Perry Clayton, who has just returned from a trip to the south and west, tells us that Lynn County is in about as good condition as any of the country he passed through, and is considerably better off than the most. We have had enough rain all over the county to keep the grass in good condition and in most of the county the rains have been plentiful enough to give a good promise of crops, which is about as good as we can expect, this year of poor condition all over the state. There is still plenty of time for us to raise good feed crops all over Lynn County and in many parts there will be cotton and corn, which will help the general prosperity of our citizens.

There is a good deal of promiscuous shooting done about town, which ought to stop. There have been complaints made of residences being struck by stray shots from target practice or careless hunting within the town limits. This practice is strictly against the law and is very dangerous as well as disagreeable. People who use a gun should regard the safety and comfort of those who don't, by getting out of the residence portion of town to indulge in the use of firearms. The present County Administration has been very lenient toward the thoughtless offender, and has warned rather than punished, in a number of cases. Now the kind and proper course for the sportsmen of the town will be to give the citizens no further annoyance in this respect and the administration no further trouble and incidentally do the proper thing by themselves and their town.

FOUR GENERATIONS.

In the Dallas News of last Sunday appeared a half-tone cut of a group of four generations of a prominent Hereford family. They were J. L. Beach, the great-grandfather, a Georgian who is 75 years old; the grand-father, W. B. Beach, who was born in Louisiana, now 48 years old; the father, J. H. Beach, born in Grayson county, now 28 years old; the son, grand-son and great-grand-son, Davis Beach, born in Deaf Smith county and is three years old.

The Beach family moved to the Panhandle in 1890 and settled in Castro county and after the organization of Hereford moved here. W. B. Beach was the first County and District Clerk of Castro county, to which office he was re-elected four successive terms. In Deaf Smith county he held the office of Clerk for two terms, voluntarily refusing to be considered a candidate in 1906. Shortly after retiring from politics he was elected president of the First State Bank of Hereford, which office he now holds.

The great-grand-father, J. L. Beach, although an old man in years, is active, strong and energetic, and can do more and harder work than many men much younger.

The Beaches were among the first settlers of Hereford and are prominently associated with the interests of Hereford and the Panhandle.—Hereford Brand.


There was singing at Mr. Mills's Sunday night.

RAILROAD NEWS.**Grading Will Soon be Completed. Bridge Material, Ties and Steel Ordered.**

Hans Helland, chief engineer of the Panhandle Short Line Railroad, in conversation with a Brand representative this week, gave out some important railroad news. He stated that his surveying corps had passed through Castro county and were now working south of the new townsite of Norfleet in Hale county, and would finish the survey to Stanton, on the Texas & Pacific, in three or four weeks.

He further stated that the contractors had six outfits at work on the line between Hereford and Dimmitt, using in the neighborhood of one hundred teams. Most of the elevating has been done and all of the grading will be completed by the last of July or the first of August.

Bridge material has been ordered

for the large bridges across the Tierra Blanco river and Frio creek, and also for the smaller bridges and culverts between Hereford and Dimmitt. Cross-ties and steel have been ordered for the new road and are expected to be on the ground within a short time.

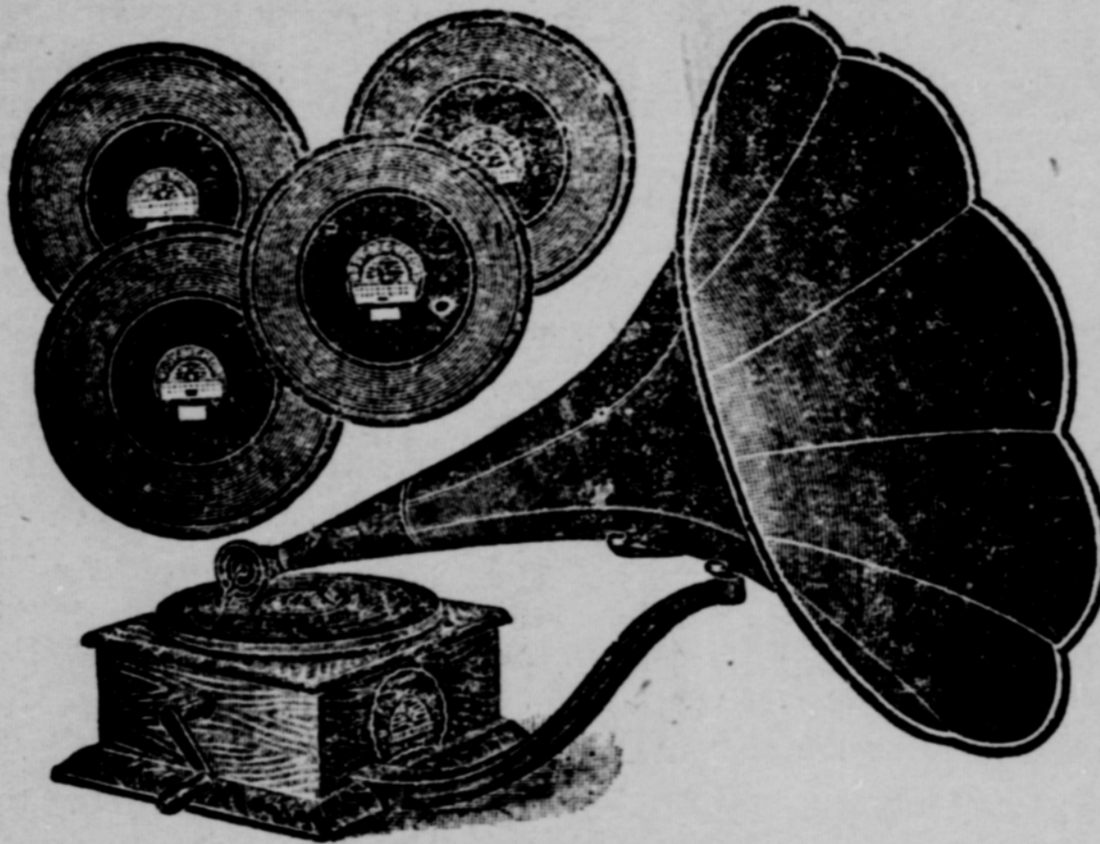
