



## "Seat Belt Law" should it be mandatory?

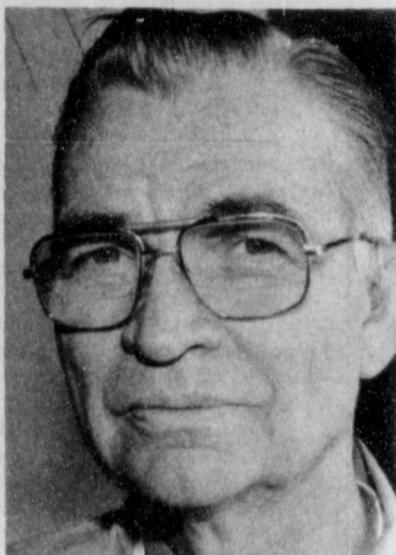
This week the man on the street asked the following question: "Do you think the Seat Belt Law" should be mandatory? Six people were interviewed and their answers are as follows:

Yes. It helps save lives and gives one a sense of security.



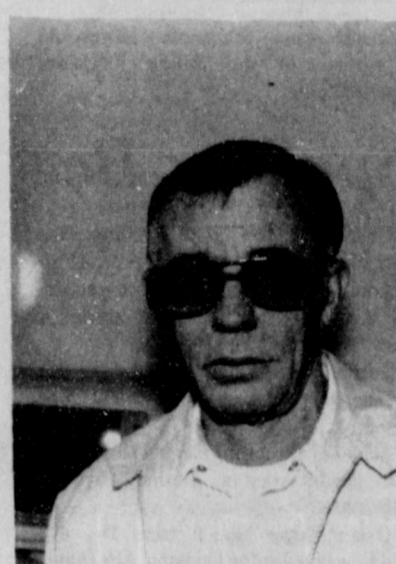
**Randall Sauer**

A beauty salon with three stalls will be a part of the new addition.

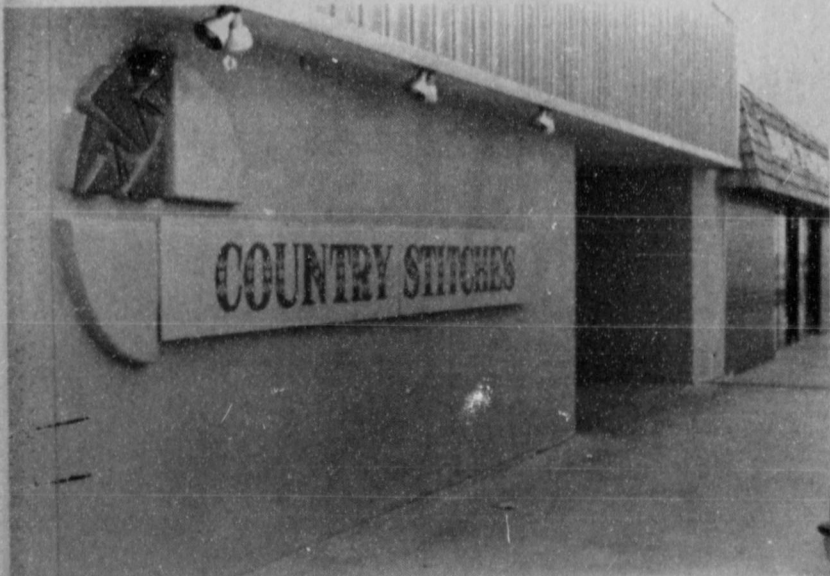
A quiet room to be used for family

### Mammograms

MOBIL BREAST IMAGING CENTER (MBIC) to visit Hansford Hospital on Tuesday, March 17th.

Area women will have an opportunity to have screening mammograms performed at a reduced fee of \$60.00 (regular cost is \$127.70.), which is more than one-half savings from the regular charge.

The \$60.00 charge reflects the cost of leasing the Mobil Breast Imaging Center, Radiologist fees and supplies. This fee is due in full at the hospital business office prior to the test being done.

It is recommended individuals wishing to have this test performed, contact their physician if they have questions or concerns about the need for the test.

The project is aimed at educating the public about breast cancer, its detection and treatment, and encouraging women to take advantage of available breast cancer screening methods.

## A Home Away From Home

McMurry sophomore Kelly Shrode spent the Christmas break in a school dorm, but it wasn't quite as lonely as it may seem. The dorm Kelly stayed in was far removed from her home on the McMurry campus.

During the break, Kelly flew to Quito, Ecuador, where her mother and father are "dorm parents" for a missionary home. If spending a holiday in a dorm room sounds dull, just listen to Kelly's story.

Kelly's first Christmas surprise was meeting her eight-month-old sister, Jessica, for the first time. Kelly had learned about Jessica last May when the infant was found on the dorm steps.

One of the teachers in the school saw what she thought was a pile of trash and started to remove it when "she saw it moving," Kelly said. The pile turned out to be two-hour-old infant who had been abandoned on the steps. Kelly's parents took the baby in and "they've kept her ever since," Kelly said.

The Christmas surprise thrilled Kelly and her two brothers who live in the dorm.

"She's really cute and a live wire," Kelly said.

That surprise was pleasant, but Kelly almost was in the middle of some other unexpected action which wouldn't have been so well received.

After arriving back in Abilene, Kelly learned that just after she left Ecuador, the president of the country was kidnapped. Had the capture taken place while Kelly was there, she probably wouldn't have been able to leave the country," she said.

The kidnapers wanted to exchange the president for an imprisoned military leader. That exchange was made and the potentially dangerous situation was resolved without further violence.

Still, Kelly was glad she missed that experience and was happy to be back in her own dorm at McMurry.

That trip wasn't Kelly's first to Ecuador and it won't be her last. She tries to go home each Christmas and hopes to teach in Ecuador for a few years after graduation.

Kelly's exotic travels began a long time ago. She was born in Perryton where her father worked for the Exxon Corp. When Kelly was in the fifth grade in Canadian, her parents decided to become missionaries.

Missionary work has taken Kelly's parents "all over the world," she said and Kelly has enjoyed some of those travels, including a 10-month stay

in Costa Rica.

When Kelly was in the seventh grade, the family moved to Ecuador. They returned on furlough to Canadian during Kelly's junior year and then moved back to Ecuador the summer before her senior year. Kelly finished her schooling in Ecuador and received a high school diploma from Alliance Academy.

After graduation, Kelly returned to Texas with her mother. It was then that Kelly chose McMurry to continue her education. Someone from the United Methodist Church in Canadian provided scholarship money for her to attend school.

Kelly said she believes that scholarship was "God's way of putting me here." Although Kelly loves the friendly atmosphere and her involvement at McMurry, she admits she has a touch of wanderlust.

She hopes to teach English in a Japanese school this summer and then return to Ecuador for a few years after graduation.

In the meantime, however, Kelly is making the most of her college years. An elementary education major with a Spanish minor, Kelly stays busy with studies and extra-curricular activities. She currently serves as sophomore class president, is in APO service club and Theta Chi Lambda social club. She also is an officer in Christian Life Fellowship, plays intramural sports and is in band.

Even though she is perfectly happy in Texas for now, Kelly is looking forward to living in Ecuador after graduation.

"I really enjoy being down there. It's home to me," she said.

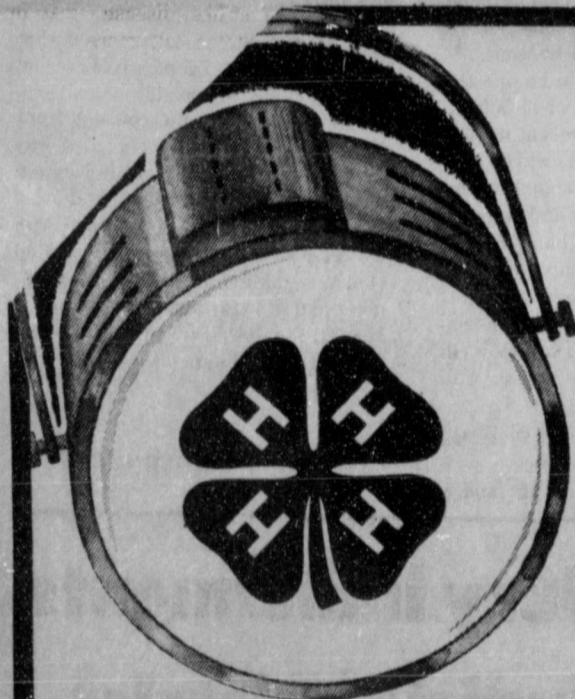

It will help Hansford County 100%. It is the greatest thing that ever happened in the county for taxes and ion. It will help tremendously.



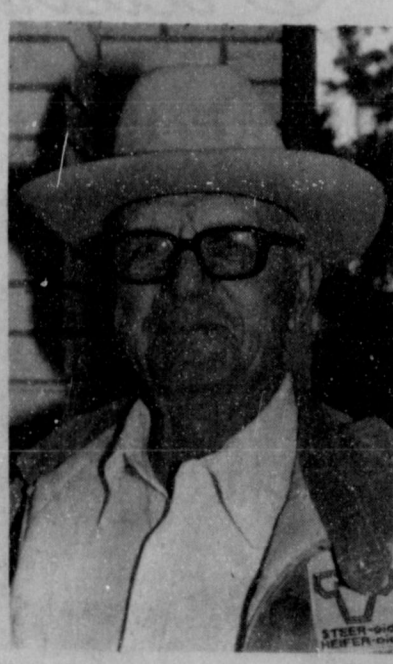

**FARM INCOME-Farm** and ranch families have many options for increasing outside income, but all have their costs and benefits, says family economics specialist Nancy Granovsky. "A majority of Texas farm families already have outside income from one or more family members working off-farm and the trend is growing as the farm financial crisis deepens," says the Texas A & M University Agricultural Extension Service specialist. Off farm employment is the logical choice for many, she says, if the farm or ranch is located within commuting distance of a town or city where there are employment opportunities. "Unless you have some special skills, pay may be low and the costs of transportation, clothes to dress for the job and other expenses should be considered," Granovsky notes. "But one of the best features of off-farm employment is that you may get fringe benefits and be able to cover the family with lower-cost group insurance and hospitalization."

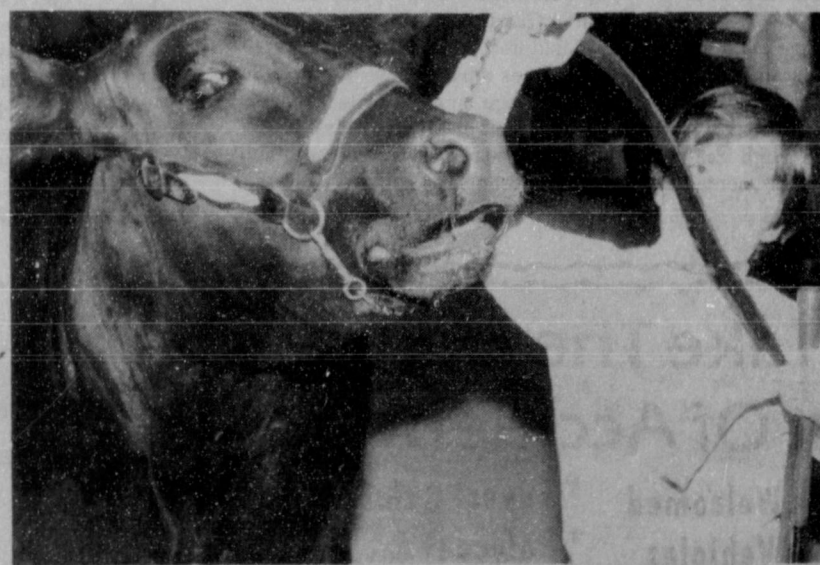

## Separate Payments

If you are sending payments for two different types of federal taxes to the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) at the same time, the IRS advises that you separate the checks or money orders for each payment to avoid confusion.

The confusion can result in the payments being erroneously credited, especially if different tax forms are involved. For example, a person filing a 1986 Form 1040 with tax due should not include in that payment amounts due for 1987 estimated taxes.

Also, taxpayers are advised to always write their social security numbers (employer identification number for business taxes), form number, and tax period involved on any check or money order sent to the IRS. Then, if your check becomes separated from your tax form, the IRS can still credit the money to your account.

## Attach all documents

Before you mail your federal tax return, be sure you have attached all supporting documents and schedules, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) says.

Documents such as earning statements, schedules, statements verifying deductions, or other pertinent information should be securely attached to the tax form. Taxpayers must include W-2 forms from all employers, regardless of the amount of earnings.

Missing documents can cause processing errors, refund delays, and create confusion and inconvenience for the taxpayer, the IRS says. In most instances when a required form or schedule is not with the tax return, the IRS must contact the taxpayer to request the missing item before continuing to process the return.

The members of Troops 116, 126, and 127 take the hands of each other and those of our sister Girl Scouts all across America to form a PROMISE CIRCLE. The circle symbolizes our unity—the sharing in a common interest by millions of girls and women from that memorable day - March 12, 1912 - in Savannah, Georgia, to this day - Monday March 12, 1987 in Spearman, Tx. A large crowd attended this important event in the lives of our Girl Scouts.

A promise can be a reliable commitment, or it can represent hope for the future. Often it is both at one and the same time. Our PROMISE represents ideals each of us accepted of our own free will when we joined the Girl Scout movement. Just as Girl Scouting has changed to remain relevant in each time, the precise and simple wording of our Girl Scout Promise has changed. Yet, through each change, the spirit of personal integrity and good relations with others has endured. 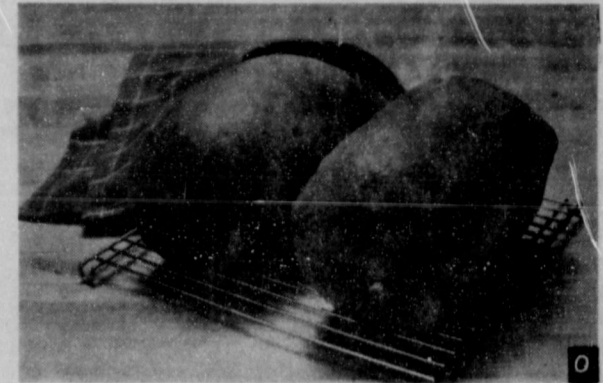
pate in a Five Week Summer Host Family Stay throughout Western Europe.

### BREAD BAKING BASICS . . . AN UPDATE



#### Keeping Bread Beautiful

##### SLICING

As elementary as it may seem, many people don't know how to slice freshly baked bread without disfiguring it. If you can stand the wait, it is best to allow the bread to cool for two or three hours before slicing. Use a long serrated knife; it makes all the difference in the world. Move the knife with a smooth, gentle sawing motion, and not a lot of pressure.

##### BREAD STORAGE

Incorrect storage of bread often prevents its enjoyment through the last slice. Here are some tips:

- To keep for one or two days - store at room temperature, wrapped in a clean towel or loose plastic. Tightly wrapped breads are more likely to mold.
- For longer storage, wrap in plastic bags, seal and refrigerate.
- Freeze breads if you want to keep them more than a few days.

Let bread cool completely; wrap in foil and put in plastic bags. Date loaves and use within 3 months for best flavor.

- To use frozen bread, let thaw somewhat. Preheat at 350°F in foil for soft crust; or open foil for hard crusted loaves.

##### FROZEN DOUGHS

Many recipes are available for bread doughs that can be frozen for up to four weeks. Mix and knead the dough; shape it immediately without letting it rise, cover it and place in freezer. When frozen, store in plastic bags. To use, let dough defrost and rise before baking.

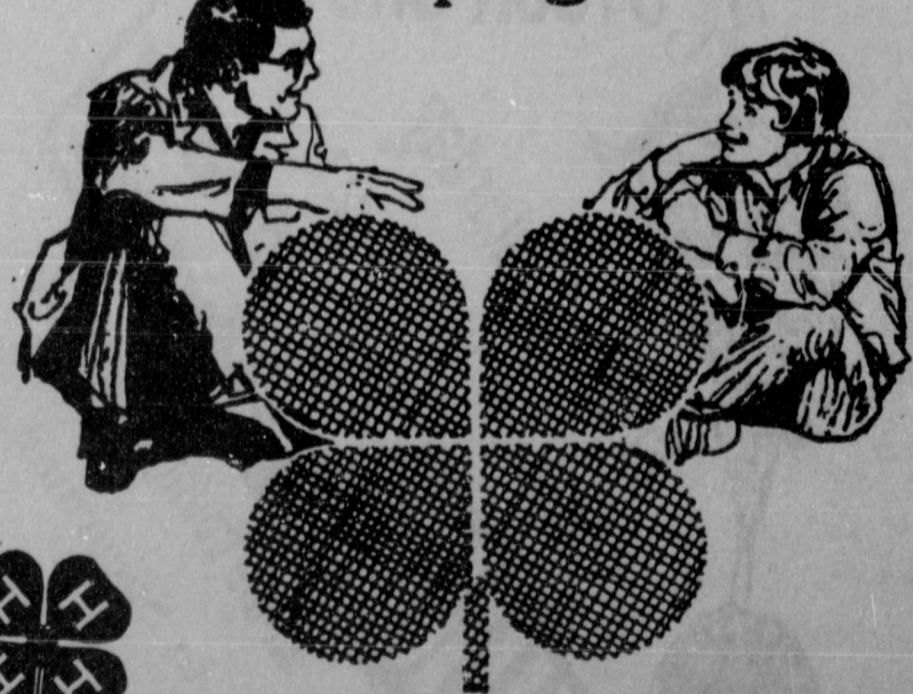

Located just off of the large day room is the T.V. room. It is separated by French doors. To the north of the day room, separated by four corridor divisions, is the dining room. The dining room will seat 85 persons, and will be used for parties, buffets and other occasions. The dining room will be equipped with an ice machine, built-in refrigerator, and double sink. A lovely patio is also adjacent to the dining area.

As you leave the dining/day room area, and enter the corridor on your

right, a new stretcher and wheelchair storage area is located. On the left is a daily linen and storage room and joining this is the central supply storage room.

Down the hall at the end of the corridor is the nurses station equipped with state of the art medical equipment.

Located near the nurses station is a medication and preparation room. All medication will be prepared in this room and it will be equipped with a triple locking device.

A nurses nutritional center is also located in this area.

South of the nurses station ten semi-private rooms are being constructed. The rooms will have carpet on the floor and wallpaper on the walls plus colorful vertical blinds. Each

room will have private closets, lounge chairs, and safety equipment in each bathroom featuring temperature control faucets.

To the north of the semi-private rooms an isolation room will be constructed. Nine private rooms will be located to the north of the isolation room. Each room with carpet, wallpaper, closet space, private bath, vertical blinds, chairs, tables, and temperature control for summer and winter.

To the north of the nine semi-private rooms, going thru double French doors, you enter the suite area. Eight suites will be designed with the very finest conveniences available to the occupants. Each suite will have carpet, wallpaper, vertical blinds and drapes, a counter top stove, refrigerator, sink, private bath with control temperature, and all facilities which will enable a couple to retire in utmost comfort.

One of the features of the new addition is a new century 80 whirlpool bath which will allow you to put a patient on a stretcher in the whirlpool bath, if necessary.

A "state-of-the-art" hot water system will be installed in the new building, which will maintain a 112% temperature regardless of amount of usage.

Featured at each outside door is an exhaust heat system which converts the cool air from an open outside door into warm air.

Each outside entrance door to the manor is equipped with a touch-punch security system. Doctors who are on duty at the manor will know the combination to the door at all times. Only the doctors & staff will know the secret combination to open the door.

The halls of the new manor will be tiled with a grey/white tile, with a navy blue baseboard.

The manor will be equipped with a central exhaust system which will ventilate each room.

All windows in the new manor are Thermopane tinted glass for energy efficiency.

Another feature of the manor is IN House Dental Facilities, provided by local dentists.

Unique to the Texas Panhandle is a heated carport entrance on the north

All of the cement and driveway area of the carport entrance located on the north side of the manor will be heated by underground hotwater pipes. This

will prevent falling on ice, snow, or wet sidewalk during bad weather.

The main entrance on the north side coming off of the patio will feature air-lock doors.

The air lock doors will prevent drafts and cold air to enter the main building. The formal lobby off of the air-lock doors will have two settees to receive visitors.

An alternate power system will be available for use in all emergency power shortages. The alternate power supply will furnish heat as well as electricity for the manor during power outages.

One of the finest laundry systems in the state will be installed in the new manor. This system will provide services for the hospital and the manor. A separate heating - air conditioning - exhaust system is provided for the laundry. The laundry has an air-lock system of entry.

Hospital District Officials stated that the manor building should be completed by the middle of June 1987. After the building is completed the present residents of the old manor will be moved to the new manor. After they have been moved complete remodeling will be done on the old facility. The architects are looking at 4 or 5 plans for remodeling the old manor. At this time four of the eight suites have been spoken for. A waiting list of 64 citizens have applied for entry in the new manor.

New parking facilities will be provided at the manor site with a new lighted sign on the north side of the manor. Currently the Hansford Manor has a superior rating given by the Texas Department of Health.

A total of 30 to 40 new employees will be hired to work at the manor when it is completed.

A Private Open House will be held prior to the formal grand opening of the manor. Invitations will be sent to state and local dignitaries for the private opening.

Anyone wishing to make donations or receive information about the manor may call Dennis Robertson at 659-2535. Anyone wishing to furnish a room or a suite can do so at this time. A brass plate will be placed on the door acknowledging the donation.

Mr. Robertson stated that the

Ladies Auxiliary is a valuable asset to the manor. They provide much valuable time in letter writing, beauty shop day, and visitation. This is a tremendous help to the staff. He would also like to thank the community for their patience during this construction. He believes this is something that the community will be very proud of.

## Need Tax Help.

Free tax return preparation is available close by through the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) or Tax Counseling for the Elderly (TCE) programs.

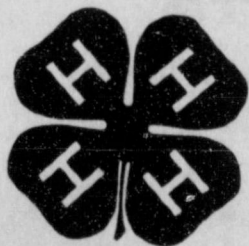
The VITA program provides free assistance in the preparation of relatively simple tax returns for taxpayers with special needs—lower income, non-English speaking, elderly and handicapped. The volunteers, who usually set up their tax assistance sites in libraries, schools, and similar locations, are trained by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS).

The TCE program provides tax assistance mainly for persons 60 years or over.

The IRS advises that persons going to a VITA or TCE site for assistance should be sure they take along the tax package that came to them in the mail, their wage and earnings statements, interest statements, copy of last year's return, and other necessary tax information and documents.

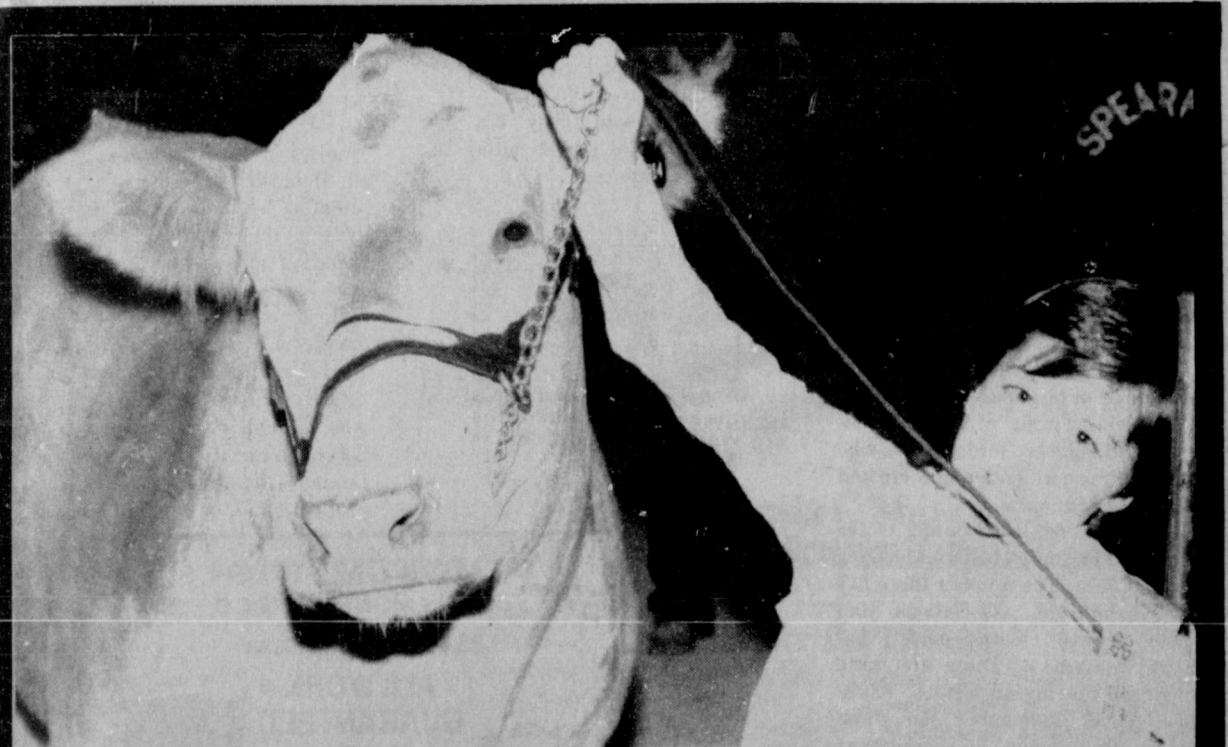

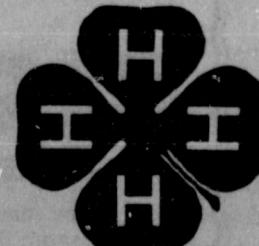
