NEW GIN STARTED TUESDAY

TAHOKA NOW A COTTON
MARKET TOWN

As predicted in last week's News, our new gin started running the first part of this week. Bright and early Tuesday morning, the power was turned on at the new plant and soon the first bale of Lynn county cotton ever ginned in Tahoka was lying on the yard waiting for a buyer.

This cotton was all raised by Mr. C. C. McLaurin on his farm near Central in the southwest part of the county and fifteen miles from town. Quite a handsome premium—about \$30 was raised for him.

The new gin has been running pretty steadily this week and over fifty bales have been turned out. Very little difficulty was experienced in starting or running the machinery, since the men in charge are experienced ginners and know their business. We are glad to know that this new enterprise has made such a fine start.

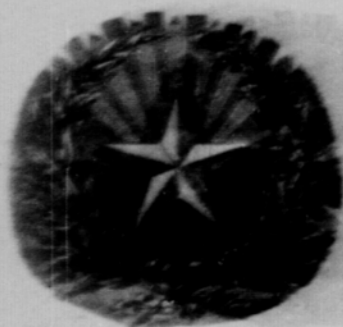

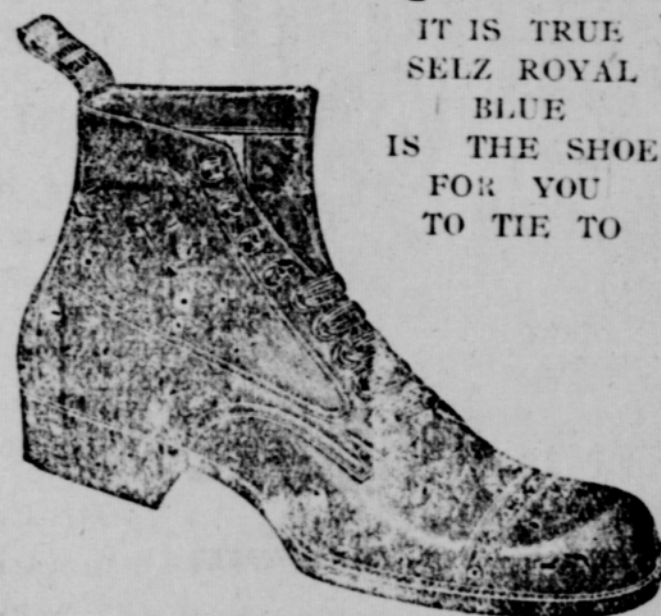
