A TIMELY TALK.

Editor Lynn County News:

If you will allow me the use of your valuable space, I would like to give the patrons of the Post Office a few points that might be of mutual benefit to them and myself

First, the Post Office Departments make rules, and we, as servants, must comply. A late order says that postal cards in envelopes must be stamped on the outside of the envelope even though it might have a hole opposite the stamp and a card or anything inclosed in an envelope, containing writing, sealed or unsealed, becomes a letter, and is subject to letter postage, 2cts per oz. Drop letters for delivery on rural or star routes or placed in boxes on routes for delivery at the home office require the full postage, the same as any place in the United States.

If you can, mail and register your letters, etc. early in the day, as we have three mails to make up and send off at 2 p. m. and especially while the days are short and the roads are bad, the mails arrive late. We have out going mail to make up while you wait impatiently for the office to open, when we might have had that mostly done, before the mail comes if you had brought mail to the office earlier.—A. B. McLoud, P. M.

Mr. McLoud is perfectly fair in asking the patrons of the Post Office to be early with their mail, so that the out-going mails may be ready as far as possible, when the hack arrives. In return for the prompt and accommodating service our Postmaster has rendered, we should be willing to grant his request for promptness, which is
