





The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation submitting this amendment to the qualified voters of Texas at the next general election held in this State, or in case ar.y previous election shall be had in the State for other purposes, then this proposed amendment shall be submitted to the qualified tax paying voters. And the sum of \$2000. or so much thereof as shall be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the treasury of the State of Texas for the purpose of submitting this proposition to a vote of the people of the State of Texas. Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Creating the Office of Commissioner of Agriculture.

JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to Article four (4) of the Coustitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a section to be known as Sec tion 27, providing for a Depatment of Agriculture, with a burean of labor. Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas.

SECTION 1. That Article four (4) of he Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto Section 7, when a majority of the qualified efecors of the Legislature of Texas at an lection for that purpose shall vote in vor of the amendment, shall read as lows:

Section 27. The Legislature shall proe for the office of Commissioner of Aglture, who shall be either elected by qualified voters of the State, or apted by the Governor with the ice and consent of two-thirdsof the Legislature as the te may Ide; whose term of office, duties salary shall be prescribed by in which department there shall blished by the Legislature a bu-

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Providing for the Creation of Improvement Districts in Certain Cities.

JOINT RESOLUTION amending Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the creation of improvement districta in cities of more than five thousand inhabitants and charging the cost of certain improvements made therein against the abutting property.

SECTION I. Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That Section 9 of Article 8 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

SEC. 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of public free schools, shall never exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy more than twenty. five cents for city or county purposes, and not exceeding fifteen cents for roads and bridges, and not exceeding fifteen cents to pay jurors, on the hundred doilars valuation, except for payment of debts incured prior to the adoption of the amendment September 25, A D, 1887, and for the erection of public buildings, streets, sewers, water works and other permanent improvements, not to exceed twenty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation, in any one year, and except as is in this Constitution otherwise provided; and the Legis ature may also authorize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of the public roads; provided, that a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that or authorize the making any grant of purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed fifteen cents on the one hundred dollars valuation, of the property subject to taxation in such county. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the mainnance of the public roads and highways,

And the voters opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the following: "Against the amendment to Section 9 of Article 8 of the Constitution, permiting property owners in cities of more than five thousand inhabitants to create improvement districts, one-third the cost of which to be charged against abutting property on either side of the street.

SEC. The lateness in the session, the crowded condition of the calendars of both houses, and the importance of this proposed amendment, create an emergency and an imperative public necessity demanding that the constitutional rule, and Be it enacted by the Legislature of the Senate Rule No. 37, requiring bills to be read on three several days be suspended. and the same are hereby suspended. Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Providing for the Establishment of a Home for Confederate Widows.

JOINT RESOLUTION to amend Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended in 1903, so as to authorize the grant of aid in the establishment and maintenance of a home for the disabled and dependent wives and widows of Confederate soldiers and sailors and such women as aided the Confederacy, and making an appropriation.

SECTION I. Be it Resolved by the Legslature of the State of Texas: That Seetion 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended in 1903, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows: Article 3. Section 51. The Legislature public money to any individual, associations or individuals, municipal or other corporationa whatsoever; provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to diers and sailor who came to Texas 1907, at which election all voters fi In addition to the foregoing, cities of of age or whose disability is the proxiand who have been bona fide residents of the State of Texas since March 1, 1880. and who were married to such soldiers anterior to March 1, 1880; provided said the members of the Lesislature." aid shall not exceed eight dollars per month, and provided further, that no appurpose hereinbefore specified in excess one year. And also grant aid to the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors, their wives and widows and women who aided in the limitations as may be provided by law; provided the grant to aid said home shall [A true copy.] L. T. DASHIELL, Secrenot exceed one hundred and fifty thousand dollars for any one year, and no inmate of said homes shall be entitled to any other aid from the state: the Legislature may provide for husband and wife to remain together in the home: and provided further, that the provisions of this section shall not be construed to prevent the grant of aid in case of unbile calamity.

The sum of \$5000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated to pay the expenses of carrying out the provisions of this resolution. [A true copy.] L. T. DASHIELL, Secretary of State.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Fixing the Salary of Members of the Legislature. AN ACT to amend Section 21 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of

Texas, relating to the compensation of members of the Legislature.

State of Texas:

SECTION I. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 24. The members of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury such compensation for their services as may from time to time be provided by law, not to exceed one thousand dollars for each year in which a biennial session of the Legislature is held under the provisions of this Constitution and five dollars for each day of any Special Session held during the subsequent year, and in addition thereto, they shall receive mileage in going to and returning from the State Capital, not to exceed three cents a mile; distance to be computed by nearest railroad route, and the comptroller shall prepare and preserve a table of distances for each county seat now or hereafter to be established, and by such table the mileage of each member shall be paid; no member shall be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day shall have no power to make any grant after the adjournment of a Regular or Cailed Session.

SEC. 2. State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Section 21 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 21. All printing and publishing, and all stationery, paper and fuel for various departments, and for all offices, whether created by this Constitution or by law, shall be done and supplied as may be provided by law, and for the accomplishment of these objects and purposes the Legislature may provide and establish all requisite means and agencies, invested with such powers as may be deemed adequate and advisable

SEC. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday in August A. D. 1907, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shail write or have printed on their ballots the words "For the amendment to Section 21 of Article XVI of the Constitution, relating to stationery, printing, paper and fuel" and all those opposed shall write or have prinied on their ballots the words "Against the amendment to Section 21 of Article XVI of the Constitution, relating to stationery, printing, paper and fuel.

SEC. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for -aid election and to have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

SEC. 4 That the sum of two thousand \$2000) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby approprieatton and election.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Authorizing the

Levy of a Road Tax.

JOINT RESOLUTION amending Section 9. Articles, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a section to be known as Section 9a. increasing the amount of tax that may be voted for the purpose of improving public roads, and to allow counties or political subdivisions of counties by a majority vote of the qualified property tax paying voters of the county, or subdivision thereof, voting at all elections, to be held for that purpose, to adopt same.

more than five thousand inhabitants may lay out within their corporate limits, improvement districts in which they, by and with the consent of a majority of the taxpayers owning real estate therein, may build sidewalks and charge the cost thereof against the abutting property, and may build sewers and pave streets and charge one-third of the cost thereof against the abutting property on either side of the streets upon which such improvements are made in such district, and the amount charged against all such abutting property shall be deemed and held to be a tax against and a lien upon such abutting property, and the Legislature is required to enact laws prescribing the means for ascertaining the amount properly chargeable against each parcel of abutting property, and providing for the enforcement of its collection.

SEC. 2. The Governor is hereby direct. ed to issue the necessary proclamation for submitting this amendment to the Constitution to the qualified voters of the State of Texas on the first Tuesday in August, A. D. 1907, at which election all voters favoring this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots: "For the amendment to Section 9 of Article 8 of the Constitution, permitting property owners in cities of more than ive thousand inhabitants to create imrovement districts, one-third the cost of thick to be charged against abutting monerty on either side of the street."

Suc. 2. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this smendment to the quailfied voters of the State of Texas on the first Tuesday in August, 1907.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Autorizing the Establishment of a State Printing Plant.

JOINT RESOLUTION authorizing the submission to a vote of the people of the State of Texas of a proposed amendment of Section 21. Article XVI. of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to printing, publishing, stationery, paper and fuel, and making an appropriation therefor. Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Section 9 of Article 8 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 9n, which shall read as follows:

Section 9a. A majority of the property tax paving voters in any county or one or more political subdivisions thereof, in this State, voting at an election held for that purpose may vote a tax for road and bridge purposes not to exceed 30 cents on the \$100 valuation of property subject to taxation in such county or . political subdivision of such county, or may issue bonds not to exceed 20 per cent of the assessed value of the real property in such district, for such road and bridge purposes, provided that such tax, or proceeds of such bonds, shall be expended in the territory -in which it is voted, and no other, and this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislaated, out of any funds in the Treasuary of the State of Texas not otherwise app.o. priated, to pay the expenses of such publition.


