There are 6 mobile units in the weather net and more will be added when the new police communication system for the sheriff's depart-ment is in effect, which will release mobile units now being used by the de-partment, for civil defense. Jim Evans is Disaster Chairman for the City of Spearman. The city council and mayor are in charge of the Civil Defense for

Divisions under Evans include police, fire and rescue, public works, wa-ter, sewer and gas, debris ter, sever and gas, debris removal, medical assis-tance, public information and legal counsel. The warning which is to be sounded in the event of a tornado being sighted in the immediate area will be a six (6) minute

will be a six (6) minute will be a six (6) minute steady blast on the fire sitens coinciding with a six (6) minute blast on the high frequency siten giving a high low yelp. All city vehicles are equipped with short wave radio sets also. Designated storm shelters in Spearman are the east-west corridors of the high school, the basement of the courthouse, and the Equity Elevator. It is important for each citizen and/or each family to have a storm plan in mind to implement in case of the warnings from civil defense personnel.

Investigated Investigated The Texas Highway Par-rol investigated two ac-cidents on rural highways in Hansford Courry during the month of March, 1975, according to Sergeant C.E. Henderson, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area. These crashes resulted in the persons fulled and three persons fulled. The rural traffic acci-dent summary for this county during the first three morths of 1975 shows a total of five accidents re-sulting in no persons killed and five persons injured. The rural traffic acci-dent summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Saf-ety Region for March, 1975 shows a total of 446 acci-dents emsiling in 17 per-sons killed and 217 persons injured as compared to March, 1974, with 395 accidents resulting in 172 per-sons injured. This was 51 more accidents, 6 less kill-d and 45 more injured in 1975 at the same period of time.

The 17 traffic deaths for the month of March, 1975, occurred in the following counties: three in Garza; two each in Celiliree and Oldham; one each in Gray, Haskell, Jack, lamb, Lub-bock, Montague, Parker, Swisher, Wichita and Young.

If you cannot escape its path, lie down flat in a ditch and shiek your head and cover your face with clothing to prevent suffocation from dust. Do not stay in a car, trailer, or mobile home. Stay out of buildings with wide-open roofs, such as theaters and gymnasiums. With proper precautions, you will have a better chance to survive when a tornado comes to visit.


