Commissioners eye 'wash,' jail air

Construction of wash rooms for animals at county barns, air conditioning of County Jail, a possible salary increase for a tax office deputy and certification of a juvenile facility--these are agenda items for the Monday Hansford County commissioners court meeting.

The commissioners had previously voted to construct a washroom for animals addition at both the Spearman and Gruver county barns. In the past the animals had to be washed in a "small, cramped, and kind of dangerous area" in each of the show barns, so after they convene at 10 a.m. the commissioners will open and decide on bids for the construction project.

They will also decide on whether or not to air-condition Hansford County Jail. Under consideration

will be the adding of an air conditioning unit to the jail's heating units.

The commissioners will discuss raising the salary of a tax office deputy, according to the agenda, and will take up certification of the juvenile facility within the county jail.

The certification, a routine matter, will be made by District Judge J.E. Blackburn and Hansford County Judge Roy McClellan.

Routine items include reading and approval of the previous meeting's minutes, the treasurer's report and payment of claims.

A supplement to the agenda lists consideration of a fire contract with the City of Spearman, and specifies this item will be discussed at 11:30 p.m. or thereafter."

School board agenda busy

Spearman ISD School board will meet in regular session Monday beginning at 8 p.m. in the board room at Spearman High School.

Among the highlights to be covered, as listed on the agenda, are action on staff recommendations, consideration of a bus purchase, nomination of Hansford County Appraisal District candidates, consideration of a request from a Guymon community television station to videotape Spearman High School sporting events, and various reports from Superintendent James Cunningham.

Bake Show



For the third straight year, Karen Cotter of Gruver has won the Hansford County 4-H Bake Show and represented the county 4-H'ers in the Tri-State Fair in Amarillo Food Show on Saturday (results of the Tri-State Food Show were not available at presstime.)

Now an "old hand" in the county food show competition at age 12, Karen is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Cotter of Gruver. She won the grand champion rosette.

Alicia Thomas, also of Gruver, was runner-up in the Hansford competition, and took the alternate berth, to represent the county at the Tri-State fair should Karen be unable to enter there.

Also winning blue ribbons in the county-wide competition--in which the young entrants made Danish bars--were Alicia's brother, Wayne Thomas, and Staci Gardiner of Spearman.

In addition to competing for the Tri-State Fair Food Show first prize of \$50, second prize of \$10 or third prize of \$7.50, Miss Cotter also was competing in Amarillo for a number of prizes from individuals or firms.

Only juniors entered the Hansford County Bake Show--there were no senior division entries.

Word has been received from the sewing competition, already concluded at the Tri-State Fair, that a Spearman mother and son took multiple honors.

Former Hansford County Extension Agent, Home Economics, Nell Evans won first place in senior division sewing with her men's shirts entry, first place in child's suit competition, and second place in other children's wear.

Will, a seven-year-old second grader, took a first place in other children's wear with a pair of jeans he made and second in shirts.

Junior Varsity remains unbeaten

Outracing and out scrambling their bigger opponents the Spearman Lynx Junior Varsity scored two touchdowns and a two point conversion, then turned back a late rally by the Canadian Wildcat JV'ers for a 14-12 victory, at Lynx Stadium Thursday night.

Swift Monty Morris -- moved down from the Lynx varsity at his own request so he could get more playing time -- scored both TDs for the Lynx JV. But the decisive points were scored by fleetfooted quarterback Bob Cook who ran the bootleg to perfection, faking left then rolling right and racing untouched into the end zone for a two point conversion after Morris' first touchdown.

Then it was the stout JV defense that made Cook's conversion run the deciding factor as they stopped one up-the-middle attempt for two points after the first Canadian touchdown in the second quarter, and hauled the Wildcat JV's second plunge on a PAT try after the other Canadian touchdown in the fourth quarter.

The Lynx JV struck swiftly early in the first quarter to take the lead, which it never relinquished. Canadian took the kickoff returning it to the Wildcat 28, then rolled up a quick first down.

But the Lynx JV squelched the next two running plays for no yardage, and on third down, the Canadian runner bobbled a wide pitch and Spearman JV defensive end James Coombes knifed through and fell on the fumble to give the

Lynx the ball, first and 10, on the Canadian 30.

It took Spearman just five plays to score. On first down Danny Cazarez blasted up the middle for two yards, but the play was nullified and the Lynx penalized five yards for an offside violation.

Morris regained the five yards as he blasted to the 30, but instead of taking the play, which would have meant a loss of down with the gain, the Lynx JV optioned to take an offside penalty against Canadian.

So they "started over," first and 10 at the Canadian 30. Morris broke over right tackle to the 24 then crossbucked off left tackle to the 15, for a Spearman first down.

Then Cook tossed a quick over-the-middle strike to Coombes, playing tight end. The ball glanced off Coombes' face guard straight up in the air and he leaped after it, pulling it down just before being hit and downed at the Canadian five.

Mike Lopez banged through the line to the Wildcat JV four, and Morris took a pitch left, started back over tackle, then slid on around the end and raced over for the TD with 4:43 left in the first quarter.

Faking beautifully, Cook then executed the bootleg for the two extra points that were to prove so vital later.

After Canadian could not generate a first down and punted, the Wildcats made a big break for themselves as one of the defenders broke through and blocked Allen Mires punt attempt, setting up a

first and 10 for the Wildcats on the Lynx JV 30.

The Lynx defense swarmed under Wildcat ball carrier Shawn Wright for a three yard loss, but the Wildcats moved in two plays to the 23, and on fourth and two, big Mike Reyes bulled his way to a first down on the 18.

Another run and an offside penalty took the ball to the six, Reyes drove to the three and quarterback Mike Freeman plunged across for Canadian's first score.

Wallace Hill slammed into the line on the Canadian PAT try but was stopped short, for no score by the middle of the Lynx JV line, leaving it 7-6 Lynx with 7:52 left in the first half.

The rest of the first quarter was a defensive duel with neither team generating much of a drive, as were the opening minutes of the third quarter.

Late in the quarter, the Lynx JV took over on their own 27 after a Canadian punt rolled dead at that point, and put together a five-play, 63-yard touchdown march, aided by two personal foul penalties and one late hit call against the Wildcat JV. Morris got the touchdown as he took a handoff and raced around left end, scoring from 16 yards out.

Cook dropped back and attempted a pass for the points after, but was sacked, and with 35 seconds left in the third quarter it was 14-6, Spearman.

On the next Canadian series, the

Lynx JV defenders stopped a fourth and five play inches short of a first, but four plays later Mires had to punt, booting the ball out of bounds at the Canadian 18.

From that point Canadian rolled to its second touchdown, the score coming on a second and four when the Wildcat's Wright took a reverse

USDA okays drought grazing

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has issued special provisions that will allow producers in some drought affected counties to graze their own conservation use acres with their own livestock. Hansford County, as you well know, is suffering from these same drought conditions. Request for permission to graze CUA should be made to the Hansford County ASCS as soon as possible. These requests will be

compiled and sent to the Texas State ASCS Office to see if this county is eligible to release CUA for grazing. These acres must not be grazed until permission has been given by the ASCS Office, and this office cannot give permission until we have justified the need.

So, if you have experienced drought conditions and need to graze the acres, submit your request to this office as soon as possible.

Ed Garner appointed to Panhandle regional panel

Mark White, Governor of the State of Texas, announced last week that Ed Garner, Mayor Pro Tem of the City of Spearman was appointed to the Panhandle Regional Review Committee (PRRC) for a two year term. The purpose of the PRRC is to review applications for projects for funds out of the Texas Community Development Program which is administered by the Texas Department of Community Affairs. The Committee will review applications that consist of projects for community improvements.

The Texas Department of Community Affairs has allocated \$1,024,000 in 1983 for the top twenty-five counties of the Texas Panhandle. In 1984 TDCA will have

\$2,000,000 to allocate to these counties.

left and galloped all the way from his own 23 for a touchdown.

And with 5:10 left in the game, Canadian had a chance to tie the score with a two-point after TD conversion. They called Hill's number again and he plowed into the left side of the line. Coombes grabbed one of Wright's legs but could not hold him, but almost simultaneously, Cook slammed hard into the runner, hitting him high and the ball carrier was then buried under a purple wave of Lynx JV defenders, inches short of the goal and the tie game.

Canadian kept the pressure on stopping the Lynx next series the once more blocking a Mires' punt, as Reyes slammed through and batted down the ball for a Canadian first down at the Lynx 25.

But against the determined home team, the Wildcat JV'ers gained nothing in three rushing tries, and a fourth down pass fell incomplete when Freeman had to throw hurriedly on the run to avoid being downed for a loss by a big Lynx rush.

There only remained for the Lynx to run out the last minute and 25 seconds and the hard fought victory was theirs.



GREEN THUMB RECEIVES
GRANT MONEY FOR 83-84

Farmers Union Green Thumb, an employment program for low-income senior citizens in Texas and 44 other states, has received a new grant of \$88,500,918 from the U.S. Dept. of Labor.

The grant is effective from July 1, 1983 through June 30, 1984. It provides \$4,113,951 for Texas Farmers Union Green Thumb, which has 952 of the 17,317 part-time job slots allocated to Green Thumb nationwide.

TFU Green Thumb currently operates in 108 counties, mostly in north, central, and west Texas. The program's workers must be at least 55 years of age and meet income guidelines. They are placed with public and private non-profit organizations such as schools, senior centers, libraries, and museums, and furnish services that would not otherwise be available.

The sponsoring organizations are responsible for day to day supervision of the workers, and TFU Green Thumb administers wages and fringe benefits.

"We are delighted that the Dept. of Labor has signed the new grant agreement," said Mike Moeller, president of Texas Farmers Union. "The grant money means that 500 rural agencies now benefitting from the services of Green Thumb workers can continue to do so for at least another year."

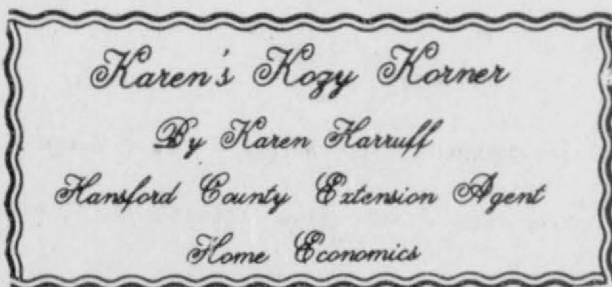
Green Thumb state director Diane Parrish of Waco said that even though the grant is based on 952 employment slots for Texas, the program is currently able to employ 1,047 older persons because of reductions in overhead on both the state and national levels.

"Our overriding goal is to put as many older Texans to work as possible," Parrish said. "They need the work for themselves, and their communities need the dedication and conscientiousness that older workers bring to their jobs."

Green Thumb began as a pilot program in Minnesota, Oregon, Arkansas, and New Jersey in 1965. The program expanded to Texas in 1970, and has been in continuous operation in the state since then. Original projects focused on park and highway beautification, and that is why the name "Green Thumb" was given to the program, which is now the oldest and largest employment program for senior citizens in the nation.

SELECTING A SEWING MACHINE

Selecting a sewing machine is similar to choosing a car. When you buy a car, you closely consider its features, durability and dependability to determine the amount of mileage you can expect from it. When you purchase a sewing machine, the same factors should be considered.

To insure that you will purchase a quality sewing machine, investigate the different brands, buy from a reputable dealer with good service, and ask the opinion of friends who are accomplished sewers.

One important area to investigate is the type of service you can expect from both the manufacturer and the dealer. This is especially important for beginner sewers. Ask the following questions to determine service coverage:

- Is the dealer a factory authorized representative?
- Will dealers service the sewing machines in other cities, in case you move?
- How long does the dealer offer free service and is it transferable to another city?
- How long is the warrantor responsible for repairs or replacement of defective parts?
- How long will the warrantor make replacement of parts for the model for free or otherwise?

• Are there any conditions associated with the warranty, are lessons required, must you mail in a warranty card, must you bring the machine to the dealer?

Also consider the features on the various machine models. Look for machines that will match your sewing projects. Certain features are basic necessities, while others are special extras which are nice to have.

The amount of features the machine has will affect the price. You don't want to pay for more features than you will use, and you don't want to economize by selecting a machine that will fall short of your expectations in a year either. So consider the features you select as an investment in developing your sewing skills. If used often, they will eventually pay for themselves. Compare the features of at least three models before deciding.

Test drive the machine before purchasing. A precision machine should be able to stitch on a variety of fabric types with equal ease. Look for even stitches with good tension control. If the tension is correct, the stitches will look the same on both the top and bottom of the fabric without puckers.

New sewers should ask the dealer to take you through a test drive on fabrics of different weights and textures. Experienced sewers may wish to make a test patchwork of fabric and use one for each machine you plan to test.

Knowing the right questions to ask is the key to guarantee that you will be happy with the sewing machine you choose.

6th annual Golden Spread Antique Show to stir memories

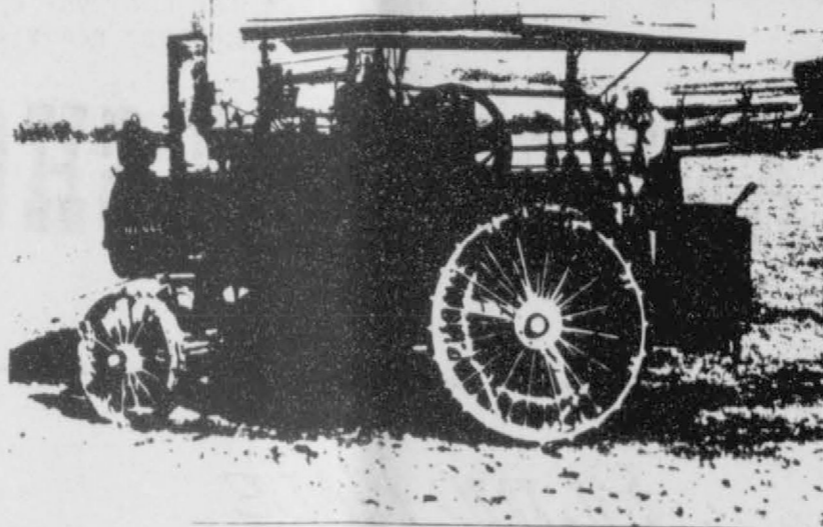

Retiring parole director remembers investigations

When Harold (Swede) Larson looks back on 30 years as a federal employee, he does not hesitate when asked to name the most memorable of the more than 4,000 convicted criminals he supervised or investigated — South Texas drug dealer and convicted killer Fred Gomez Carrasco.

Larson, director of the federal probation and parole office in Waco, was forced to retire Wednesday by a government statute that requires federal law enforcement officials to retire at the age of 55. He will devote all his time to the real estate business.

Wednesday, following a sentencing in U.S. District Court, Judge James Nowlin called Larson to the bench and told him he was going to sentence Larson to 30 years in a federal prison. But Nowlin rescinded his order, stating that since Carrasco already has put in 30 years as a federal employee, he would let him off.

Larson began his career as a federal probation and parole officer in San Antonio after former U.S. District Judge Ben A. Rice Jr. appointed him to the post in 1957. He has worked at the Waco office for nine years and has been in charge the past seven years, he said.

While in San Antonio, Larson was assigned to do a presentence investigation on Carrasco and was his parole officer for about 18 months after Carrasco was released from prison.

"He was a first-class drug dealer," Larson said of Carrasco.

Carrasco was killed in July 1974 after he and

other Texas prison inmates took prison workers hostage for 10 days. Several inmates and hostages were killed by prison guards as they attempted to break out of the Walls Unit in Huntsville.

Larson, a former China Spring coach and teacher, said he has conducted 1,357 presentence investigations during his 26 years in the probation department. He said he supervised or investigated more than 4,000 people during that period.

"I love people and I love to help people who need help, and in this business, you can do that," he said. "I enjoyed taking a person who resents direction, and within a certain period of time you can see that their direction has changed. This is something that I saw time and time again. It is challenging, and a person really knows if he is doing some good or not."

"So many people that come in here have been in negative positions, and their associates are even more negative. I have always tried to emphasize the positive side of life instead of the negative."

During presentence investigations, Larson would interview a defendant and recommend punishment to the judge.

"I can truthfully say that out of all of those recommendations I made, my conscience is clear. I can't think of a one that didn't deserve what I recommended," he said.

Larson spent three years in the Air Force from 1946 to 1949, which counts toward his 30 years as a federal employee.
