Tax Exemption Of Farming & Ranching Implements

Effective January 1, 1982, implements of farming and ranching are exempt from ad valorem taxation if owned by an individual who uses them in the production of farm or ranch products. The property must be individually owned; corporate or partnership ownership will not qualify. This exemption must be applied for annually with the chief appraiser of the Hansford County Appraisal District.

The attorney general has been asked to issue an opinion on several points concerning these exemptions, some of

(1) Should the term "imple-

to include any and all types of equipment or machinery that could be used in an agricultural environment? (2) Would vehicles utilized such as trucks and trailers, be included in the exemp-

(3) Would equipment used to obtain water from wells or for irrigation be exempt? (4) Would the term "individ ual" as used in the amend ment be limited or defined to include only persons in

the agricultural business that have sole or complete ownership of all the property necessary for pursuit of said business?

(5) Would an individual or single person who has incorporated be entitled to an exemption?

(6) Would a partnership of any nature, including family partnerships, be excluded from the benefits of this exemption?

When the attorney general issues his opinion clarifying the intentions of the legislature to exempt implements of farming and ranching, the chief appraiser will then allow all ments' be construed so as exemptions, according to law, on all valid applications. Individuals need to render their implements to the chief appraiser and file an application for exemption before May 1 to in agricultural products, be assured of receiving the allowable exemptions.

Jack Ritter bought his ranch near Clarendon three years ago with the expressed purpose of putting wild game on it. Since that time he has stocked the rugged area in the Southeastern Panhandle with elk, axis deer, sika deer, aoudad sheep, mouflon sheep, ostriches, and has struck a deal with the San Diego zoo to breed Marquar sheep and Corsican tur ibex. The breeding-loan program with the zoo will also enable him to bring in eland and sable.

The other game farm is owned by Pampa rancher John Lee Bell, and is located northeast of Clarendon. On the reserve are European Red Deer and the Fallow deer of England; Corsican Mouflon sheep; ostriches; African Eland, a 2000 pound antelope; a twelve-point Red Deer buck; Aoudad sheep imported from the Mediterranean; Catalina goats; white Fallow deer; Japanese Sike Deer; a tiny Sicilian donkey; South American llama; and the Axis deer of India; a small herd of American bison and the Texas Longhorn; squirrels; wild turkeys; quail; and several Emus.

Evidently these game preserves are not open to the public, although Bell cordially allows school children and ag students from nearby high schools and colleges to view the animals.

I had no idea anything like this existed any closer to us than Dallas and found the articles very interesting.



WASH., D.C., Dec. 4 --When Mary Kay Mitchell Sophie to see plays and to eat received a call asking if she in restaurants. Sophie also could take in a Danish exchange student, she said yes-but only for a couple of weeks. With five children of their own, the Mitchells already had a full house. Although the Morans have no children of their own, "we've got a big house with lots of room, and we wanted to share it." Mr. Moran, a detective with an urban police department, read a newspaper article about YFU. He called the organization "and a week later we had a student.
