SEC. 2. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation submitting this amendment to the qualified voters of Texas at the next general election held in this shall be had in the State for other purposes, then this proposed amendment shall be submitted to the qualified tax paying voters. And the sum of \$2000. or so much thereof as shall be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the treasury of the State of Texas for the purpose of submitting this proposition to a vote of the people of the State of Texas. Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Creating Office of Commissioner Agriculture.

JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to Article four (4) of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a section to be known as Sec tion 27, providing for a Department of Agriculture, with a bureau of labor.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas.

SECTION 1. That Article four (4) of the Constitution of the State of lexas. be amended by adding thereto Section 27, when a majority of the qualified electers of the Legislature of Texas at an election for that purpose shall vote in favor of the amendment, shall read as follows:

Section 27. The Legislature shall provide for the office of Commissioner of Agilculture, who shall be either elected by the qualified voters of the State, or appointed by the Governor with the dvice and consent of two-thirdsof the as the Legislature may provide; whose term of office, duties and salary shall be prescribed by law; in which department there shall reau of labor, when required by the pub-He interest.

SEC. 2. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue and have published the necessary proclamation for the submission of this resolution to the qualified voters for members of the Legislature of the State of Texas, as an amendment to the Censtitution of Texas. to be voted upon on the first Tuesday in August, 1907. All persons favoring said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots, as follows: "For the amendment to the Constitution, providing for a Department of Agriculture and a Bureau of Labor " And those opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots as follows: "Against the amendment to the Constitation, providing for a Department of Agriculture and a Bureau of Labor." And the sum of (\$2000) two thousand dellars or so much thereof as many be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publications, proclamation and election.
