to change the language in three separate parts of the bill, Changes will include a limit of 50 cents on a tax to pay off bonds that would be used to help build the dam. In the original legislation there was no limit set as to the maximum tax rate that could be set for the retirement of such bonds and interest.

Another change closely related to the first in the legislation provides that, "any tax to be set for the payment of bonds will be valid only upon a favorable vote by the electors of the

counties in the authority, " Craig Davidson, general manager of the Palo Duro River Authority, noted that legally the tax would have to be included in the bo election anyway, but fail-ure to state that in the legal notice had caused some concern in the area.

Another change in the legislation to be introduced the legislature will be a way for counties to detach themselves from the authority if they need to. David-son noted that since the legislation will give the authority the power to an-

"it is only right to have some manner by which counties may detach them-selves from the authority if they want to, " he said. Dee Jackson, a member

of the board from Hansford County, made the motion to include the detachment clause in the bill and it was seconded by Ochiltree unty representative Jerry Garrison. Vote on the addition was approved.

Another motion brought before the board was to have the meeting sites alternated between Hansford County and Ochiltree County. This motion also carried.

he legislature will amend the original act that created the Palo Duro River Authority to permit the annexation and establishment of a tax roll by the authority, the levy of an ad valorem tax for the payment of bonds up to 50 cents and provide methods to assess and equalize its tax rolls, eliminate the detachment of cities from the authority and validate the organization proceedings of the authority and the maintenance tax election.

as well as allowing the de-tachment of counties.

The detachment provision

of the new bill will allow any county to withdraw from wide vote by residents. Da-vidson noted that if a county wanted to pull out of the authority and then a city can contract for water for industrial & residential use. After a bond election has been approved though a county can no more with draw than a precinct could

withdraw from the county.
Changes in the bill were
decided on by members of
the FDRA board after a December meeting in Perryton where a number of area citizens voiced opposition to the unlimited tax provi-

At that time several legal and financial experts told those assembled that a limitation on the tax would mean a higher interest rate on any bonds voted for the authority, but in the face of the opposition the board members decided to impose a ceiling on the tax anyway. In other action at the

meeting the manager of the North Plains Water District spoke with the board members about the possibility of selling FDRA bonds to the Texas Water Development Board at a special low interest rate. Reports

of his talk from board mem-bers indicate that while he said there was some possi-bility that the state agency would buy the bonds he did not think it was likely in the near future, Board members who were present at the meeting in-





INSURANCE AND TAXES

As a general rule, a widow who receives the proceeds of her husband's life insurance policy in a lump sum payment, does not have to declare this money for income tax purposes. This also goes for lump sum payments under an employer's group insurance plan or accident insurance.

If she takes the proceeds in installments over a perio of years instead of a lump sum settlement, then the total paid will be more than the face value of the policy in the form of additional interest. No income tax is paid on any of the principal amount, and only the amount of interest which exceeds \$1,000 in that year is subject to tax. Most insurance policies

would not reach that amoun of interest if spread out one a period of years so there would be little or no inserest paid on the income. Remember, a widow or widower is exempted from the first \$1,000 annual INTEREST (not principal) received from life insurance regardless of the number of rolleles involved.

New Food Stamp Series

The U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) will replace the current 50 cers, \$2 and \$5 food stamp series with a \$1, \$5, and \$10 series on March 1.

USDA's Food and Nutrition Service (PNS) said that the larger denominations were prompted by the volume of coupons needed to meet increased food stamp allotments, paper shortages, and increased production and shipping costs.

The new food stamps—brown (\$1), purple (\$5), and blue—green (\$10)—use a more sophisticated design to deter counterfeiting They are incorporated into redesigned, revalued coupon books.

All currents coupons not

receigned, revalued coupon books.

All current coupons not issued by February 28 of this year, will be collected and destroyed. FNS said that food stamp necipients must spend their current food stamp by June 30, 1975 since retailers will not accept any old coupons after that date.

Authorized food stamp more will use the \$1 coupon for malding change instead of the current \$0 cent coupon and credit slips of 99 cents or less for change under \$1. FNS advised recallers to redeem the current food coupons as soon as possible; banks will continue to accept them for redemption until August 1, 1975.



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
