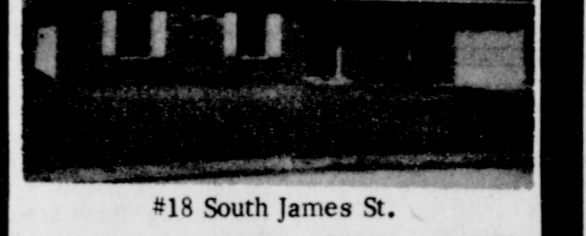

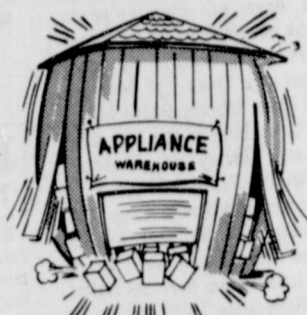

### County Agent News

Are you looking for a way to extend the grazing season for summer grasses? If so, fall fertilization may be the answer, says Garland Stewart, county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

1. Increase the amount of grazing, especially during October and November.
  2. Improve the quality of fall grazing.
  3. Provide earlier spring grazing next year.
  4. Reduce the amount of hay and winter pasture needed.
- Present costs make fertilization of a well-managed forage

system the most profitable way to meet an animal's nutritional requirements. However, both fertilization and grazing management must be efficient to accomplish this goal.

Fall fertilization of summer grasses means applying 50 to 60 pounds of nitrogen per acre plus the phosphorus and potash requirements for next year's production. Topdressing a complete fertilizer in early fall and applying only nitrogen next spring can be effective.

Stewart stresses that the amount of phosphorus and potash applied must be based on the level of these nutrients in the soil if the practice is to be profitable. Information from soil tests will identify those soils deficient or adequate in phosphorus and potash as well as the lime requirement.

If you have not been fertilizing summer grasses for fall production, you may want to consider this practice, says Stewart. The advantages outweigh the potential losses of these nutrients due to leaching from winter rains.

## PUBLIC NOTICE SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 7, 1978

### "The Tax Relief Amendment"

(H.J.R. 1)

H.J.R. 1 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution allowing the legislature to exempt intangible personal property, requiring the legislature to exempt certain household goods and personal effects, and allowing the legislature to exempt all or part of the personal property homestead from state and local property taxation.

The amendment requires the legislature to provide for the taxation of farm and ranch land on the basis of its productive capacity instead of its market value and allows the legislature to provide for the taxation of timber land on its productive capacity.

The amendment permits local governments to extend the present exemption of not less than \$3,000 of the residence homestead of persons 65 and older to include certain disabled persons.

The amendment grants an exemption from public school property taxes of \$5,000 of the market value of the residence homestead. It authorizes the legislature to grant an additional exemption from public school property taxes of an amount not to exceed \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of persons 65 years of age or older and certain disabled persons. If a person 65 years of age or older qualifies for this exemption, the total amount of public school taxes imposed on that person's homestead may not be increased.

The amendment prevents local governments from increasing property taxes unless the governing body provides public notice and conducts a public hearing. The amendment requires the legislature to provide by law for each property owner to receive notice of the revaluation of his property and the amount taxes will be increased.

The amendment limits appropriations from state tax revenue to an amount not to exceed Texas' estimated economic growth rate, with the legislature authorized to make exceptions for emergencies.

The amendment prohibits the statewide appraisal of real property for property tax purposes. Enforcement of uniform standards and procedures for appraisal of property for property tax purposes is required to originate in the taxing

authority where the property tax is imposed.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for tax relief for residential homesteads, elderly persons, disabled persons, and agricultural land; for personal property exemptions; for truth in taxation procedures, including citizen involvement; for a redefinition of the tax base; for limitations on state spending; and for property tax administration."

### NUMBER ONE (S.J.R. 50)

S.J.R. 50 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to delete the archaic reference to the "Deaf and Dumb Asylum." The amendment would allow the State of Texas to purchase products and services done by handicapped individuals in nonprofit rehabilitation facilities without complying with bid requirements applicable to other state contracts. The amendment also would eliminate the formality of the approval of certain state contracts by the Governor, the Secretary of State and the Comptroller of Public Accounts.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment deleting the archaic reference to the 'Deaf and Dumb Asylum,' allowing certain products and services of handicapped individuals to be used by agencies and departments of state government, requiring the procurement of other products and services required in the operation of state government to be made under bids awarded to the lowest responsible bidder, making all such procurement processes subject to laws enacted by the legislature, and eliminating the requirement that the Governor, the Secretary of State, and the Comptroller of Public Accounts of Texas be personally involved with such transactions."

### NUMBER TWO (S.J.R. 55)

S.J.R. 55 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to permit local governments to issue bonds for the reconstruction or acquisition of facilities (land, equipment and improvements) designed to develop employment opportunities. These

bonds would be payable solely from the revenue from the sale or lease of these facilities. The building or acquisition of such facilities must be determined by the local government to be necessary to develop employment opportunities.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide that the legislature may permit political subdivisions to issue revenue bonds to develop employment opportunities for its citizens."

### NUMBER THREE (S.J.R. 44)

S.J.R. 44 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution which would allow the legislature to authorize cities and towns to issue tax increment bonds to finance the redevelopment of blighted areas. The bonds are to be paid solely from revenue from municipal tax increments. Payment cannot be made from the revenue of municipal taxes, utilities, or other services.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment to give the legislature the power to issue bonds to finance the redevelopment of blighted areas and town from granting its money or lending its credit for such purposes."

### NUMBER FOUR (S.J.R. 53)

S.J.R. 53 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to allow the legislature to exempt from taxation solar or wind-powered energy devices.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from taxation solar and wind-powered energy devices."

### NUMBER FIVE (H.J.R. 37)

H.J.R. 37 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to grant exclusive jurisdiction to justices of the peace in civil cases where the amount in controversy does not exceed \$200, except where the legislature gives exclusive jurisdiction to another court.

The amendment grants justices of the peace concurrent jurisdiction with county courts where the amount in controversy is between \$200 and \$500, except where the legislature gives the county court exclusive jurisdiction.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment to extend the jurisdiction of justices of the peace in civil cases."

### NUMBER SIX (S.J.R. 45)

S.J.R. 45 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to expand the number of judges on any court of civil appeals. Presently courts of civil appeals are limited to a chief justice and two associate justices. The amendment also would allow the courts to sit in sections, with the concurrence of a majority of the judges sitting in the section necessary to decide a case.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to increase the number of justices on a court of civil appeals, permitting a court of civil appeals to sit in sections, and requiring a concurrence of a majority of justices to decide a case."

### NUMBER SEVEN (S.J.R. 48)

S.J.R. 48 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution eliminating the State Building Commission and the State Building Fund. The authority of the State Building Commission has been transferred by law to the State Board of Control.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment to repeal the authority for the State Building Commission and the State Building Fund."

### NUMBER EIGHT (H.J.R. 42)

H.J.R. 42 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution allowing certain political subdivisions or districts in the state that can presently issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit to engage in fire-fighting activities and to issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit to support such activities.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendments authorizing certain districts to engage in fire-fighting activities and to issue bonds or to issue bonds or otherwise lend their credit for fire-fighting purposes."

### LA ENMIENDA PARA ALIVIO DE IMPUESTOS (H.J.R. 1)

H.J.R. 1 propone una enmienda a la constitucion de Texas permitiendo a la legislatura que exente propiedad personal intangible, requiriendo que la legislatura exente ciertos articulos caseros y efectos particulares; y permitiendo a la legislatura que exente todo o parte de la propiedad personal del hogar seguro, de la imposicion de impuestos estatales y locales sobre propiedad.

La enmienda requiere a la legislatura que disponga la imposicion de impuestos sobre tierras agricolas y rancheras basada en su capacidad productiva en vez de su valor de mercado y permite a la legislatura que disponga la imposicion de impuestos a bosques de madera basada en su capacidad productiva.

La enmienda permite a los gobiernos locales que extiendan la exencion actual de no menos de \$3,000 del hogar seguro residencial para personas de 65 años o más de edad para incluir ciertas personas incapacitadas.

La enmienda concede una exencion de \$5,000 en el valor de mercado del hogar seguro residencial en los impuestos para escuelas publicas sobre propiedad. Autoriza a la legislatura que conceda una exencion adicional de los impuestos para escuelas publicas sobre propiedad de una cantidad que no exceda \$10,000 del valor de mercado de hogares seguros residenciales de personas 65 años o más de edad que disponga por ley que cada propietario reciba aviso de la revaluacion de su propiedad y la cantidad de incremento en sus impuestos.

La enmienda limita las apropiaciones de los ingresos de impuestos estatales en una cantidad que no exceda la tasa de crecimiento económico estatal que se anticipa, con la legislatura autorizada para conceder exenciones de emergencia.

La enmienda prohíbe la valuación de propiedad inmueble a través del estado para los fines de impuestos sobre propiedad. Se requiere que la ejecución de

normas y procedimientos uniformes para la valuación de propiedad con el propósito de impuestos sobre propiedad, se origine con la autoridad que impone los impuestos sobre propiedad.

La terminología de la enmienda propuesta tal como aparecerá en la boleta es como sigue: "La enmienda constitucional disponiendo alivio de impuestos para hogares seguros residenciales, personas mayores de edad, personas incapacitadas, y tierras agrícolas; extensiones de bienes muebles; la verdad en procedimientos tocante a la imposición de impuestos, incluyendo participación de ciudadanos; de nuevo definiendo la base de impuestos; limitando los gastos del estado; y la administración de impuestos sobre propiedad."

### NO. 1 (S.J.R. 50)

S.J.R. 50 propone una enmienda a la constitucion de Texas para eliminar la referencia arcaica al "Instituto de Sordos y Mudos." La enmienda permitiria al estado de Texas que compre productos y servicios de individuos incapacitados en facilidades de rehabilitacion no lucrativas sin cumplir con los requisitos de oferta que se aplican a otros contratos estatales. La enmienda tambien eliminaria la formalidad de la aprobacion de ciertos contratos estatales por el Gobernador, el Secretario de Estado, y el Contralor de Cuentas Publicas.

La terminología de la enmienda propuesta tal como aparecerá en la boleta es como sigue: "La enmienda constitucional eliminando la referencia arcaica al 'Instituto de Sordos y Mudos,' permitiendo que ciertos productos y servicios de personas incapacitadas sean usados por agencias y departamentos del gobierno del estado, requiriendo que otros productos y servicios requeridos en la operación del gobierno del estado sean obtenidos por ofertas concedidas al postor responsable que ofrezca el precio más bajo, haciendo que todos los procesos de ejecución sean sujetos a las leyes establecidas por la legislatura y eliminando el requisito que el Gobernador de Texas, el Secretario de Estado, y el Contralor de Cuentas Públicas de Texas participen personalmente en tales negociaciones."

### NO. 2 (S.J.R. 55)

S.J.R. 55 propone una enmienda a la constitucion de Texas para permitir que gobiernos locales emi-

tan bonos para la reconstrucción o adquisición de facilidades (terrenos, equipos y mejoras) con la intención de desarrollar oportunidades de empleo. Estos bonos se pagarán solamente de los ingresos de la venta o arriendo de estas facilidades. Gobierno local debe determinar que la construcción o adquisición de tales facilidades es necesaria para desarrollar oportunidades de empleo.

La terminología de la enmienda propuesta tal como aparecerá en la boleta es como sigue: "La enmienda constitucional para disponer que la legislatura puede permitir que las subdivisiones políticas emitan bonos de ingresos, para desarrollar oportunidades de empleo para sus ciudadanos."

### NO. 3 (S.J.R. 44)

S.J.R. 44 propone una enmienda a la constitucion de Texas que permitiria la emision de bonos de impuestos incrementados para financiar el desarrollo de areas deterioradas. Solamente se pagarán los bonos de los ingresos de los incrementos en impuestos municipales. No pagos se pueden hacer de los ingresos de impuestos municipales, servicios publicos u otros servicios.

"La enmienda constitucional que da a la legislatura el poder de autorizar las ciudades y pueblos para expedir bonos para financiar el desarrollo de areas deterioradas y prohibir cualquier ciudad o pueblo de conceder su dinero o prestar su crédito para tales fines."

### NO. 4 (S.J.R. 53)

S.J.R. 53 propone una enmienda a la constitucion de Texas para permitir que la legislatura exente de la imposicion de impuestos, aparatos para energia o de viento.

La terminología de la enmienda propuesta tal como aparecerá en la boleta es como sigue:

"La enmienda constitucional autorizando a la legislatura para exentar de impuestos aparatos de energia solar o de viento."

### NO. 5 (H.J.R. 37)

H.J.R. 37 propone una enmienda a la constitucion de Texas para conceder competencia exclusiva a jueces de paz en causas civiles cuando la cantidad en controversia no excede \$200, a menos que la legislatura conceda competencia exclusiva a otra corte. La enmienda concede a jueces de paz competencia concurrente con cortes de condado cuando la cantidad en controversia sea entre \$200 y \$500, a menos que la legislatura conceda a la corte de condado competencia exclusiva.

competencia concurrente con ambas cortes, cortes de condado, y cortes de distrito, cuando la cantidad en controversia sea entre \$500 y \$1,000, a menos que la legislatura conceda a la corte de condado o distrito competencia exclusiva.

La terminología de la enmienda propuesta tal como aparecerá en la boleta es como sigue: "La enmienda constitucional para extender la competencia de los jueces de paz en causas civiles."

### NO. 6 (S.J.R. 45)

S.J.R. 45 propone una enmienda a la constitucion de Texas para permitir que la legislatura aumente el número de jueces en cualquier corte de apelaciones civiles. Al presente, cortes de apelaciones civiles están limitadas a un juez presidente y dos jueces asociados. **REPORT TO CONSUMERS**

Experts at the Electric Power Research Institute are trying to help avoid severe energy shortage. One way is by turning coal into a liquid fuel. Successful completion of the programs will help bring coal liquefaction to commercial readiness, and appreciable amounts of coal-derived liquid fuels may be on the market in the 1990s.

**Aptitude Tests Planned**

Claude Newell, guidance director at Spearman High School, has announced that juniors will be able to join over one million other students around the world in taking the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) this fall. The test, co-sponsored by the College Board and National Merit Scholarship Corporation, is an important step in making college plans.

Scheduled for October 24, at Spearman High, the PSAT/NMSQT measures verbal and mathematical aptitude -- two abilities important in doing college work. The test can also lead to other opportunities for high school students. For example, students can ask to participate in the College Board's Student Search Service which helps colleges learn about students like them.

By taking the PSAT/NMSQT, they can enter the competition for scholarships administered by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation and can get a good idea of what the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) is like.

Along with their score reports, students will receive a copy of ABOUT YOUR PSAT/NMSQT SCORES, a booklet that contains valuable how-to information about: estimating SAT scores; finding out where to get and how to use detailed information about colleges and financial aid; and planning for financing a college education.

Also, students can use the College Board's College Handbook, to compare their scores with those of enrolled students at more than 2,800 colleges and universities.
