While it has not yet been definitely determined where the work shall be started to reclaim the millions of acres of fertil land in Texas now of tittle value because of the overflows, it was decided at a meeting last week of the state levee and drainage board, which also conferred with the governor, that no time will be lost, but a preliminary investigation be made at once to decide which of the several localities that have been presented is best adapted for beginning the work. Arthur Stiles, state levee and drainage commissioner, and E. C. Barnard, chief of the geological survey of the Rocky Mountain division, are bere to superintend the work, for which the legislature appropriated \$40. coo for the first year, and an amount is also available from the national treasury. Included in the preliminary investigations will be portions of Burleson and Wash ington counties and territory along the Trinity river in Dallas and Rockwall counties.

PROJECTS NOW UN-

Austin, Tex., Sept. 16.-Nearly one thousand miles of railroad are under construction in Texas at this time, or will be as fast as the propositions can be reached. The exact total of mileage agreed upon and part of which is under construction is 744 miles. The figures for each road follow: The Santa Fe cutoff from Coleman to Texico, 310 miles; the Santa Fe's San Saba little or nothing is known about Valley line frome Lometa to Brady, 45 miles; santa Fe's extension from San Angelo to Sterling City, 38; Santa Fe Line from Longuiew to Red River. which must be completed by July 12 of next year in order to save izing the line to absorb the Texas and Gulf, 100 miles; Rock Island, from Arden to State line. 38 miles; Timpson and Henderson, from Ragley to Henderson, 30 miles: Enid, Ochiltree and Western, Dalhart to Ochiltree,

Bartlett-Florence Railway, Bart lett to Florence, 23 miles; Quanah, Acme and Pacific, to Paducah, 38 miles. In one or two instances the distances given are probably less than the actual mileage will be. The foregoing extensions are absolutely a surety and will be built as soon as possible. Orient is also building from Sweetwater to San Angelo.


