## "The Staked Plains."

The Llano Estacado, commonly called the "Staked Plains," is a peculiar geological formation found in no other place on the earth. It was once the bottom of a fresh water lake, but was lifted up until a great plateau was formed, surrounded on nearly all aides by a wall-like escarpment. This wall in some places, notably in Brisco and Motley counties, attains an almest perpendicular height of from 50 to 400 feet, while in places the line between the Plains and the surrounding territory is hardly perceptable. It has been erroneously stated by some that the great plateau was called the "Staked Plains' becanse of the yucca or Spanish Dagger, a growth that resembles a stake or Post, growing from two to eight feet high and having a head of sharp spears. Large areas of this are to be seen in the southern part of the "Staked Plains." Another current story is that the first and early Plainsmen put up stakes as they crossed the vast expanse in order to "blaze" a way and insure a safe retura if the trail was lost. Neither of these theories are correct. - The first Spanish explorers named the Greac Plateau, "Llano Estacado," which when translated means palisaded plains or walled plains, trom the wall which forms most of the bor der to the now 'staked Piains.' This wall is called the "Cap Rock' in some sections and has the appearance of low flat top mountains as they are approached.

The boundary line of the 'Staked Plains' may be roughly given as follows: Beginning at a point in the north western part of Deaf Smith county; thence following the "Cap Rock" thru Oldham, Potter Carson counties, parallel with the trend of the Canadian river to a point near Pampa, Texas, on the Santa Fe railroad; thence turning and taking in most of Gray county, across the corner of Donley, thru the eastern part of Armstrong county, crossing the Denver road between Goodnight and Claude; thence across the eastern part of Brise, county into Motley and following an irregular line thru Dickens, Crosby, Garza, Bord. 11 and Howard counties to the town of Big Springs on the Texas \& Pacific road. For conveuieuce the line of this road is followed until the Pecos valley is reached; thence north parallel with the :rend of that river cutting a strip in New
to place of beginning. This constitutes what shotnd be designated the "Staked Plains," or the Llano Estacado of Texas and New Mexico.
The elevation is highest in Oldham county, where it is some 4,000 feet above sea level and it slopes gently towards the southeast at the fall of about 15 feet to the mile. The area of this great plain including that part in New Mexico will exceed 35,000 square miles, being some 175 miles wide and 225 miles long. The "Staked Plains" are larger than the state of Indiana, Hereford Brand.

Stamford, one of the very thest towns in central west Texas, has engaged the services ct a regular town builder, to act as secretary of their Commercial Club, and they are paying him a good salary to devote bis entire time and experiance to the upbuilding and development of Stamford

One of the most vital questions in the welfare of a town is health. What our town needs is a vigilance committee who will give no favor, and will inspect premises, both public and private, and require the owners to clean up. A barrel or a box in the ally or hack yard is a handy receptacle for all trash or refuse and can be easily hauled away.
The sheriff has teen appointed chairman of a committee to look after the sanitary condition of all premises, some of which are distressing. When have the public tanks been cleaned out? The reputation of our town and county will suffer if something is not done. Some of our citizens are careful about these things and some are improving conditions.
A town is no place for a hog ranch, neither is it the place for a private pig. Yuu may fix the pig pen where you don't smell it, but that will not protect your neighbor's nose. A pig is a menance to health whether he runs at large or is confined to his own pen. We should have so much town pride that this would be an unnecessay measure, and strangers would not be compelled to say this was the dirtiest place they ever saw.

Now, brother citizen, get your shovel and rake and a can of kerosine oil and clean up, burn up and don't wait to be warned by this Committee that you are a public nuisance. If you teel bad go to your back yard and hunt up the trouble and get rid of it.

## WORK BEGUN.

To say the least of it, our railroad proposition is now looking better than ever before. Gradiug was started Monday, as was said it would be and contracts are now signed up with the O' Donnell Con struction company, a strong firm of San Angelo, for a lig block of the grade, and work is to begin as soon as their outfit can get here. They will put on eighty teams.
We are pleased to note that confidence in the rozd is being rapidly restored. - -This must be due to the fact that no promise has yet been broken, each and all promises have so far been lived up to, the letter. Mr. Bon Durant states that work would have gone on several days ago and a much larger force of teams and men would be working here now if only Stanton had been more prompt in fixing up her bonus and right-of way contracts.
The right-of-way question still seems to be in some doubt and Mr. Bon Durant states that he still fears he may yet be compelied to go to the heavy expense of condemnation proceedings. Taking everything all in all. however, this much can be said, that every day makes things look much better for the new railroad. Hans Helland, consulting engineer for Mr. Bon Durant, arrived in town this morning to take charge of general construction, and W. D. Quian, assistant chief engineer, has been here several days at the office of the Seaboard Northern Construction Co.

Confidence has been instilled to such an extent that Col. C. C. Slaughter is willing to agree to give at least $\$ 17,500$ to the road between here and Lamesa and Mr. Bon Durant has told Col. Slaughter's representative that this sum will be used in buying a small part of the steel to be used ou the road. -Stanton Reporter.
