Norwegian Folk Art Taught

This has been a busy week at Mrs. Major Lackey's art studio and shop as

some 35 local and area students have been receiving professional instruction from one of the most sought after Rosemalers in the nation. Pat Virch of Marquette, Michigan has been teaching day-and-night classes Monday through Saturday.

As a native of Wisconsin, Pat Virch early in life became interested in the revival of the folk arts in that state. She studied Rosemaling avidly for a span of ten years and did much research and study with professional painters of this old folk art. She studied under Sigmund Aarseth and Nils Ellinggard of Oslo, Norway and has attended workshops under the auspices of the Norwegian-American Museum, Decorah, Iowa. Selected pieces of Mrs. Virch's Rosemaling have been accepted and awarded at the three successive National Rosemaling Exhibitions conducted by the Norwegian-American Museum.

She has been teaching and lecturing on the folk arts since 1963. Her students now reside as far as Puerto Rico to Japan and from Spearman Texas to Alaska.

She has also authored several articles on Norwegian Rosemaling in various issues of craft magazines and will have an article in the coming June issue of the American Home Magazine.

Mrs. Major Lackey is to be commended for securing this artist for a week of classes in Spearman. Students deem it a great honor and privilege to have had this opportunity. Higher clothing costs are due more to labor cost increases than to increased costs for energy and petroleum, Mrs. Becky Culp, area clothing specialist with the Texas Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, points out.

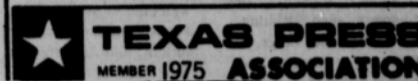

"OPERATING LOSS" AND FARM TAXES---Due to severe price drops in the cattle and cotton markets in 1974, farmers and ranchers who suffered a "net operating loss" may be able to get some income tax relief on income previously earned. The Internal Revenue Service has special provisions for such losses, according to an economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The loss is carried back three years and applied against the taxable income of that year. If the taxable income of that year was not sufficient to offset the operating loss, the remaining loss is applied against the income of the second preceding year, and so on. If a loss still remains, it can be carried forward to each of the next five years.

The worst is over... probably. Statements like this have become the most common hedge in the cattle industry in the past few weeks as top executives of the beef business find reason to be cautiously optimistic in the face of rising per capita consumption and a decrease in the industry's number one problem, glut. Caused by a combination of price controls, natural cattle cycle (cattle population reaches a cyclical peak every 10-11 years) and high feed prices, glut (over-supply) seemed for a while to be unending. Consumers are solving the problem by buying more beef and accepting grass-fed meat. Packers buying grass-fed cattle have to use 2 or 3 of the young pasture-led cattle to produce as much meat as a single grain-fed animal. So the problem seems to be solving itself, but even the optimistic cattlemen (not the easiest thing to find) say it will take at least 18 months before the industry is back to normal.

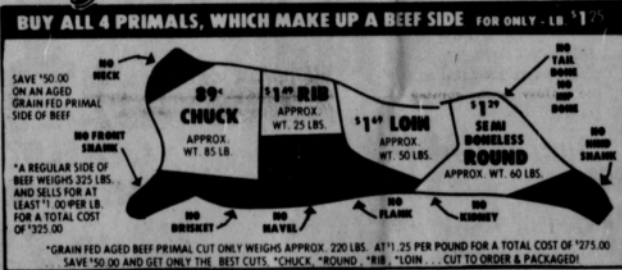
