

Irish Surprise Lynx In Season Finale

Spearman's Lynx found a bunch of hopped-up Irishmen waiting for them Friday night in Shamrock and before the Lynx could get out of the buzz-saw they had been chopped up 14-6.

It was really "Friday the Thirteenth" for the Lynx; nothing seemed to go right for them. They fumbled three times, either killing a drive or giving up the ball in good field position for the Irish.

The yearned Lyny pessing at-

The vaunted Lyax passing attack never materialized as there were only three completions of 14 passes. Halfback Mike Morris threw two of the incomple-

The bright spot in a rather dismal evening for the Lynx was the running of halfback Ken Shufeldt. The long-striding runner who has power gears and speed gears, rushed for 127 yards in 17 carries for a 7.5

sverage on each carry.

Spearman stayed in the Irish end of the field practically all of the first half, but could nev-

er put together a scoring drive.
Spearman forced Shamrock to
give up the ball on a short punt
after the Irish had run seven
plays. Shufeldt and Morris hotfooted the ball back into Irish territory and there the drive

Morris got seven, then Shufeldt blasted off for 20 and Morris came back with four more. A pass fell incomplete and then on fourth and needing one, Crawford dropped back in deep punt formation, but tossed a short pass over the line to Shufeldt who raced 15 yards. Morris got two yards between two incomplete passes and the Lynx gave up the ball.

Spearman got the ball at the Irish 48 and Shufeldt immedia-

Irish 48 and Shufeldt immediately rammed it back to the 34 on a 16 yard gallop. Two running plays and two incomplete passes gained nothing and Spearman gave up the ball again.

The Lynx got another chance late in the second quarter when



Guard Larry Babbs who sprung Morris at the Lynx 40 with a good block, was also hurt on the play. Babbs was dazed and had to sit out a few plays. Morris was slowed the rest of the night.

A piling penalty against the Irish on the first play put the Lynx to the Shamrock 24 and then Shufeldt rammed it to the 19. There Crawford again found the ball eluding his grant and Shamrock recovered.

It took Shamrock 12 plays and two penalties against Spearman of five and 15 yards, for the Irish to score. Louis Davis carried on nine of the plays. He scored from the Lynx two. The Irish made the extra points but a backfield-in-motion penalty wiped the play out and the Lynx rose up to stop the second try. Texas Draft Quota Down

AUSTIN -- The state draft quota for December calls for 280 men, compared to 307 for November, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Tuesday.

The state quota of 280 for December is the Texas share of a national call for 7,800 men, all for the Army.
The state Selective Service

The state Selective Service director also announced that state draft boards will forward around 2,360 males for Army mental-physical examinations in December, 1,235 of whom will be 18-year-olds.

These tests for 18-year-olds are the result of President Johnson's action early this year which ordered the Director of Selective Service and

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
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

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
