AGCO makes donation

Fire Department to repair old fire truck

The Spearman Fire Department, always ready to upgrade their service, has taken on a new project for the city and county. They have purchased a 1979 fire truck and are planning to equip and repair the truck to be used to fight grass fires, according to Harley McCubbin, local fireman. Harley stated they purchased a 1979 Ford Truck and Chassis for \$1,000.00 with existing funds and a donation from AGCO. The truck needs some minor work done on it. They also intend to mount a 1680 gal. tank with a 500 GPM pump on it. Harley said it will take approximately \$5,000 to do

all this work to put the truck in service. They feel this was a bargain purchase. A new truck equipped this way would cost approximately \$30,000. This vehicle when in service will triple their fire fighting capacity. Instead of the 1 minute full pumping capacity they now have available, this will give them 3 1/2 minutes full pumping capacity. They hope to have this vehicle in service in about 90 days. Harley stated this all depended on finances available. Harley said they welcome and would appreciate donations from the residents of Spearman. These donations are tax deductible.

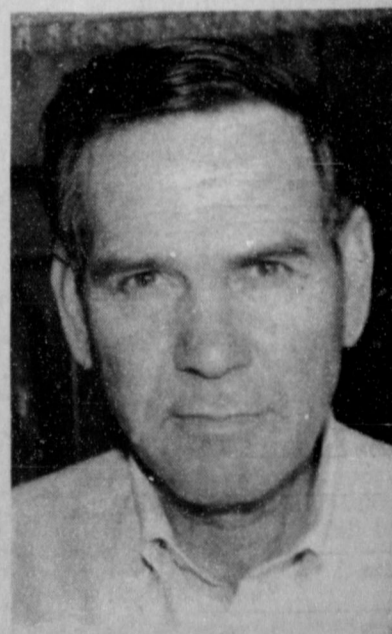
Orville Brummatt

Mr. Brummatt stated that it is possible to catch AIDS in Spearman. When asked if "people should be quarantined" he said; "taking everything into consideration, about the mode of transmission of the disease, and in the best interest of public safety, Yes." He felt the general public should be fully educated about the disease to remove any fear and anxiety they may have. He is hoping that a cure for the disease will be found shortly.

Evelyn says "I think it is impossible to catch the disease of AIDS in Spearman." She also said "she had very little or no concern about her grandchildren attending school with anyone that had the disease; because the possibility of contacting the disease, is somewhere between 0 and 1,000." Those that have the disease "should not be quarantined." She does feel that the general public should be fully educated about the disease.



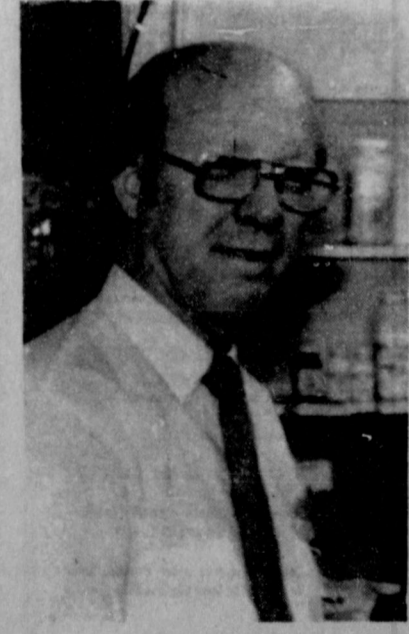
Oscar Donnell

Mr. Donnell stated that he did not know enough about the disease to make a judgement about quarantining. He said, "from what I have heard about the disease, it may be possible to catch the disease in Spearman." Donnell feels that the public should be fully educated about AIDS, and hopes that a cure will be found shortly. He feels that the general public should be taught especially about the prevention of the disease.



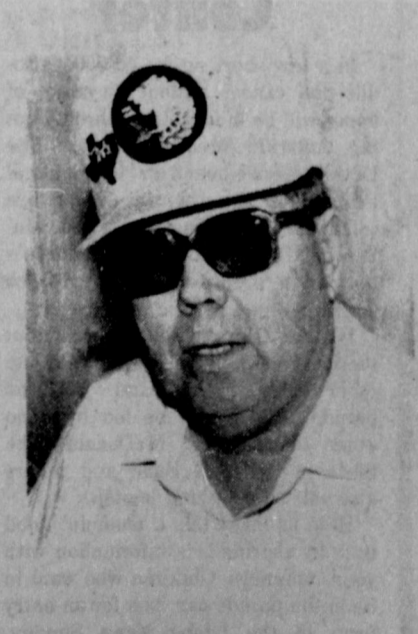
Sharon Bailey

Mrs. Bailey says "I do not believe people with AIDS should be allowed to associate with the public. AIDS can be transmitted by blood transfusions, as well as sexual perversion." In the best interest of the public, she believes most carriers of the disease should be quarantined. She also feels the public should be fully informed about the disease and methods of transmission, as there is no known cure at this time. The public should use any manner of prevention available. Abstinence is the best method. "Yes it is possible to catch AIDS in Spearman."

Mr. Evans says "I do not believe people with AIDS should be quarantined." Jim went ahead to say that "All I have read concerning AIDS indicates that it is transmitted through body fluids, blood, saliva, and tears." He believes that the public should be informed fully about the disease to remove their fear and concern, as there is no cure at this time. He hopes that a cure will be found soon. Jim stated that it is possible to catch AIDS in Spearman.

Yes, I think you can catch Aids in Spearman. It is more severe than Leprosy. That is, you do not die with leprosy. There are several ways to catch Aids. Dope addicts can transmit the aids disease with dirty needles; homosexuals can transmit the disease; and the disease can be transmitted by blood transfusions. Heterosexuals are no longer safe from the aids trauma. I do think the victims should be separated from the public, although this is a touchy subject. It is possible to carry aids in your system for 10 years before it becomes active enough to kill you!

Farm Crisis Study

Farm Crisis Study
Spearman businesses, chosen as part of a larger study of the effects of the farm crisis by researchers from the Department of Rural Sociology at Texas A&M University in College Station, were visited last week for the second time by researcher, Jim Thomas. Jim was in town to pick up the completed survey forms from the Spearman business owners and operators. Many surveys were ready, completed and waiting for him when he arrived. But a number of the forms he left to be filled out had been put out-of-sight and out-of-mind! Jim asks these business owners and operators to complete the survey and return it to A&M as soon as possible. He would like to stress that "the information provided by Spearman business is critical to the study effort and will be kept strictly confidential; we really appreciate the time, effort and cooperation of the business people in this community." He also adds that if you are (or were) a business owner or operator in Spearman and have not received a survey form, please call the Department of Rural Sociology, collect, and ask that a form be mailed to you. Mammograms Screening

MOBIL BREAST IMAGING CENTER (MBIC) to visit Hansford Hospital on Tuesday, March 17th. Area women will have an opportunity to have screening mammograms performed at a reduced fee of \$60.00 (regular cost is \$127.70.), which is more than one-half savings from the regular charge. The \$60.00 charge reflects the cost of leasing the Mobil Breast Imaging Center, Radiologist fees and supplies. This fee is due in full at the hospital business office prior to the test being done. It is recommended individuals wishing to have this test performed, contact their physician if they have questions or concerns about the need for the test. Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor:
One of the most controversial issues facing the Texas Legislature this year is tort reform, the movement to reform our state's civil justice system. It is interesting to examine the players on either side of the issue and their motivations. Their names are surprisingly similar. The Texas Civil Justice League, umbrella organization for lawsuit reform, is comprised of 80 trade and professional associations, 110 businesses and more than 300 cities including the City of Spearman. Together, these groups represent the interests of hundreds of thousands of Texans. The TCJL probably represents the largest, most diverse coalition ever assembled for purposes of passing legislation in Texas. Its members are concerned about correcting what they call the imbalance in our civil justice system. The president of the TCJL is

J. P. Word, a former Texas senator and presently executive director of the Consulting Engineers Council of Texas. The other side is Texans for Civil Justice. It represents a small, but powerful, organization called the Texas Trial Lawyers Association. The TTLA is comprised of 4,500 attorneys who primarily make a living representing plaintiffs in civil cases, in most cases collecting 30-50 percent of the jury award as payment. The executive director of Texans for Civil Justice is Billy Rogers, a political operative who formerly helped run the Walter Mondale campaign in Texas. Both names sound alike. Their goals and membership could not be more different. This information may help you as you read about the opposing groups in the coming weeks and months. Sincerely, **Burl Buchanan Alderman**

NEW CRITERIA

The Secretary of Agriculture has approved new criteria for use in defining highly erodible land for the Conservation Reserve Program signup February 9 - 27. Any land that was eligible in 1986 will be eligible in 1987. That includes land that is in Land Capability Class VI, VII, or VIII, and was farmed two years between 1981 and 1985 to an annual crop or alfalfa and certain other multiyear grasses and legumes. Cropland in Class II through V is eligible if it was farmed two or more years between 1981 and 1985, has both an erosion index of 8 or greater and had an erosion rate greater than that recommended by the Soil Conservation Service Field Office Technical Guide. An erosion Index of 8 identifies an area of land that has the potential to erode at more than 8 times the rate at which soil can maintain continued productivity. The February signup will be used to accept applications for both 1987 and 1988 contracts. Farmers who have small grain growing on their land face another dilemma. If they harvest the grain, they will not be able to place land in the CPR until 1988 but the crop would probably qualify for dead tiller cover if bid into the 1987 program. To stay eligible for farm program benefits, highly erodible land will need a conservation plan by January 1, 1990 and planned conservation practices will need to be completed by 1995. 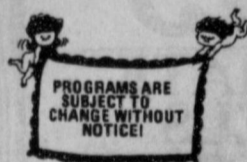

"No Pain, No Gain"

It used to be "no pain, no gain", but more and more fitness experts are re-writing the rules. Today's words to the wise are, "Train, don't strain." There is a full-scale fitness revolution going on. People are exercising smarter, NOT harder.

It's called "low-impact" aerobics and it emphasizes upper body exercises and marching-type steps with one foot always on the floor. It exercises the whole body instead of so much emphasis on the lower body with jogging and hopping. A more moderate approach to fitness will help people already involved in exercise avoid injury and enjoy their exercise for many years to come, and for sedentary types never caught up in the fitness movement, low-impact aerobics is an excellent place to start.

There is room in the Y's low-impact aerobics class for you! This class is effective for all people who exercise - beginners through advanced. It has no jumping jacks, high jogs, etc. - nothing to excessively jar the feet, ankles, and knees. The heart rate stays high enough to burn fat for fuel and strengthen the heart and lungs. The heart rate is carefully monitored during the entire class. The class is especially good for older students, the overweight, the beginner, exercisers with joint problems or shin splint

tendencies, and people who want to add more exercise classes a week without increasing the chance of injury.

These coed classes are held on Wednesdays and Fridays from 5:15 to 6:00. They are taught by Wanda Archer, who is certified both by the National Y.M.C.A. and National Dance Exercise Instructors' Training Association. She holds a current C.P.R. card. The first week of each month, body fat percentage is measured with calipers and body measurements are taken. A file is kept of these to let the students know how much they are progressing.

There is a brand new routine beginning Wednesday, February 25th, using exercise rubber bands during arms, legs, thighs, and buttocks exercises. These add intense resistance and are excellent at toning all the muscles in these areas. Each student who wants to use them may purchase bands (2 are needed) for \$3.00. This new routine has several aerobic segments which are easy to learn and are vigorous workouts.
