A Letler From a Practical Farmer,

LYNN COUNTY.

Mr. Editor:

I moved from near Dublir, Erath County, Texas, to Lynn Co, in an. 1897. I reuted 70 acres of sod. raised 8 bales of cotten, about six hundred bushels of corn, about five tons of headed maize, about three hundred bundles of caffir corn and sorghum, and I sold my cotton for from \$50 to \$60 per bale. What corn I had to spare I sold for seventy-five cents per bushel. I sold over two thousand bundles of kaffir corn and sorghum at five cents per bundle; my headed maize at \$15 per ton.

I am renting land this year, and have a fine crop of a hundred and hirty acres-eighty acres in cotton, balance in corn, kaffir corn and maize. My cotton is fine and looking as we'll as I cou'd wish for at this time of year. My corn is now in roasting ears, and all other crops on the farm are as fine as they are

I landed in Lynn county with 160 acres of land, for which I paid seven dollars per acre, and I have it all paid out except \$220.

I have a wife and four children, and we have livee out of our crop and paid \$520 and the interest on our land notes out of last year's crop, over and above the \$400 I brought to Lynn county with me. This year's crop will put me out of debt on my land and leave me o nething to improve with,

I have lived on a farm all of my life. Was raised in Indiana and I linois and came to Texas twentysix years ago. I have never foun! an all round farming country that I consider equal in every respect to Lynn Coun'y, I don't know of any other place in Texas, or any state in which I have ever lived, that a man can rent land and pay for a good home in two years.
