Tahoka To The Front.

New Gin—New Store—New Woodman Hall.

This issue of the News marks the dawning of a new era in the history of Tahoka and Lynn county for before this paper reaches half of its readers, Lynn county will have passed from the all cattle class of counties to the stock farming class. If nothing unforeseen interferences, the new gin will be tearing loose the cotton in the next day or two.

This new plant, put in by Messers Wells and Welner at a cost of nearly \$5000, is the biggest thing in the machinery line ever brought to Tahoka. The system used is the Minger Continental and consists of two 70 saw stands and a duplex press and is equipped with pneumatic conveyors and numerous other conveniences. The outfit, which has a capacity of three bales per hour, is driven by a 40 horsepower Fairbanks-Morse single cycle gasoline engine, cooled by water and ignited by an electric dynamo and storage battery. To give some idea of the magnitude of this new enterprise, we would mention that the two flywheels of the engine are six feet in diameter and hung on a shaft over four inches in diameter. Shaft and wheels together weigh over 5000 lbs—a big four horse load.

Mr. Wells expects to put in a feed and and grist mill, which with the 40 ton seed house, will make the gin plant very popular with the stockmen.

The gin will make cotton raising profitable and cause many new farms to be opened up and give a new impetus to the work of settling up the country. More money will be brought into the country and Tahoka will take a new spell of growing which will make its present phenomenal progress look like 29 cents. With plenty of cotton to haul to the railroad, freighting at 40 cents per 100 with a load both ways would pay better than 65 cents and loading just one way. This will result in cheaper goods for consumers and better profits for merchants.

We are proud of our new gin and extend our compliments to the two men whose masterly management has accomplished so much in such a short time, and our congratulations to the people of Tahoka on their securing the gin soon enough to handle this season's cotton, and we hope it will have a heavy run.

The important work of plowing fire-guards should not be longer delayed. We would not feel that we had done our duty if we failed to warn the people from time to time about matters of vital interest to the common welfare.

Twenty months hence the law prohibiting the killing of antelope will be inoperative on account of the five years being up. The State should set apart a few hundred square miles of wild mountain and desert land for preservation of wild animals as it is something of an injustice for settlers to be forced to feed them without killing a fat one now and then as they would of their hogs and cattle.

We hear some complaint of damage done to the school house during the Woodman supper last Saturday eve. It is nice to be able to use the school house for gatherings in a community but the general public should bear in mind that the first object of school property is to facilitate the education of children. This object cannot be properly fulfilled if some thoughtless person is going to damage the seats, put the bell out of action and otherwise inconvenience both teachers, pupils and patrons.

A Prince Of Prevaricators.

After the battle of Santiago, the immortal Schley said: "There is glory enough for us all," but he was mistaken, for a jealous rival soon undertook to appropriate all the glory for himself.

Now, the homeseekers are pouring into all parts of Texas by the thousands, but the fact that most of them are coming to the western part of the State, where fertile land can still be had cheap, has excited the jealousy of the editors and land agents back in the thickly settled counties where farming land is anywhere from \$25 to \$100 per acre; and in order to keep people from coming here, they have resorted to all kinds of rank falsehoods about the plains country. These slanders should not go unchallenged any longer.

A correspondent in the Farmers' Forum of the Dallas News, complains that the letters from this section are too highly colored. He claims to have explored Lynn and adjacent counties and talked with a number of farmers, all of whom wanted to sell out pretty bad, but these same farmers, he says, told him that the blue weeds were taking the country and ruining the farms. Pretty bright men to run down the thing they were trying to sell!

Evidently, the writer was drunk half the time or else travelled altogether at night, for he did not see a single newly improved place on the entire trip. Had he travelled along the main roads in day time as any honest white man should have done, he could not have passed from Gail to Tahoka and thence to Lubbock without seeing dozens of newly improved places. He would have found that instead of farmers all wanting to sell out, our real estate men can't get hold of enough improved farms to supply the demand for them.

The man who wrote that letter must have been an emissary of the land and town booming corporations back east, it seems incredible that any fairminded person would perpetrate such an assortment of falsehoods on a long suffering public. Among the many advantages of Lynn county over the east, we might mention: cheap land producing fine crops, plenty of moisture without floods and tornadoes, fine climate, good water, good health and good society; no negroes, paupers, criminals, chills, splenic fever, crab grass, rag weeds, cockle burs. Any of the above-named vegetables are harder to get rid of than the blue weeds.
