T.J.O'Donnell Candidate For Congress man-at-Large

Man After Whom Lynn County Town Was Named, Again Seeking Political Honors.

Thinking that many of our readers would be interested in the fact that T. J. O'Donnell, formerly of Lynn County, now of Wichita Falls, Texas, is a candidate for congressman at large, we reproduce below his platform as published in the Wichita Falls Daily Times.

Would vote on all National questions with a view of upholding the administration of President Wilson, that the democratic policies advocated by him may be carried into effect.

Would advocate the appointment of a commission to revise and recommend the simplification of laws.

Would advocate National aid for good roads.
 Would advocate the encouragement to the fullest extent agricultural development. Would advocate all measures looking to the betterment of the laboring masses. Would advocate that the trust laws be simplified and be brought down to date; made more drastic to reach the soul of the corporations.

Would advocate the creation of a new cabinet member to be known as the secretary of corporations. These duties would be to see that the anti trust laws were enforced.

Would advocate the enactment of a drastic uniform National divorce law.

Would vote against any measure committing the democratic party or the National government to National prohibition.

This style of dress bids fair to rob both sexes of that modest reserve which is the safeguard of morality.

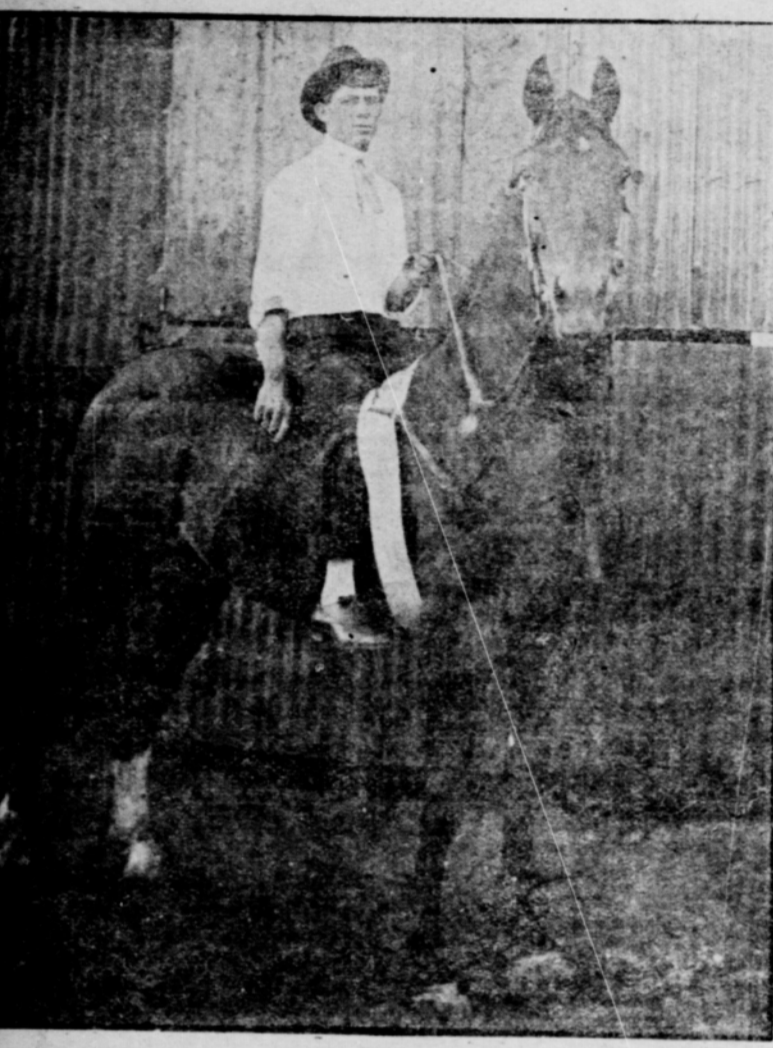
Polling Places In Public Schools Will Help Straighten Political Derangements

BY EDWARD J. WARD, Adviser on Social Center Development, University of Wisconsin

THE first physical step in straightening out our political derangement is the use of each public schoolhouse as the polling place of its district.

THAT A GOOD START HAS BEEN MADE IS EVIDENT IN THE FACT THAT MORE THAN FIVE HUNDRED SCHOOLHOUSES THROUGHOUT THE COUNTRY HAVE ALREADY BEEN PUT TO THIS APPROPRIATE USE. SEVENTY SCHOOL BUILDINGS ARE SERVING AS POLLING PLACES IN CHICAGO THIS SPRING. NEW YORK, WITH SIX HUNDRED AND TWENTY PUBLIC SCHOOLS AND FIVE HUNDRED AND FIFTY-FOUR OTHER PUBLIC BUILDINGS, STILL VOTES IN FOUR HUNDRED AND THIRTEEN BARBER SHOPS AS WELL AS MANY POOL ROOMS, BAKERIES, UNDERTAKING ESTABLISHMENTS AND SMALL STORES. ALTHOUGH A BILL FAILED AT THE RECENT SESSION OF THE LEGISLATURE, THE PEOPLE OF NEW YORK ARE STILL STRUGGLING FOR A LAW WHICH WILL PERMIT THE USE OF SCHOOLS AS VOTING CENTERS.

This movement must succeed. Experience and reason make it clear that the PUBLIC SCHOOL IS PRE-EMINENTLY THE PLACE in which the people should voice their will in their own affairs.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The library is new and covers subjects collateral with those pursued in all the branches. The laboratory is new, complying with the requirements of the State Department of Education for a high school of the first class and covers adequately everything necessary to be used in any of the subjects for a certificate of any grade.

THE FACULTY IN GENERAL

The teachers are all specialists, being professional men and women of practical experience. They will be able to give something new on every phase of Modern Education. They are representative leaders from their respective districts, and personal contact with these leaders will be a source of inspiration for the young teachers.

PERSONEL OF THE FACULTY

Prof. E. A. White, conductor, Education. Prof. White is a man of great personality, having had experience in teaching in the country schools, intermediate schools, high schools and summer normals. He was reared in Hamilton county where he taught for several years and then went to the North Texas State Normal where he graduated in 1909 and is now superintendent of the Tahoka High School where he has been for the last three years. A more proficient instructor for the Subject of Education could not have been selected by the State Department. His methods will impress you.

Prof. E. F. Puryear, Secretary, Civics and Science. Prof. Puryear is educated, refined, polished and modern, having a complete college education including the practical branches of Agriculture, and Political economy. He is a man of practical knowledge, wide awake and progressive. Prof. P. M. Faulkner, Mathematics. Prof. Faulkner who will give instruction in mathematics has experienced seven years of successful teaching. He is from the Denton Normal School. He will give some thorough work in the subject of mathematics. At present he is Superintendent of the Slaton High School, which position he has held for two years.

Prof. W. B. Bishon, History. Prof. Bishon is a man of enviable talent, having had eight years of practical teaching in Texas. He has made History a special work and has had experience in the summer normal here before. He received his education in Gibtown Academy and holds a First Grade State Certificate.

For several years she has taught primary methods in the Plains, Texas, school.

PURPOSE OF THE NORMAL

The general endeavor of the Normal will be to serve the teachers of the State and at the same time to conserve and promote the interests of the schools of the South Plains by preparing more proficient teachers for the professions.

Furthermore, the purpose is three fold: To prepare teachers for State Examinations (and there is no reason why every one attending should not be able to obtain the grade of certificate sought); to give each one professional insight to the work; and at the same time to give both teachers and High School pupils, who desire, a practical review.

OUTLINE OF WORK

SECOND GRADE SUBJECTS

SPELLING: McCallum and Horn's The New Century Spelling Book (Silver, Burdett and Company, Chicago.)

READING: The work in the subject of Reading will be based on Briggs and Coffman's Reading to the Public Schools, Revised Edition. (Row, Peterson & Co., Chicago, or C. A. Bryant & Co., Dallas).

ARITHMETIC: Sutton & Bruce's Higher Arithmetic (D. C. Heath & Co., Dallas) should be studied.

GRAMMAR: Our Language Grammar (B. F. Johnson Publishing Co., Dallas) should be used as the basis of the work.

GEOGRAPHY: Tarr & McMurry's The World Geographies, First Book and Second Book, (The Macmillan Co., Dallas).

TEXAS HISTORY: Barker, Potts & Ramsdell's A School History of Texas (Row, Peterson & Co., Chicago).

PHYSIOLOGY and HYGIENE: Ritchie's Human Physiology and Hartman and Bibb's Human Body and Its Elements (The World Book Co., Yonkers, N. Y.)

METHODS and MANAGEMENT: The course this year will be based on Sutton & Horn's Schoolroom Essentials (C. A. Bryant & Co., Dallas)

U. S. HISTORY: Hall, Smith & Cussey's The Student's History of Our Country (Southern Publishing Co., Dallas) and Cousins & Hill's American History (D. C. Heath & Co., Dallas) should be made the basis of the work.

AGRICULTURE: Warren's Elements of Agriculture (The Macmillan Co., Dallas) and Ferguson & Lewis' Elements of Agriculture (The Ferguson Publishing Co., Sherman, Texas) should be used as the basis of the work.

FIRST GRADE SUBJECTS

COMPOSITION and RHETORIC: Herrick & Damon's New Composition and Rhetoric (Scott, Foresman & Co., Chicago) and Morley & Ferguson's Composition-Rhetoric (Newson & Co., Chicago) should be used as the basis of the work.

CIVICS: The work in Civil Government should be based on Triplett & Hausle's Civics: Texas and Federal (Rein & Sons Co., Houston, Texas).

ALGEBRA: Wentworth's New School Algebra (Ginn & Co., Dallas) and Hopkins & Underwood's Elementary Algebra (Macmillan & Co., Dallas) should be made the basis of the work.

PHYSICAL GEOGRAPHY: In this study, Tarr's New Physical Geography (The Macmillan Co., Dallas) should be made the basis of the work.

PLANE GEOMETRY: In this subject the question will be confined to books three, four and five, inclusive, as given in Wentworth's Plane Geometry, revised by Wentworth and Smith, (Ginn & Co., Dallas).

GENERAL HISTORY: This course should be confined to the medieval and modern period of history, with Myers' Medieval and Modern History Revised Edition (Ginn & Co., Dallas) as the text.

PERMANENT SUBJECTS

HISTORY OF EDUCATION: This work should be confined to the modern period as outlined in Parker's Modern Elementary Education (Ginn & Co., Dallas)

PSYCHOLOGY: Special attention should be given to the study of the subject in its practical application to teaching rather than as an abstract science. The work should be based on Colvin & Bagley's Human Behavior (The Macmillan Co., Dallas)

LITERATURE: The course this year should be confined to a study of the English authors, as outlined in Halleck's English Literature (American Book Co., Dallas) For special study the following classics are recommended: Shakespeare's Merchant of Venice, Palgrave's Golden Treasury, Macaulay's Life of Johnson. Any good edition of the classics will be acceptable.

CHEMISTRY: The course should be devoted to the phases of descriptive chemistry included in Chapter 19 to 35, inclusive, of Brown's First Principles of Chemistry (Allyn & Bacon, Chicago).

SOLID GEOMETRY: The work should be confined to a careful study of Wentworth-Smith's Solid Geometry revised by Wentworth-Smith, (Ginn & Co., Dallas).

PHYSICS: The work should be confined to a careful study of Chapters 8 to 14, inclusive, as found in Carhart & Chute's First Principles of Physics (Allyn & Bacon, Chicago).

TRIGONOMETRY: Careful study should be made of the subject as found in Wentworth's Plane Trigonometry (Ginn & Co., Dallas).

BOOKKEEPING: The work will be based on Williams & Rogers' Modern Illustrative Bookkeeping (The American Book Co., Dallas).

RECORD

Probably there is not a Summer Normal in the State of Texas holding a better record than this one. So far as we have been able to learn, ninety percent of those taking the examinations at the close of this Normal last year secured State Certificates.

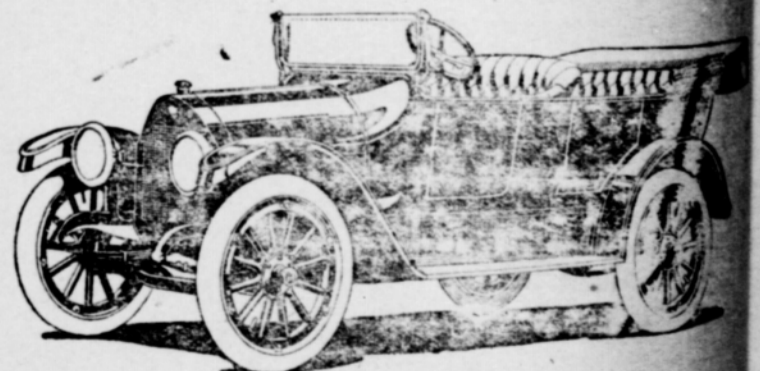
