the brines conform generally to the type mentioned.

A preliminary investigation of this region has just been made by the United States Geological Survey of the interior, in co-operation with the Bureau of Economic Geology and Technology of the University of Texas. Shallow holes were sunk in Cedar, Guthrie, Brownfield Mound and Rich lakes, and samples were collected and analyzed.

The data at hand is not sufficient to indicate the quantity of brine in the region. There is a difference of opinion as to the source of the brine. Some contend that they are of deepseated origin; others contend that they are confined to a relatively thin stratum near the surface. Further more, the clayev mud that underlies the lakes is more or less impervious and prevents the brine from flowing freely. ball played on the Slaton grounds | Test holes sunk in some of the lakes last Sunday afteroon, between encountered flows of water at several different horizons, which indicates that the water bearing strates are separated by layers of more or less imimpervious material. In Cedar Lake sandstone was ecountered 5 feet below the surface, and in Guthrie Lake limeintensely interesting during the stone was found 7 feet below the surface. "Flows of water were noted at at the upper surface of both the sandstone and limestone but whether these rocks are porous enough to carry an appreciable amount of brine is not known. Mound, Rich and Brownfield lakes contain brine bearing a depth of 20 feet. Brines have been reported in Guthrie Lake at a depth of 30 feet.

> The feasibility of producing potash and bromine from these brines at a cost that will permit competition with potash and bromine produced from other sources depends upon the many factors, including the quantity of available brine in the region and the development of an economical process of extraction, and cannot be foretold. The location is unfavorable for obtaining fuel and labor and is far from markets. and as the brines occur in muds that lie beneath the surface, the production in quantity would be expensive and difficult.

> The salts of these brines contain a smaller percentage of potash than that yielded by the potash materials in Germany, Alsace, Nebraska, and Searls Lake, but on the other hand they con-

Austin, Texas .- With a quorum present in each branch the special session of the legislature called by Governor Hobby convened at 10 o'clock Thursday morning.

Governor Hobby sent two messages er fith reference to aid for education and institutions.

The senate elected unanimously Senator A. C. Buchanan of Bell county president pro tem.

The Mexico City press announces that trains captured from Carranza were being brought to Mexico City and that civilians who remained with the trains are being given every protection. The press stated that those who accompanied Carranza in his departuie from the Mexican capital are being pursued by the revolutionary cavalry.

A circular signed by General Obregon has been published ordering a military parade to embrace 30.000 men as participants at Mexico City next week, as a demonstration of allegiance to the provisional president to be selected by the Mexican congress opinion. then. The press stated that members of the Mexican diplomatic corps have been given fifteen days to declare their ellegiance to the new regime.

The decisions thus reported have been favorably received in French circles. While a total amount to be paid as reparation is much lower than the figure France desired, and is still further short of the actual sum de clared to be required to restore the devastated regions and pay for other daelage, it is pointed out that 66,000, 000,000 marks in gold, which is figured as France's share, would be equivalent to nearly 240,000,000,000 francs in French paper. > HOOVER SEES LONG SHORTAGE OF SUGAR

Two or Three Years Before Supply Equals Demand, He Says.

BEING CLEARED UP TRAINS OF EMPTY BOX CARS MOVE WESTWARD FROM NEW ENGLAND.

FREIGHT JAM IS NOW

Washington .- Success seems to be crowning efforts to relieve freight congestion, according to announcement by the interstate commerce commission. It is stated that the movement of the empty box cars for grain loading had begun in large volume westward from New England and the Atlantic seaboard.

These cars are being moved in solid trains under expedited orders, and their transfer is watched continually to avoid delays, the commission says.

Simultaneously a counter-movement of cars for coal loading has been instituted from the middle west to the coal producing areas of the east.

Announcement is made by the commission that this method of handling equipment would be continued "until a more proper balance of these classes of equipment is obtained." and predicted considerable relief both by providing foods and fuel where needed and by easing the financfal strain resulting from the long-continued tie-up. Officials of the American Railroad association pedicted a "regular and continuous" movement of empty cars within a short period, but the associa-

tion's car service committee warned that the demand for cars continued to increase and that the association of equipment should be made with the utmost care to avoid further jam at all gateways.

A "grave crisis, involving the industrial life of the country," has resulted from failure of soft coal operators to obtain an adequate car supply, the National Coal association declared in a general survey based on reports from members in many sections.

The United Mine Workers of America, also in a statement quoting John Moore, president of the Ohio miners said that unless something was done immediately to relieve the car situation the public would find itself without coal next winter. Responsibility for present conditions, Moore charges, "rests squarely on the railroads and their unjust and unfair discrimination in the distribution of coal cars."

TO CHECK MENACE REVIEWS TEXAS SITUATION AS REGARDS PINK BOLLWORM.

GOVERNOR ASKS LAWS

SCHOOL CRISIS.

Austin, Texas .- Having pledged the feder. horticultural board of the United States department of agriculture the full co-operation of Texas in preventing the spread of the pink bollworm, in order to avoid an absolute quarantine against Texas cotton and cotton products, Governor Hobby sent a special message to the legislature in special session, Thursday morning, recommending that it consider the establishment of non-cotton zones and the compensation of cotton growers within those zones.

The message reviews the situation since 1917 and the action taken then, when the pink boll-worm first appeared, and later in 1919 when noncotton zones were established in southeast Texas counties.

He calls attention to the notice of the federal horticultural board warning against a probable quarantine against the cotton products of Texas and Louisiana and calling for a hearing on April 6, 1920.

At this hearing the federal horticultural board set out the following restrictive actions which should be taken by the state of Texas:

"Establishment of a non-cotton area in Jefferson, Chambers, Galveston, Brazoria, Harris, Liberty, Fort Bend, Jasper and Newton counties.

"Establishment of a regulated zone of 25 miles in width surrounding this non-cotton zone in which cotton may be grown only under the control of state authorities.

"Establishment of a ten-mile zone around all oil mills known to have received seed in the last three years from any infested districts.

"Continued maintenance and control of the non-cotton yone established in 1918 along the Big Bend district of the Rio Grande for a distance of five miles back from the border."

the position of the pink boll worm commission that such non-cotton zones should not be established unless provision is made to compensate the afzone, he says, cannot be established under the present law.

Declaring that he submits the subject for such legislation as may be necessary, Governor Hobby calls attention to the fact that quarantines against Texas cotton already have been established by Arizona, Arkansas, Louisiana, Florida, Mississippi, Oklafoma and South Carolina and that Georgia, North Carolina and Alabama have given notice they will quarantine unless the restrictive measures are adopted.

The pink boll-worm act of March 10, 1919, authorized the payment of compensation to affected growers of in the area, but no appropriation was made to pay the claims which now amount to \$32,755.46. It is recommended that the legislature make an appropriation to pay these bills.

It also is recommended that what ever measures be passed at this session contain provisions for the compensation of affected growers.

Second Message

The governor's second message to the special session of the legislature was with reference to the crisis in school affairs of the state. He requested the legislature to make full inquiry into educational needs of Texas, with a view of averting inefficiency or inadequacy in schools, from highest to lowest.



III. Jonathan's Resolution to Go Against the Philistines (vv. 6-10.) 1. Jonathan's summons to the young man (v. 6). Here the thought of verse one is resumed, verses two to five being patenthetical. 2. The noble response of his armorbearer (v. 7). He was actuated by the same faith and courage as Jonathan and entered heartily into the undertaking. When two agree together as touching anything in the name of Christ it shall be done (Matt. 18:19, 20). .

"3. Watching for the will of God (vv. 8-10). Doubtless the same Spirit who had moved Jonathan to go had instructed him to watch for the Divine leading. The sign that God would deliver the Philistines into their hands was the invitation for Jonathan and his companion to come up to the Philistines. (vv. 11-16).

Being assured of the divine leading, Jonathan with his armorbearer sprang forward saying that the Lord had delivered the enemy into the hands of Israel. He did not say "into our hands," but "into the hands of Israel." This is a fine touch of humility; it shows that it was zeal for God, not selfish ambition that impelled him to go forth. God interposed by a great earthquake, causing consternation among the Philistines, moving them to destroy each other.


