

Crowd braves cold for groundbreaking!

More than 100 persons representing Gruver and Spearman, braved cold sunlight and a chilling wind, Friday morning, to attend groundbreaking ceremonies for the new nursing home that will be an adjunct to Hansford Hospital.

Pre-program hot coffee and hot chocolate helped warm the audience for the ceremonies presided over by the Rev. Russell Pogue, pastor, First

Baptist Church, Spearman, who has been one of the prevailing powers in pushing the project-backed by every member of the ministerial alliances and their respective congregations.

Following the Invocation by the Rev. David Nuckels, pastor, First Assembly of God Church, Spearman, Rev. Pogue introduced Mayor Ralph Blodgett as the first speaker, noting that

Blodgett had been active in advance medical care in the county since 1951.

Blodgett, in turn, lauded Josie Hayes for her efforts in the same cause back in that era and said he felt the accomplishment of the completion of the structure being started was due to her untiring efforts. In recalling that the beginning effort was 30 years ago, the mayor noted that he was just about eligible as a resident for wing wing of the new facility.

He concluded his remarks in this wise...

"I am the eternal optimist. I knew this day was coming."

Gruver Mayor J.C. Harris was introduced for the response to Blodgett's speech of welcome and encouragement. Very skillfully in a humorous vein, Mayor Harris pictured the cooperation of the citizens of the two Hansford County cities in bringing the nursing home facility to the groundbreaking stage.

Various other officials—the county judge, hospital board chairman and his panel members, county commissioners, doctors of the community and

the director of nursing for Hansford Hospital—and the entire Gruver contingent were recognized by M.C. Rev. Pogue.

Then Hansford Hospital Administrator Mark Hardin was introduced with the notation that, though tenure had been brief thus far, the burden of the future of the nursing home facility for which ground was being broken, would rest on his shoulders.

A part of the program was audience participation songs and solos by Glenn Harris who

led the "community sing" also. The program was climaxed the officialdom involved turning turf in front of the reviewing stand with "golden" shovels.

Following a Benediction by the Rev. Larry Miller, pastor, First Baptist Church, Gruver, the audience dissolved into groups clustered around the warm coffee and chocolate or headed for transportation to warmer places.

Trailer houses that will be the headquarters for construction personnel are in place and the groundbreaking, Friday, was

more than symbolic in that it marked the actual beginning of construction on the new facility.

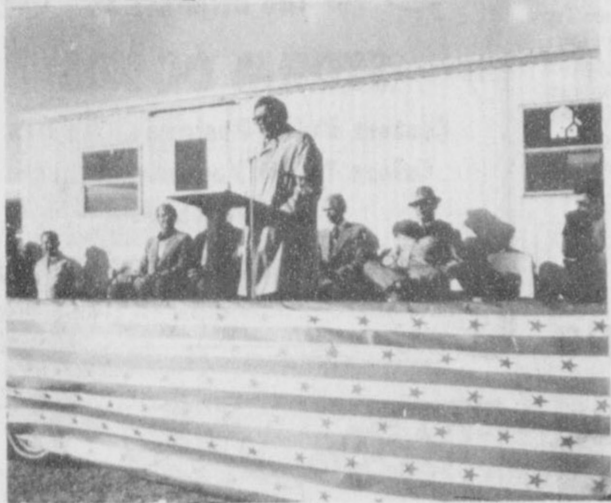
Back in July at the hospital board meeting when bonds were sold, Oct. 1, was the designated date for start of construction by the government agency involved with the grants and compliances involving the facility.

However, Administrator Hardin pointed out in his remarks at the groundbreaking, the inroads made into funds produced by bond sales demanded so many adjustments that the start

of construction had been pushed forward to this date.

Not a part of the groundbreaking ceremonies but a part of informal group conversations before and after, persons knowledgeable about such construction observed the delay was probably a blessing in that an October starting date would surely have seen some delays—or at least some hazards—in pouring concrete in the midst of winter's cold.

With the new date to start, there is apparently clear sailing for the work ahead.

Gaskamp New Pastor

Pastor Gaskamp is the first ordained minister at Faith congregation on a full-time basis.

Previously pastor Gaskamp served congregations in Hoskell, Rosenberg, Sinton, Clovis, N.M., Wichita Falls and Daingerfield-in that order.

Brenham, Tx is Pastor Gaskamp's place of birth. He attended Texas Lutheran College in Seguin, SWTSC in San Marcos, Wartburg College in Waverly, Iowa, and the University of Dubuque in Dubuque, Iowa. His theological training was at Wartburg Theological Seminary in Dubuque, Iowa.

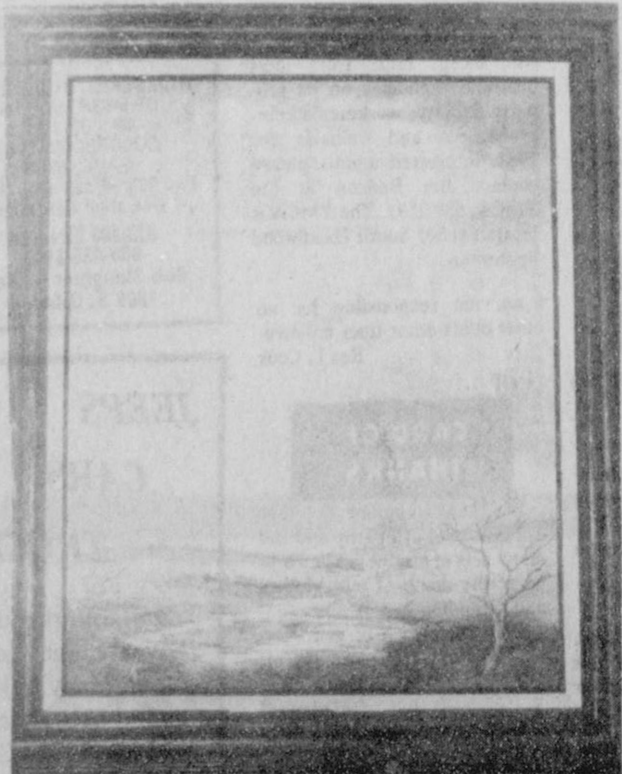
Cowbells show painting

Mike Cudd is a snowmobile dealer who has sold John Deeres "...ever since John Deere started building snowmobiles."

That's not all that exceptional except--Cudd's dealership is located in the Northern Panhandle of Texas and it only snows three or four times a year. Yet, there is a growing interest in snowmobile-ing in his Spearman, Texas area.

Cudd, who sells Deere sleds out of Hansford Implement, figures that in his two-county sales area, there are about 100 sleds.

Where do the people ride? One place is Chama, New Mexico, a six-to-seven hour drive from Spearman. Many of the snowmobilers travel that distance five times a season just to experience what Mike calls "...the excitement of the mountain wind drifts."

"There's plenty of time for recreation," states Cudd, since Spearman is basically a farming and ranching community and winter is the people's recreation time of year. When there's snow at Spearman, the people snowmobile near home, but when there isn't, they drive long hours to winter snowmobile-ing fun.

Those, Spearman, Texas, folk sound like our kind of people. "Good snowmobile-ing, friends!"

Lynx Blast Through Panthers

The Panthers started doing what they wanted which was to built their lead and take in the half time lead. The first quarter ended with the Follett Panthers outscoring the Lynx by the score of 18-15. 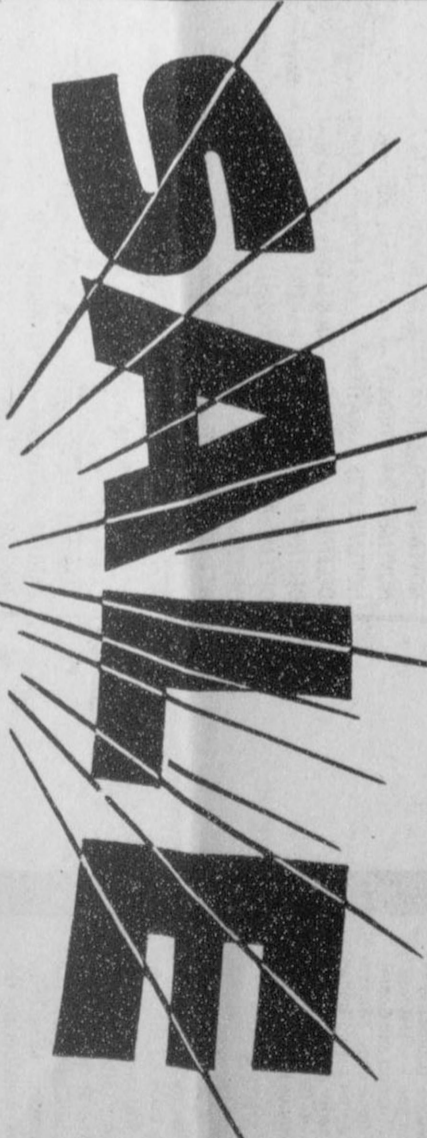

SEAT BELTS WEAR OUT

The National Bureau of Standards found that 60 percent of well-used seat belts that were from three to ten years old were tested and found to be unsafe based on Federal standards for seat belts.

Dirt, dust, rubbing and even sunlight can break down the strength of a seat belt. If you slam the door on a seat belt or get it caught in moving the seat back and forth, the effective strength is weakened. Oil spilled on a seat belt will also weaken it.

Whenever you see signs of wear or decomposition on a seat belt, it should be replaced.

Continued adjustment can be a major cause for wear. Inertia reels should also be checked by driving about 10 miles per hour and hitting the brakes hard (on an empty road or large, open empty parking lot). If the reel doesn't hold you in, have it tested and replaced.

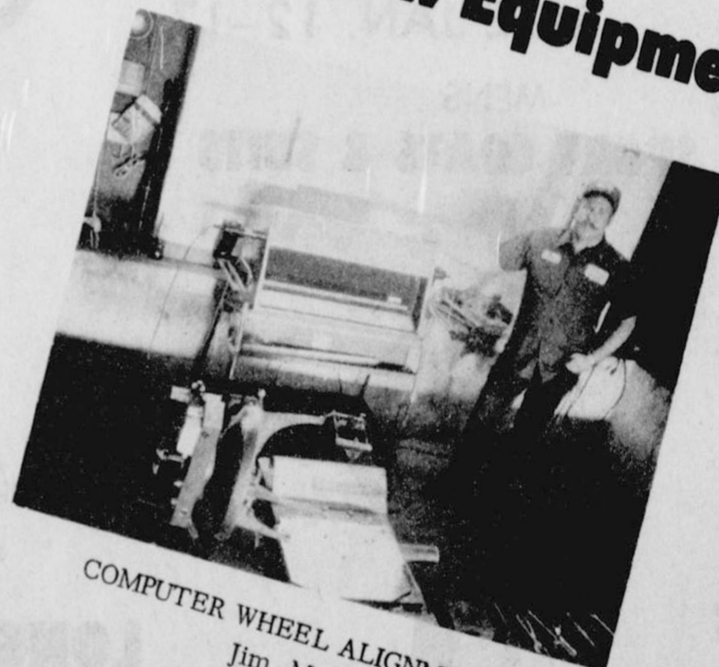
