

THD Reminds Motorists How To Register Autos

AUSTIN- The Texas High-way Department has reminded motorists of some DOs and DON' Ts for obtaining 1970 motor vehicle registrations. The Motor Vehicle Regis-

tration Division of the Department has initiated a new partment has initiated a new computerized registration system this year. In the past motorists have

had to take their previous year's registration and auto title to the county tax collector's office or substation to obtain new license plates.

This year motorists were mailed a three-part computeroriented registration form about January 1.

If a motorist wishes to renew his registration by mail he should mail the three-part form to his county tax collector, with his check for the registration fee plus one dollar to cover postage and handling. Some county tax collectors will accept only money orders or cashier's checks.

new his registration in per-son he should take the threepart registration form to his county tax collector's office or substation with his check or money order.

Mail orders will be accept-ed only until March 1, allowing 30 days for delivery. Registrations will be made in person through midnight April deadline for obtaining new auto license plates.

The Highway Department's list of DOs and DON'Ts for all motorists:

Remember, you will save time at your county tax collector's office if you use the computerized form. There is no extra charge if you obtain your license plates in person.

Vernon Adcock Seeks District Attorney Post



During my many years of service as either county attorney or county judge there have been very few appeals from our county court convictions and there has never been a reversal in a case in which I have served either as prosecutor or trial judge.



As outstanding as these things are, they won't compare with something I read on page 14 in a newspaper last night.

According to it, a manufacturer has perfected and is now offering for sale men's socks guaranteed to last a lifetime.

That's right. He says he guarantees they'll never wear out and if they do he'll replace them with a new pair free. He guarantees them against everything except losing them in the laundry, or having them

pulled off the clothes line by a playful dog. Now I haven't seen any of these

socks and can't vouch for them but it's the idea that appeals to me. It never had occurred to me be-

fore, but say the average man or boy wears out a dozen pairs of socks a year. With a hundred million males in this country, that's 12 hundred million pairs, or 24 hundred million socks thrown away each year. No small item of pollution in itself.

But in addition to the anti-pollution side effects, it's a giant stride in the right direction. In this modern society of ours things don't last long enough, Everything wears out too soon.

Think of the huge amounts of money the world can save if some day not only socks can be handed down from father to son but also shirts, suits, automobile tires, guided missiles, paved highways, television tubes, water faucets, hydrogen bombs and all those other things man is always tinkering with and producing new models of, when any of them ought to last forever. Hope for Roy's safety was brightened some a few days ago by press report which claimed that the Americans in Japanese prison camps taken as a result of the raids on Guam, Wake and Midway islands were being well fed, and that as a whole they were in good physical condition. It was claimed that some had lost weight, but that others had gained some weight, in spite of the fact that there was no meat or milk in their diet. Roy spent two years in Howard Payne College, and a few. months in West Texas State. 


