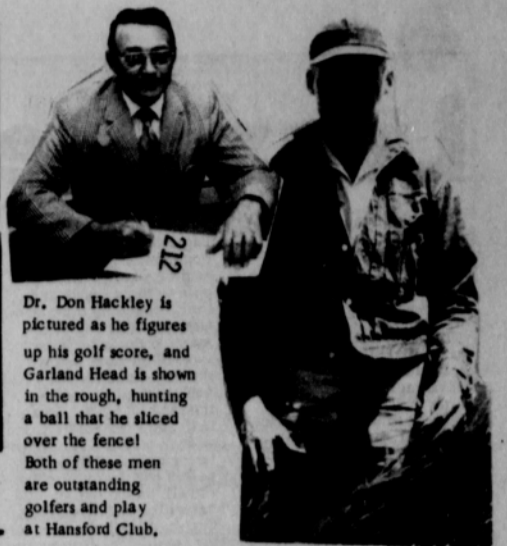

Man Arrested In Truck Theft

Charles Beegle, 20, was arrested in Alexandria, Louisiana, for the June theft of a pickup belonging to Wright Hale. The truck was found abandoned later in Kansas City, Missouri. 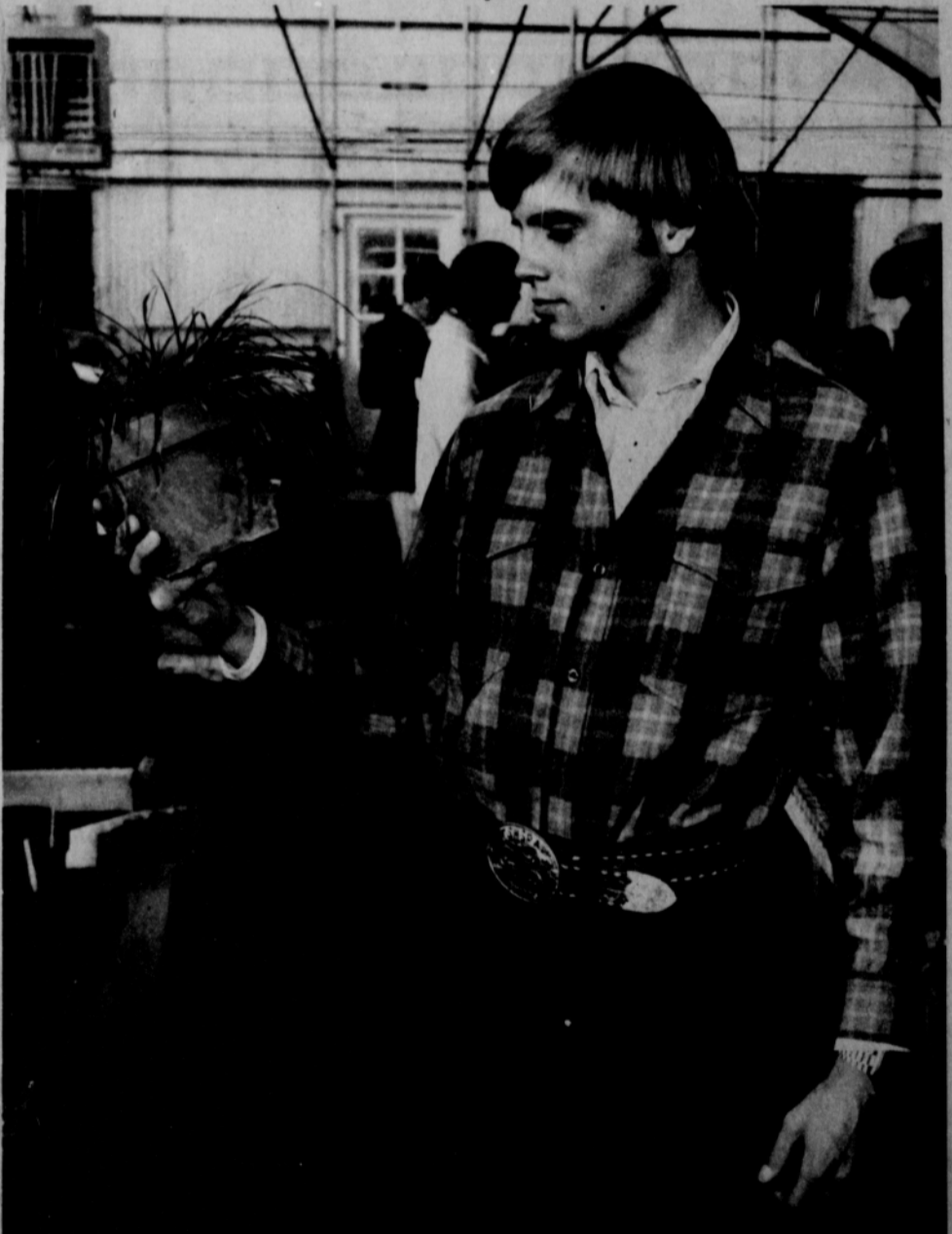

Bart Thoreson Conducts Plant Science Experiment

WTSU--Does barley, fescue, rye or Kentucky blue grass grow best in the Panhandle climate? West Texas State University sophomore Bart Thoreson of Gruver has spent the last seven weeks of his plant science lab conducting an experiment to find out. "We planted the four grasses and then added the equivalent of 100 pounds

per acre of nitrogen," Thoreson said. "We are going to have to dry and then weigh them to know for sure, but we imagine the barley and fescue will be the best." Plant science greenhouse experiments are designed to make students more aware of plant production principles and the methods and procedures of carrying out a controlled experiment,

according to Dr. Ron Thoreson, professor of plant science and lab director. The students plant their crop seeds in groups of pots in the WTSU greenhouse. One group, the control group, receives only light and water, while the other groups might receive varying levels of nutrients, herbicides or other cultural practices. Each week the students re-

turn to observe and measure the progress of their plants as they grow. At the end of the experiment, the students harvest, dry and then weigh their plants to determine yield as affected by treatments. Thoreson, an ag business and economics major, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Donnie Thoreson of Gruver.

Lynxettes open home season

The Spearman Lynxettes opened their home season in front of a good crowd on a losing note here Tuesday night, losing to the Sanford-Fritch Eagles by the score of 53-43.

The Eaglette team who had an extremely quick team and had a decided height advantage over the Lynxettes showed why they are favored to win their district this year. Led by 5'9 Sr., Forward Denise Ashby with 20 points, the Eaglette team controlled both ends of the courts as the Lynxettes were unable to make the short shots. Time and time again they would drive the length of the court only to miss a layup or have it blocked by the much taller S-F Team.

The first quarter saw the Eaglette team jump to a commanding 11 point lead as the Lynxettes were unable to shoot inside and their outside shooting game was off. The Eaglette team on the other hand was led by good inside shooting led by Denise Ashby and good outside shooting by 5'5 Sr. Susan Bell who finished the game with 18 points. The Eaglette defense was led by a pair of 6'0 guards who continually made the job harder for the Spearman guards to bring the ball down the floor. The first quarter ended with the score 19-8 in favor of the Sanford-Fritch team.

The second quarter was much the same as the first

quarter as the Lynxettes continually missed shots and the taller S-F squad taking advantage of the errors. The Lynxettes had a total of 22 turnovers for the game. The second quarter ended with the S. F. girls holding a commanding 15 point lead by the score of 31-16.

The third quarter was a little better for the Lynxettes as Debbie Greene a 5'8 Freshman was assigned the task of stopping Denise Ashby. Giving up 4 inches in height, the freshman made up for her height disadvantage with good hustling defense as she slowed down the high scoring forward to only 4 points the 3rd quarter. On the other end, the Lynxettes were beginning to find the range and led by 5'6 Carla Harper, the Lynxettes made a comeback try that was started a little late in the game. The third quarter ended with the Lynxettes still behind by 13 - 43-30.

The fourth quarter started out good for the Lynxettes as they came within 7 points of the Eaglettes at one time, but the Sanford-Fritch girls just had to much height and too much of a lead for the Lynxettes to overcome. The Lynxettes scored more than the Eaglettes the last quarter, but it was not enough to win. The game ended with the Sanford-Fritch girl's first win, as they had previously lost to both Canyon and Phillips. Their record is also 1-2.

The next home game for the Lynxettes is this Friday night against the Hartley Tigercats here at Lynx gym.

The Lynxettes shot a cold 33% from the field and shot 53% from the free throw line making 11 out of 21 chances.

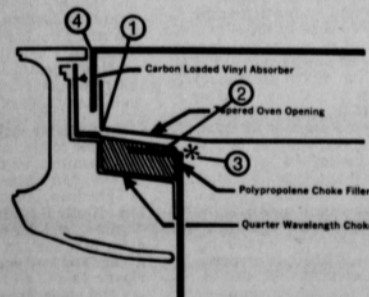

Post Office Has Christmas Gifts

Christmas shoppers should keep the Post Office in mind as a source of gifts, Postmaster Ray Robertson said today.

Several varieties of inexpensive philatelic items suitable for Christmas gifts are on sale at the Spearman Post Office as well as by mail order from the Philatelic Sales Division in Washington.

The products are key items in Postal Service efforts to create new interest in the world's largest hobby, stamp collecting. They include Stamp Collecting Kits, the 1975 edition of Stamps & Stories, Souvenir Mint Sets, panels in the American Commemorative Series and Bicentennial Philatelic Passports.

The topical Stamp Collecting kits, priced at \$2.00 each, have subjects ranging from space to sports, and each kit contains enough stamps to start a collection. Also included in the kit is a small album, mounting hinges, insert sheets for additional stamps, and a 32-page booklet entitled "The ABC's of Stamp Collecting."

Stamps & Stories is the popular pocket-size book which tells the stories of more than 2,000 stamps with illustrations and other information such as current catalog values. It also sells for \$2.00.

Souvenir Mint Sets are offered for sale annually by the Postal Service and contain all the special, memorial, and commemorative stamps issued during the year. Space is provided for mounting the stamps, and a brief description of each issue is included.

The 1974 Mint Set is available and sells for \$3.00 each. The 1975 Mint Set should be available for purchase in late November or early December.

Panels in the American Commemorative Series are on sale now for \$2.00 each. The Series began with the Wildlife Conservation issue of 1972. The 8 1/2 by 11 1/2 panels have a mint block of 4 stamps (except for issues of more than 4 stamps) mounted adjacent to background information about the stamp or stamps. Each panel, featuring three engraved stamp-theme illustrations from the archives of the American Bank Note Company, is suitable for framing.

Earlier panels in the series, as well as all the other philatelic products on sale at the Spearman Post Office are available by mail order at the quoted prices plus a 50-cent handling charge per order.

The Sales Division also stocks an extensive line of other philatelic items, including many earlier issues of stamps and postal stationery.

City To Receive Grant

Governor Dolph Briscoe has announced a grant of \$6,950.00 to the City of Spearman for use in a sign replacement program.

In making the announcement, Briscoe said the money is to be used to assist Spearman to come into compliance with the Texas Manual of Uniform Traffic Codes. "We are proud to be able to assist local communities in solving their own problems. It is impossible for us to dictate solutions from Austin to the many diverse towns and communities in this State. However, we can

offer support and engineering advise to help them improve their traffic safety situation," said Briscoe.

Bob Lay, Traffic Engineer for the Governor's Office of Traffic Safety, said the funds are to be used to replace out-of-date signs, but not signs that are worn out or damaged. "We are not in the maintenance business, but we are here to provide assistance and support to the communities to help them comply with State and Federal standards."

Requirements in approval of the grant included items such as the signs must be in accordance with the Texas Manual of Uniform Traffic Codes, a city ordinance must be approved to make the signs legally enforceable, an agreement must be reach-

ed for maintenance by the city for the signs and the city must maintain an inventory. Lay said the City of Spearman had reached all the requirements prior to the approval of the grant.

SAFETY TIPS FOR DECORATING

The Christmas season usually goes hand in hand with traditions. Many traditions revolve around the decorating of the Christmas tree...

DO be careful when buying your tree - When purchasing your Christmas tree this year, buy a firm, fresh tree. Store it in a cool place with the base of the tree in water - until ready to be decorated.

DO make a check of the decorations you use - Remember to check the decorative lighting strings for frayed wires, broken cords, and loose sockets.

- When trimming the tree, avoid using candles or other decorations that may ignite easily. Keep the tree away from the fireplace, radiator, and the T. V. set - any source of heat may cause the tree to become dry, thus creating a fire hazard.

DON'T over do it - Be sure not to overload the electrical circuits in your home. The wires that carry more current than they can handle may overheat and cause a fire.

Read manufacturer's instructions on lighting strings carefully and do not use more than the recommended number of lights in one circuit.

- Christmas decorations are beautiful - and very pleasant to look at. However, when you leave your home or retire for the night, turn off the light sets, colored spot lights, or other decorations.

DON'T settle for the unknown - When purchasing gifts for the people you care about take time out to check for the UL Label.

Be safe and happy this Christmas season. When preparing for the holidays take the extra steps to show you care - follow the Do's and Don'ts outlined above. You'll be glad you did.
