Construction: thank you for patience

We at Hansford Hospital would like to begin this progress report on construction by taking it as an opportunity to express our "thanks" to the community for your patience as patients during this construction and renovation.

Last Friday (Oct. 2) renovation began on a section of the hospital encompassing the surgery area and the laboratory-radiology departments. The present laboratory is being demolished and the space it occupies will be combined with

our existing operating room to give Hansford Hospital two operating suites.

Upon completion of the surgical suites, the existing emergency room will be converted to a new laboratory and will be combined with two new laboratory departments that are presently under construction in the southeast corner of the hospital. At that time, we will have three new emergency rooms completed. These will also be located in the southeast corner of the building.

One of the features of the new emergency treatment complex will be a shower. In the past, victims of an accident have been taken to the patient side of the hospital to clean off accident

residue--particularly in an industrial mishap--to be cleaned up before treatment could be started. This will no longer be necessary when the new emergency treatment area is completed.

One important matter for your attention: Jim Nicholson, lab director, asks that patients using our lab and X-ray department to please

observe the signs posted to direct you to the temporary lab facilities--or ask directions of any of the hospital personnel if you are confused.

Once again, we at Hansford

Hospital appreciate the cooperation received from our community during our construction period and we apologize for any inconvenience it may cause.

We pledge you that the end

result will be convenient facilities far in advance of most hospitals in a community this size.

H-Hour for new city budget

Councilmen spar with costs of services

There is good news and there is bad news coming out of the regular meeting of the Spearman city council, Tuesday night, upon adoption of a proposed '81-'82 operating budget for the coming fiscal year.

The bad news: Gas rates are going up. Water rates are going up. Sewer rates are going up. Garbage collection rates are going up.

Effective date is the Oct. 1, billing.

The good news: consumers in the city of Spearman are coming out "smelling like a rose" compared to what increase would be if the gas company was privately owned.

The best way to understand this is to consider the following report of that meeting and the action taken, not as the city but as a neighbor coping with inflation, supply and attendant costs--on a greater scale, but--in the same manner as you and your neighbor.

At the outset of the report of the meeting and its action, it is important to understand how much you, the consumer, was saved by procedure alone.

It went like this: all increases were considered separately. In this way--rather than prorating the entire increase necessary to just provide services to citizens of the city across the spectrum--each consumer will pay according to his highest demand and/or usage.

Low consumption water consumers will not be penalized because of high consumption gas users. You will pay in the area of your highest rate of consumption only, with the remainder of services more bearable.

An example: at the estimated highest consumption rate for water and gas--which would be winter time--gas would be used at a 30,000 cubic foot rate while water would be used at a 10,000 gallon rate. To prorate this--on a consumption basis--it would be averaged: 30 plus 10 and divided 20 = 20. Using this formula a high consumption WATER user (who might fall in the low GAS consumption category--12,000 CF) would be paying for one-third of the consumption of the high gas user prorated onto his water bill.

By raising each rate separately, each citizen-customer pays for only what HE uses.

In treating with gas rates and consumption, which was the first ordinance considered Tuesday night, it should be noted that this will be the first hike in rate costs since 1975. In that six-year period, gas costs to the city have gone from \$1.65 in Jan., 1980 to \$2.56 in Aug., 1981.

Even so, the greatest financial burden to city government is the cost of services in delivering gas to the customer and this is the area in which almost all of the gas rate increase lies. It includes the cost of vehicles, their maintenance and operation and the salaries of employees--your friends and neighbors--the people who use their buying power to sustain the business houses of their community rather in gas costs.

For those who have not done their homework and ask why the city is in the gas business, consider this: if you were a customer of a private gas company, your payments would

be the sole income of the employees who delivered this service to you--plus the company would be subject to taxes in the course of operation from which the city of Spearman as a gas supplier is exempt. The city's goal is to have utilities and attendant services non-profit but self-supporting as to delivery and replacement costs.

Most of the employees of the city involved in giving you gas service are also used in other departments and the burden of their salaries and the vehicles they use are divided accordingly--another reason members of the council took the course of considering each utility and service rate rise separately.

To arrive at an equitable customer burden for the rate rise, members of the council and city administration made an assumption validated by a study of consumption figures from the past. They divided their study into three categories of customer use:

High consumption took in that person who, in winter, said it is cold outside and hang the cost, I am going to turn up the thermostat. The average consumption was down in winter (no lawn watering or car washing) estimated at 10-thousand gallons with that figure going to 35-thousand gallons.

At the low end of this spectrum--low consumption--were those on a fixed income imposed by retirement or disability. Their winter gas consumption was estimated at 12-thousand CF and water at 3-thousand gallons, going to 3-thousand CF for gas in summer and 10-thousand gallons of water. The assumption here is that fixed income customers are going to be actively conscious of what they have to spend in this area of service.

The median (average) was fixed at 17-thousand CF of gas in winter and 3-thousand CF in summer. Water was 6-thousand gallons in winter and 20-thousand gallons in summer.

Cost-wise, the dollar billing for this usage, gas, water, sewer, sanitation, was worked out as follows: High Consumption \$128.22 monthly. The old figure was \$118.93 giving an estimated increase of \$9.29 per month.

Low consumption figures were \$57.96 at the new rate, compared to the old rate of \$52.98 with a differential of \$4.98. That is for winter billing. In summer, the estimate is a new rate of \$33.33 per month against an old rate of \$29.56 producing a difference of \$3.77.

So, the increases to be levied are estimated (by current usage figures) to be less than \$10 per month optimum with an average about 60 percent of that figure in winter and 47 percent in summer.

For emphasis: remember profit is not a figure in calculations or action. The goal is only sustaining revenues.

These rate increases were implemented by the adoption of pertinent ordinances numbered 477, 478, 479, and 480.

Before getting to the new budget, adopted Tuesday night, it should be noted that there was one other increase in a service rendered to citizens. The cost of services by H & S Emergency Medical Service was increased. This rise was a general average of 20 percent. An example: the old base rate

for ambulance service was \$42. The new: \$51. On calls outside the county, an additional fee of \$15 (the old one was \$12) plus a \$1.44 per mile (the old mileage cost was \$1.20).

Which brings us to the budget and the ad valorem tax rate; a hand-in-hand consideration.

Following a public hearing, Tuesday night, on the budget with no public participation or comment, the new budget--with an attendant tax rate--was adopted without dissent either from the public or members of the council.

The way budgets are formulated is a two-stage procedure. As with any concern's fiscal operation, a spending pattern for a coming period is an estimate. Then, in municipal operation and finance, the law requires a final amendment at the close of the year. At that point, it becomes the actual operating budget for that specific period.

A part of the action, Tuesday night, was the amendment of the '80-'81 budget which, at one point, showed a \$60,429 deficit. One reason for the statutory final amendment requirement is to account for the manner in which such a deficit is handled.

With that in mind, consider the budget adopted Tuesday night.

Total estimated expenditures for the general operating fund exclusive of enterprise ventures--gas, water and sewer--are \$809,508 with a possible surplus of \$5,480 based on estimated revenues.

Enterprise operation budget is \$1,228,362 with a possible surplus from revenue of \$7,058. Of this amount, \$645,110 represents the actual cost of gas to the city.

Burgeoning inflation and/or unforeseen equipment calamities could wipe out the surplus estimate.

The total project budget is adopted amounts to \$2,037,870. The estimated '80-'81 budget was \$1,729,928.

The actual '79-'80 budget totalled \$1,416,246.

When speaking of revenues, remember that--basically--enterprise revenues consist of customer fees while the general fund draws mostly upon ad valorem taxes.

Which brings up another action Tuesday night.

The city of Spearman had been using 50 percent of valuation. This year, by act of the legislature, valuation as a tax base goes to 100 percent. By the same action, rates must be adjusted statewide accordingly. Half of the rate levied last year would average about 63 cents.

In action at the meeting Tuesday night, the council set the rate at 65 cents per hundred dollars valuation. This is 1.35 percent higher than last year. Any taxing entity is allowed a rise of three percent without a public hearing.

To complete the fiscal part and parcel of Tuesday night's action, the council went into executive session to discuss city employee salaries. The result of that convocation, in open meeting, was a seven percent cost-of-living increase across the board for city employees.

Other than routine operational matters, other action by the council was the election of five persons to the board of directors of the new Hansford County Appraisal District.

Co., the old Beedy site in the shopping center and Traylor Ford. According to chief Robinson, the McClellan damage occurred some time between Thursday and Saturday, Sept. 25. No time reference is available for the attack on Traylor Ford but it is known that the damage at the shopping center occurred between 3 a.m. and 5:17 a.m., Sunday Sept. 27.

The graffiti incidents occurred Saturday night at Ideal Golden Spread, the former office of Judge Blackburn and on cars at Traylor Ford and Hergert's. Chief Robinson said some of the writing was obscene and some an attempt at humor. He said school authorities were working with him in seeking out the offenders. Damage was heavy on both.

There was another incident of criminal mischief during the reporting period involving juveniles at the Lyric Theater where youngsters attempted to rip seats from their floor moorings. Theater operator Alton Ellsworth reached them before there was any damage. They have been turned over to their parents.

There was one other incident during the reporting period involving a juvenile who was taken in custody for criminal trespass and remanded to parents. The incident occurred in the 100 block of Townsend.

Adults were involved in incidents involving theft of service and reckless destruction of property. Involved were some residences where the city cut off the water for non-payment. Tenants attempted to turn it on again.

The Spearman Police Department assisted the Gruver Police Department in the recovery of a stolen vehicle belonging to Carl Cooper of Gruver. Spearman officers observed the vehicle being driven Friday night but it had not been reported stolen, according to the report. Saturday, when the stolen alert came, the vehicle was located south of Spearman.

In other activity, officers arrested a Spearman resident

for several traffic violations. He was arraigned before the municipal judge, paid a fine and was released.

A citizen filed a complaint of excessive acceleration at the intersection of Main St. and Collard and running the traffic light at Crazy Corners.

Chief Robinson stressed the importance of reporting to police every accident regardless of how minor. He said his department was unable to help in a civil dispute over a traffic mishap that occurred last July

on the shopping mall parking lot because the incident was never investigated by any officers.

The only accident report on the police blotter for the current reporting period involved a parked vehicle being struck in the 100 block of Main St. The incident occurred some time between 7 and 10:30 p.m., Saturday. The driver of the offending vehicle fled the scene without leaving information as required by state law. There were no injuries and damages was light.

Good Yields

Area farmers are beginning to harvest the 1981 milo crop. A few loads have been brought in to Holt and McKibben Equity elevators with the grain reported to be of good quality and good test. An Equity spokesman stated that the corn crop this fall was excellent. R. L. McClellan grain has received a few loads of milo with high moisture content and Speartex has received a truck load of good quality milo.

The wet weather of late August and September has added farmers in raising a good crop with minimal watering for those who irrigate which is a blessing due to the increasing high costs of irrigating.

Along with the good news comes the bad, prices the farmer receives for his grain is down considerably from last year. Milo last week was bringing \$4.05 per hundred at local markets, a figure that compares with \$5.50 in the third week of September of 1980.

This 26 percent drop in price is stark when measured against increasing costs of production, notably in the price of gas to fuel irrigation engines.

The comparisons for wheat and corn are: wheat, \$4.05 a bushel in September 1980 and \$3.64 last week. The 41 cent drop is almost an even 10 percent.

Corn sold for \$3.33 a bushel in September 1980 and was \$2.70--a drop of 63¢ a bushel.
