A Woman Solding

Eleonore Prochaska, born March 11, 1785, at Potsdam, was the daughter of a sergeant. After being brought up in "Football or ring?"-Kansas City the military orphanage of that town she became a cook in some citizen's house. When the great war against Napoleon broke out in 1813 she was led away by enthusiasm to quit her town secretly. By selling her poor belongings she procured male attire and weapons and enlisted under the name of August Renz in the Lutzow corps. On account of her tall, slender figure her sex was not discovered until she was mortally wounded. This happened in the encounter in the Gohrde forest, Regierungsbezirk, Luneburg, Kreis Dannenberg, Sept. 16, 1813. The Prusslans were there attempting to storm a hill occupied by the French, she acting as a drummer. In 1863 a monument in memory of her was erected in the churchyard at Dannenberg and another in 1889 in the old churchyard of Potsdam .- London Sketch.
