## Corps of Engineers review . . .

# Lake project approved

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in a Washington review of their proposal for a Palo Duro Creek lake took the unprecedented step last week of approving a water project

with a pipeline system to supply water to communities for municipal use.

Action by the Corps was without precedent because the federal agency has never built a water project with a conveyance system, explains Johnnie Lee of Spearman, general manager of the Palo Duro River Authority.

The PDRA executive was in Tulsa, Okla., on Wednesday to meet with district Corps officials and determine the impact of the decision on the project.

The Washington decision apparently gives the Tulsa office authority to continue with its planning study on the project. The approval was for an interim report, published in January, 1983.

Construction of the dam and water supply system by the federal agency is one of two routes for the Palo Duro Lake.

The other is a privately-financed project by the

Palo Duro River Authority, which is composed of Moore and Hansford counties. Its member cities, and future water customers, include Dumas, Sunray, Cactus, Gruver, Spearman and Stinnett.

A lake to supply the municipalities with water would be built at the junction of the Palo Duro and Horse creeks, northwest of Spearman, under both plans.

"The Corps of Engineers study is for a lake twice the size of what we propose," explains Lee. "It will include provisions for flood control while the PDRA project does not."

Another difference between the two projects is its administration. If built with PDRA and state funds, the water authority would retain control of the lake and the surrounding recreation areas.

If built with federal funds, the lake would be administered by the Corps and would sell water to the PDRA.

The PDRA project proposes a lake of 60,000 acre feet of water, at a cost of approximately \$53 million - an estimate which also includes the water purification plant and a supply pipeline.

The Corps of Engineers project is designed around a 170-foot tall dam which would impound a lake with 2,122 surface acres. Cost is estimated at \$130 million.

"I'm in Tulsa to determine what this means to us," he reports. "The Corps has never stepped out of the project even though the river authority is looking in another direction to build and finance the water project."

The PDRA general manager believes that the Washington decision during a review last week came because "they realized that the Ogallala underground water for-

mation is being depleted and we are going to need a water supply."

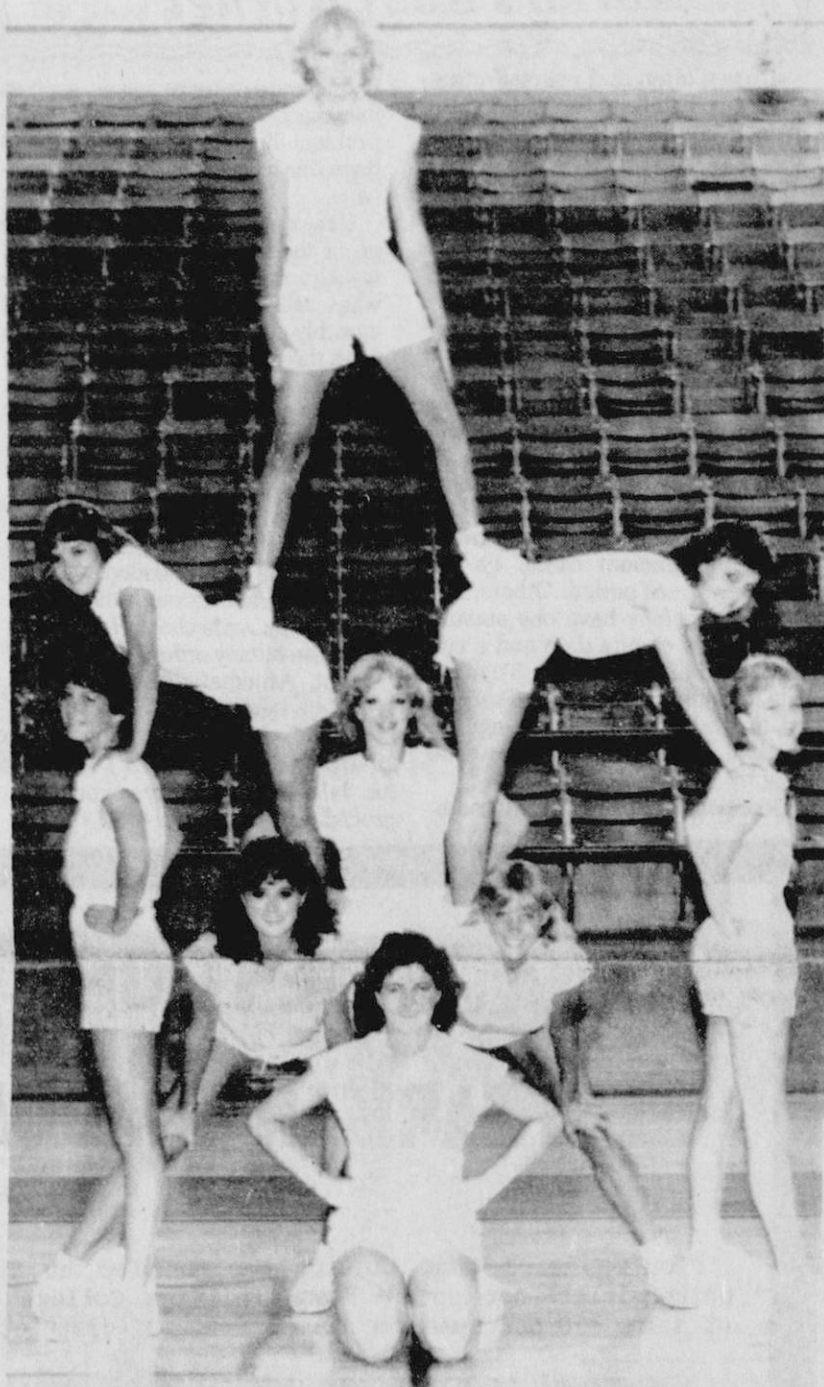
He points out that this is the first time the Corps of Engineers has approved a project with a municipal water supply system.

In another development this week, Lee learned a hitch may have developed that would hold up Texas water development funds of \$15 million earmarked for the North Plains project.

"The funds we anticipated apparently were diverted to another project by an amendment on a legislative bill, passed the last day of the 69th session," he reports.

State water board officials informed Lee of the apparent delay Monday.

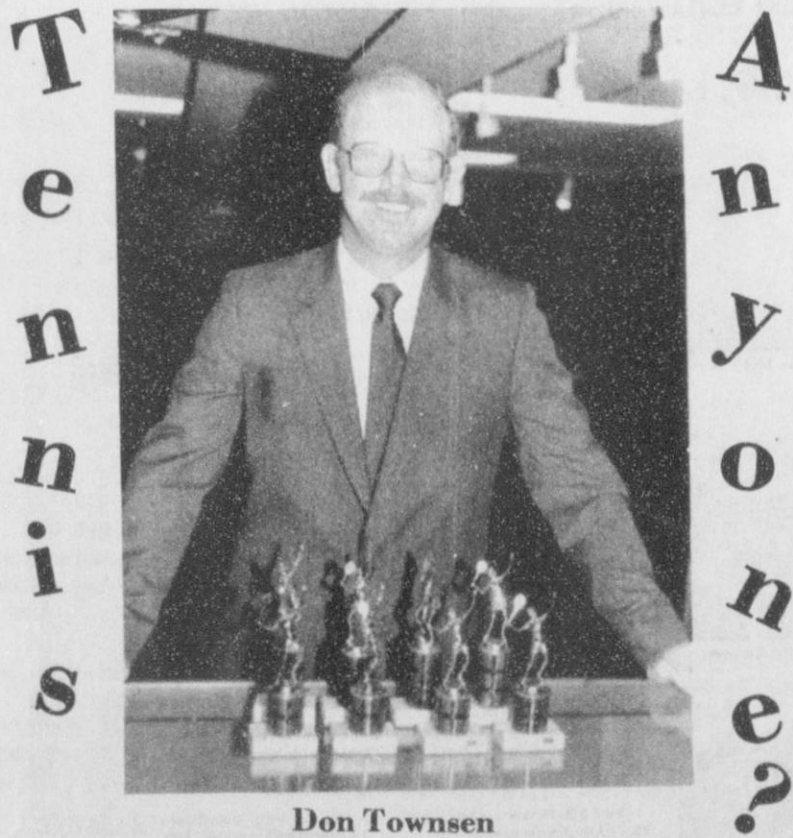
"I will meet Monday with state water development board," Lee declares. "I don't know the facts yet or how it will affect our project."


Also receiving a Spirit Stick was the squad from Hugoton, Kansas.

## July is hot



Do you often find yourself struggling to pay bills at the last minute, paying late fees or receiving past-due notices? If so, you may need a system for knowing when bills are due.

One method is to keep track of payment dates on a calendar or home computer. As the bills arrive each month, record the due date and the amount to be paid.

On some bills, you'll need to calculate the due date from the billing date. If your payment doesn't arrive prior to the due date, then you may have to pay additional interest.

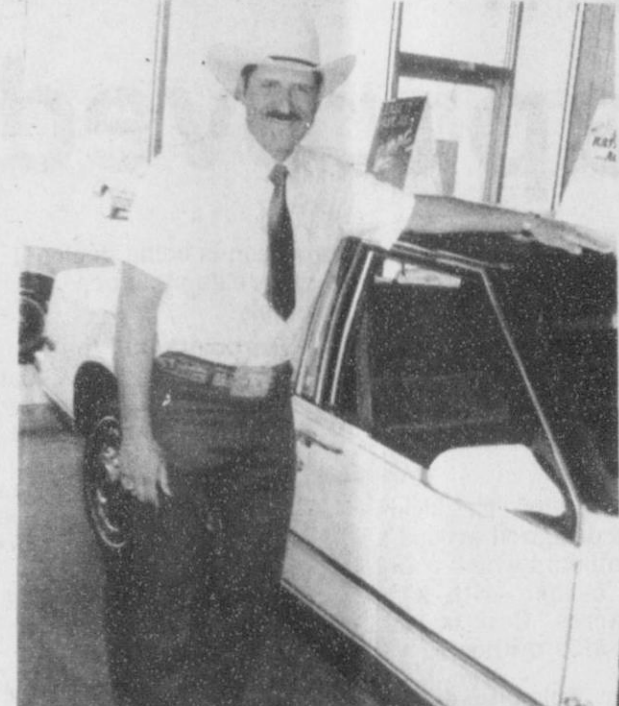
Many bills, such as some travel and entertainment cards, do not have any grace period. Others, like utility bills, may have one amount if paid by a certain date and a late fee if paid after that date. To avoid late fees and possibly being reported to the credit reporting agency for late payment, always pay the bills by the due date.

Occasional expenses that come in only once or twice a year, such as insurance and taxes, can be a problem if plans are not made to have this money available in advance.

Use your calendar or computer to go in the habit of planning ahead weekly, monthly and yearly to see what bills are due. If you mail monthly payments, you will need to send the money ahead to get there on time and avoid late charges.

Make a notation on your calendar about occasional bills that will be due in each of the coming months. To have the money ready, you may want to set aside an amount each month so that the total amount will be available when needed.

Sending cash through the mail is risky. If you write checks for bills or purchase money orders, you'll have receipt. Automatic bill paying offered by banks is another method of paying bills. Traveling from place to place to drop off payments for bills may a very expensive procedure.

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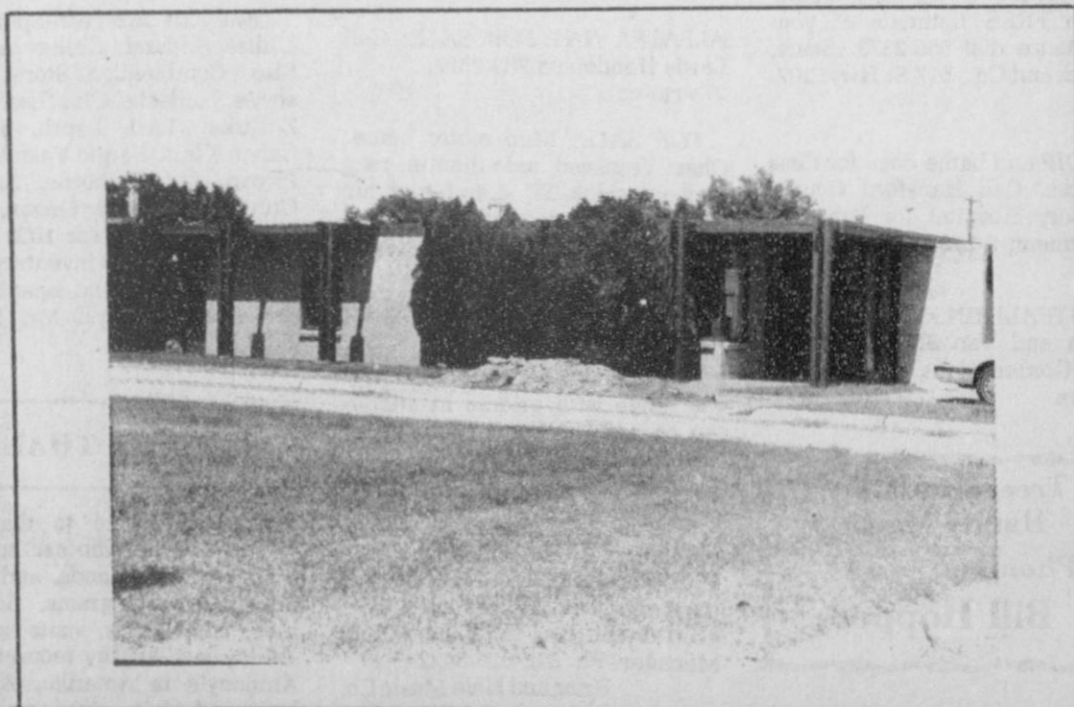

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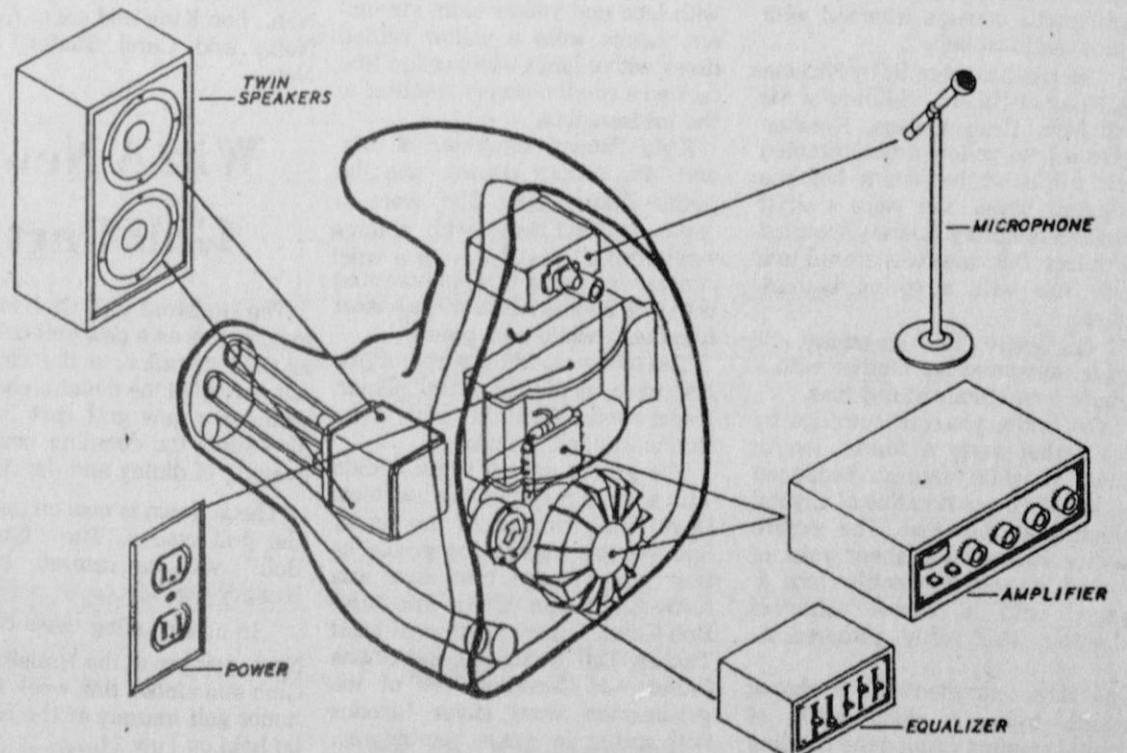
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## Hall - Dettmann Exchange vows

A horse's soundness is directly linked to its nutritional program, says Kenneth Slough of Double 'D' Fertilizer & Feed in Gruver.

"To stay in good, sound physical condition, a horse must receive a nutritionally well-balanced diet including the right amounts of important minerals, particularly calcium and phosphorus. And these minerals must be in the right proportion, too," Slough says.

Young horses that are fed inadequate amounts of calcium and phosphorus or an improper calcium-phosphorus ratio are candidates for abnormal bone development problems, Slough added. "If there is an inadequate supply or improper ratio of calcium and phosphorus, there is reduced bone mineralization. The less dense bone is susceptible to damage. Inflammation, tenderness and possibly lameness and permanent damage can result."

Horses fed raw grains, which are essentially devoid of calcium, are especially susceptible. Grain mixes with minerals added can also cause problems when the calcium-phosphorus ratio is inappropriate to the horse's stage of growth.

The generally accepted minimum calcium-phosphorus ratio is 1:1. A feed with a 1:1 ratio, such as Purina's Omolene #300, for example, is an excellent choice for young stock. However, if a horse owner cuts that with raw grain, which contains phosphorus but very little calcium, the ratio will drop below 1:1, he said.

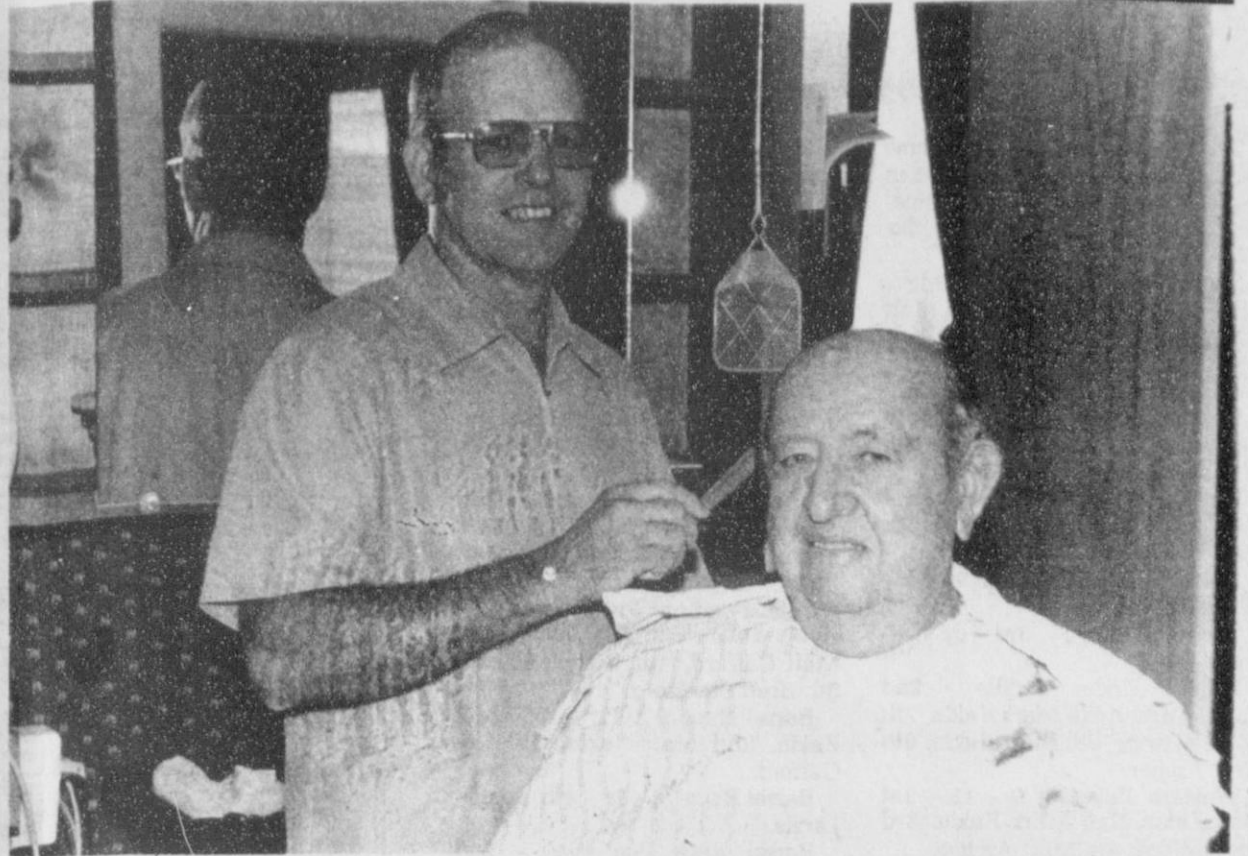
