Perryton High School has a new principal and the local High School is looking for one. Thursday morning Kenneth McKay notified Superintendent James Cunningham that he had accepted the position of High School Principal at Perryton.

Mr. McKay has served as high school principal in Spearman for the past nine years. He moved here and assumed duties on August 1, 1966, coming from a similar position in the Strinnet Independent School District where he has served eleven years. He was employed by the Spearman Board of Education upon the recommendation of former superintendent, Dr. B. E. Reeves.

Mr. McKay received a B. S. degree from West Texas State University in 1963 and a Master of Education in 1960. In 1965 he received an M. A. Degree in the Ivy League from Brown University in Providence, Rhode Island. Throughout his tenure here he continued to keep abreast of changes in the educational profession by attendance at various universities across the United States. In addition

he attended Oklahoma University, the University of Massachusetts, Claremont Mens' College, Baylor University School of Law and Appalachian State University. During the summer of 1974 he was selected as one of 400 national educators to attend the I. D. E. A. Seminar on Improving the secondary school, which was held at Stephens College, Columbia, Missouri.

Mr. McKay, his wife Dorothy, and their four children, Susan, Steve, Patrick, and James will be moving to Perryton sometime after July 1. In his letter of resignation Mr. McKay summed up his views by stating: "I wish to express my appreciation to the Superintendent and the many fine Board Members with whom I have been privileged to work. You have always employed personnel of the highest caliber and you have always offered the highest quality of educational opportunity for the pupils of the district. I am sure that you will continue to maintain this standard."

City Must Replace All Traffic Signs

In their regular city meeting held Tuesday evening, the council appointed Alderman Jackson and Nicholson as the new representatives to the P. R. P. C. (Panhandle Regional Planning Commission). These two men will be serving in this important position for the term of one year. A new member was appointed to the board of equalization for the city of Spearman, and he is Jimmy Shieldlight, well-known local car dealer of Spearman. The council approved the recommendations of the

state on all sign replacements for the city of Spearman (traffic signs). There will have to be 400 of the signs replaced, and they are now being made-up at the state prison. The signs will be put up in the city as soon as they become available. The council discussed the tapping fee for sewage at the Golden Circle Development, located on the Borger HiWay. This was tabled for the next meeting. The removal of all metal at the dump ground was discussed, and it was tabled for a later discussion.

City manager Ed Thompson went ahead to say that congress has not passed or approved any funds for youth employment, but that the city was still working several local youths, and the council and this newspaper agree that this is the proper procedure. Fire marshal Smokey Littlejohn reported that he is working up a cadet program for the city of Spearman. The fire dept. is also equipping a truck for emergency use, by fixing up a used truck. This truck will be used for emergency use, such as fires,

etc., in the city. The lab facilities at sewer plant were discussed at the city meeting. The city is cautiously approaching these requirements, but are taking the proper steps to keep their sewer facilities qualified and meeting state requirements. Jack Oakes met with the council to request the closing of 12th street. This will be decided at the next city meeting.

Texas Legislative Report

In the next to the last week of the Legislature, most of the week was spent on consideration and debate of the House Appropriations Bill. The House Appropriations Bill requires a tremendous amount of time and study.

The Legislative Budget Board of the State of Texas starts planning for the budget process well before the Legislature meets each session. The LBB is charged with the responsibility of investigating needs, evaluating requests and making recommendations for the budget for each and every state agency including the Judiciary and institutions of higher learning. The LBB's report containing its evaluation and recommendations is then presented to the Legislature and is then considered by the House Appropriations Committee.

The House Appropriations Committee, which is chaired this year by Rep. Bill Preshal from Bryan, spent over 600 hours of actual time in committee hearings, both public and formal. Each agency of the state sends its representatives to appear before the Appropriations Committee in connection with its request for funds with which to operate for the next biennium. The group seeking funding must be prepared to present all of the pertinent facts to justify their requests and be prepared to submit to questions by the committee members.

After hearing all the formal testimony and after formal hearing all of the testimony and after formal hearings and investigation and evaluation by staff personnel, the committee comes out with the Appropriations Bill which is about the size of a Dallas telephone book and contains all of the appropriations for all agencies. The findings by the Appropriations Committee as to financial need of the various agencies are critical to the organization involved. The only method by which the appropriations can be changed is by amendment to the Appropriations Bill on the Floor of the House of Representatives or on the Floor of the Senate. Also, the bill is subject to reduction by amendment. Much of the time spent in debate is on amendments which either add to or reduce expenditures.

Unless the Senate concurs in all of the various amendments made to the Appropriations Bill, then a Conference Committee composed of an equal number of members of the House of Representatives and the Senate will be appointed to adjust the differences. After the Conference Committee has made its report to both Houses and it is approved, and the bill has been approved by the Governor, it becomes a law of this state until the next legislative session. 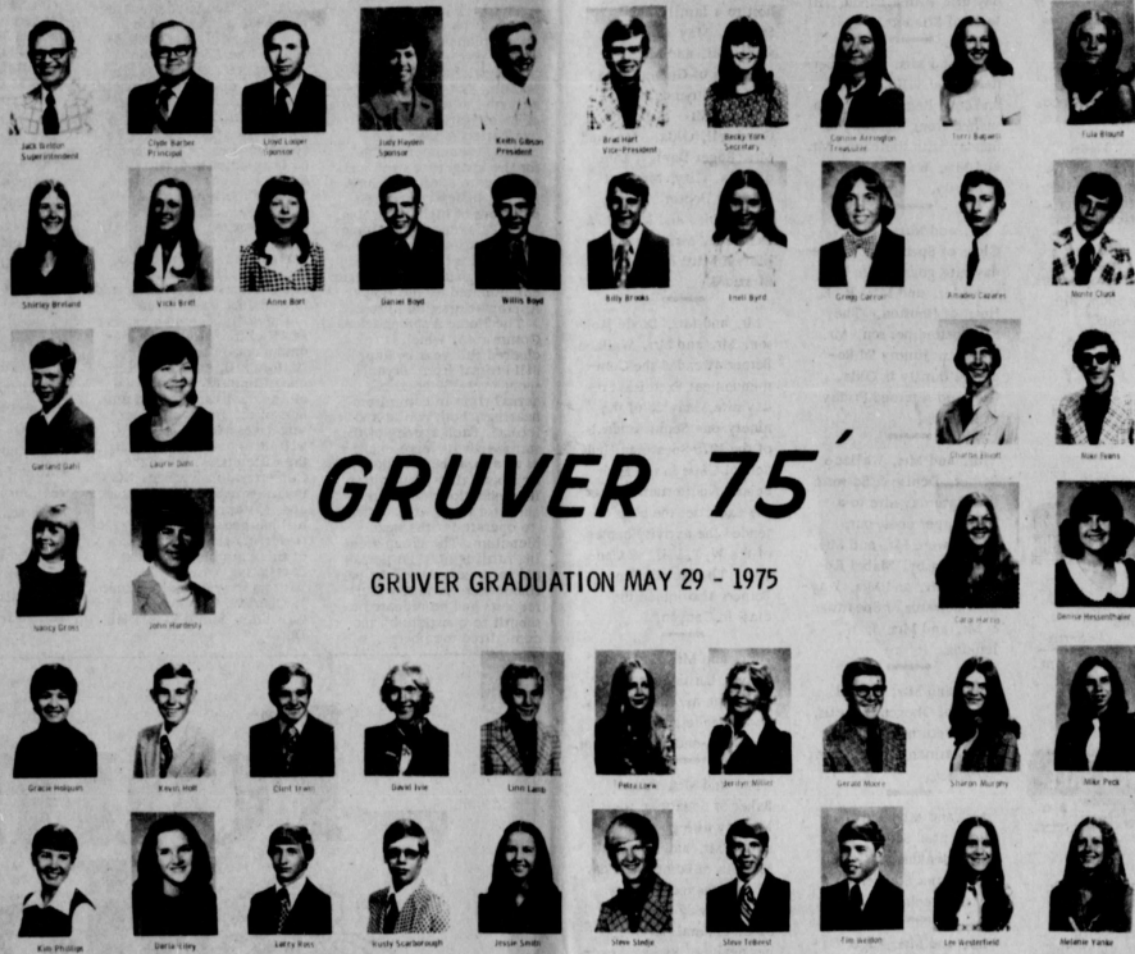

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house on the ground floor. At least get under a table or other protective covering to avoid injury from falling debris.

--Avoid buildings having large and relatively lightly anchored roofs, such as auditoriums and gymnasiums.

--In open country, move at right angles to the tornado's path. Lie flat in the nearest ditch, ravine or other depression if trapped.

--No matter what, don't stay in an automobile.

--Anchor or tie down mobile homes, frequently victims of the worst damage.

--Keep a battery-operated radio on hand for the latest advisories.

--High winds cause the most damage by pushing in walls and windows and tearing off roofs. Flying debris is also deadly.

If property is damaged, Smith says the TIAA suggests: --Make necessary temporary repairs, keeping a record of costs for the insurance adjuster and for tax

purposes.

--Deal only with a reputable contractor for a loss estimate or for repairs.

--Let your insurance agent or company representative know if you must move into temporary quarters.

--Be prepared with an inventory of damaged personal property (such as furnishings, clothing and jewelry) to speed the claim processing.

Methodist Annual Conference Set

LUBBOCK, Tex.--Election of lay and clergy delegates to the 1976 General Conference and announcing of pastoral appointments will be the major items of business at the Northwest Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church here June 3-6.

Bishop Albie H. Carleton, bishop of both the Northwest Texas and New Mexico conferences, will call the Conference into session Tuesday morning, June 3, at First United Methodist Church.

Appointments will be read Tuesday evening by Bishop Carleton. Dr. Sam Nader, pastor of the host church and Dr. Clifford Trotter, District Superintendent of the Lubbock District, will welcome all pastors, delegates and fami-

lies to the Annual Conference.

An equal number of lay and clergy delegates will be chosen by secret ballot to attend the General Conference in Portland, Oregon. The delegates will consider petitions for legislation to be brought before the world-wide body of 10,000,000 members in the United States. In addition, the Northwest Texas Conference will choose delegates to the 1976 Jurisdictional Conference in Lincoln, Neb.

Dr. D. L. Dykes, Jr., pastor of the First United Methodist Church in Shreveport, La., since 1955, will be the conference preacher for the 66th session.

A native of Pleasant Hill, La., Dr. Dykes did

his undergraduate work at Cemenary College, and after graduate work at Southern Methodist University, he received his seminary degree from Chandler School of Theology at Emory University.

He was awarded the D. D. degree from Cemenary in 1952. His 20-year pastorate in Shreveport is one of the longest in Methodism. Dr. Dykes will preach five times during the conference sessions, including Wednesday and Thursday mornings and at three evening services on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday.

Business sessions will be held each morning and afternoon. The first session will hear reports from the Study Committee, Conference Nominating Committee and District Superintendents.

The first ballot for delegates to the General Conference is scheduled for Tuesday afternoon.

Peter Marshall Left No Will

The following article is from the weekly newsletter from the First United Methodist Church in Spearman, O. Abbott, Pastor.

Peter, to the surprise of all who had known him well, had left no will. Apparently, he had thought that since he possessed little other than insurance, making me the beneficiary of that took care of the situation. If only he had known how much it left to be taken care of! Yet, in thinking a will unimportant for those with a small or moderate estate, my husband was not unusual. I learned that an estimated 70% of American property owners die intestate.

The first business complication developed when Peter's checking account was frozen. All of the insurance policies were in a strong box at the bank. That box was immediately sealed by the bank under the Internal Revenue Department's regulations. It took three weeks of cutting red tape before even the insurance agent could get into the strong box to initiate the collection of death proceeds, as the insurance term has it.

Then I learned that, under District of Columbia law, when a man dies without a will after all the debts are paid, his widow receives one-third of his estate, his child or children, two-thirds.

It was necessary for me to appear in probate court to post an expensive bond and to be made administratrix of Peter's affairs. Everything thereafter came under the jurisdiction of this court. Not even the funeral expenses, doctor or hospital bills, nor ordinary household expenses could be paid until the court passed on them.

Following this, some of my husband's possessions had to be appraised--his car, his stamp collection, a few power tools. The appraisal of something like a stamp collection is a highly technical matter. It has to be handled by men who know the value of stamps. But all appraisers had either to be appointed by the probate court or specifically approved by them. Such appraisal can be time consuming and costly.

It seemed that almost daily, everywhere I turned, legal proof of my husband's death was required. Finally I had a whole sheaf of photostats of his death certificate made. To the uninitiated in grief, this may seem like a small matter. Still it scarcely has a soothing effect on the bereaved.

Then came the day when I had to reappear in probate court to be made Peter John's guardian. Since then, I have been required to give a detailed financial accounting of my guardianship to the court every year. This will go on until my son becomes of age. Each year the account figures must be sworn to before a notary public. Each year a fee must be paid to the office of register of wills for the accounting.

The amount of cash in Peter's checking account at the time of his death was not large. Yet by the time the final accounting was made to the probate court, almost every cent of that original sum was drained away in legal and court costs.

When I discovered the amazing amount of red tape involved even with such a small estate, I almost ran to a lawyer to get help in making a will of my own. Not only that, but I began urging my parents and close friends to consider the same move. Though in my case there was little to leave to anyone, I reasoned that the tiny sum involved in making a will might some day save many times that amount in fees for dealing with quite unnecessary legal technicalities.

Of course, Peter had no idea of all of this. Yet some of his close friends were lawyers. And often he himself had been called on to help the recently bereaved in practical matters as well as spiritual ones. I marveled that he had never even once encountered some other widow entangled in the same difficulties with which I was wrestling.

Tornado Readiness Vitally Important

The month of May is one of the worst for tornadoes in a season that normally lasts in Texas from February through June. But the destructive winds don't necessarily follow the rules or the calendar, and an insurance executive advises readiness at all times.

"Whenever and wherever a tornado is spotted, says J. O. (Jim) Smith, Jr., chairman of the Texas Insurance Advisory Association (TIAA), "immediate action can save lives and property."

Texas is a favorite resting spot for twisters -- and the penalty comes in lives and property lost. Companions in destruction are lightning, a frequent kill-

er, and flash floods. Last year in Texas there were 116 tornadoes, the lowest since 1966 but no guarantee there won't be this many or more in 1975. June and October were leading storm months.

Of several already this year, there has been considerable destruction and more deaths from tornadoes than all of last year. Tefors in the Panhandle and Yancey near San Antonio have felt nature's fury and nearly every area of the state has been under numerous watches.

"Last year was bad enough -- one only has to remember the wipe out of Xenia, Ohio -- but 1975 looks as grim, as the experience in Nebraska sug-

gests," Smith says. In 1974, there were nearly 1,000 tornadoes across the nation, causing more than \$1 billion in property damage.

In the first three months of this year, about 200 tornadoes have already caused problems nationally -- and this is more than twice what occurred in the same period of 1974.

"Knowing what to do before a tornado touches down can save lives and property," Smith says. "Knowing what to do after can reduce damage, too."

In a tornado or other high winds, Smith says the TIAA recommends:

-- Get in a bathroom or closet near the center of the

I will try to die myself from under this stack of letters in response to last week's article and ask the question, "Is Spearman ready in case of disaster?"

Let me review the City of Xenia, Ohio; a city of 27,000 people. On April 3, 1974, their city was struck by a tornado with winds up to 320 miles per hour. Its path varied in width from a 1/4 to 3/4 of a mile wide. Within this path, the destruction was from 80% to total. In approximately ten minutes, there were 33 dead, over 1,000 injured and 1,347 buildings destroyed. The phone system was essentially useless. They could not talk to incoming emergency units because they did not have compatible radio frequencies. They had not coordinated the police and Fire Departments, etc.

They developed several gas leaks. In some areas the air became so contaminated that they couldn't breathe, so a decision was made to turn off the supply to the entire city. Within two hours, they had no water supply because of losing large quantities of water. They were without water for 24 hours. Luckily, they had no serious fires during that time.

Both the hospital and sheriff's office had stand-by power plans, but both required water for cooling. Both failed when they lost water pressure. What would be the situation in Spearman if a large disaster occurred today? It doesn't have to be a tornado; it could be a flood, an explosion, or a toxic gas leak. Are we prepared? The Fire Department plays a major role in any disaster and must provide the planning and training to cope with that disaster. Don't say, "It can't happen." Prepare, plan, and practice until you can say, "If it happens today, we will be ready." Fire School begins Tuesday, June 3rd, 1975, open to anyone in Hansford County. At City Hall, 7 to 8 p.m. Smokey
