Teriffic Hail and Wind Storm One Dead, One May Die

Similtaneously hail and rain swept the earth bare of vegeta tion. Unable to breast the family, Mr. Mears fell flat on the ground, and with his boy by his side crawled half the dis tance on his stomach before the enough for him to gain his hands and knees, and later his feet to dash to their rescue.
