Of course it makes but little difference to Tahoka whether the road crosses the T & P at Stanton or Big Springs, but we are inclined to think that Big Springs has slept on their rights, and that Stanton has secured the road by hustling for it.

When Major Ransom was here the first time, he told us that in locating a railroad, much depended on how anxious a town was for a road, and we said that he need not look any farther because Tahoka was the place he was looking for as we sure did want a road.

The Major said, "If the natural conditions are all right, and you do what the road wants, you shall have the road."

The natural conditions have proved to be all right, we have done all the road asked, the Major said, "You will get the road," and now it looks as though we should.

If we are not mistaken the Clairmont surprise has gone into one of the sleeps about every six months for the last year or two. We do not say this to discourage Mr. Burke, but no man can run a paper in any town if its citizenship does not give it their united support. By support we do not mean subscription and advertising only. For to make a good local paper, the editor must know of the going and coming, and how can he know unless some one tells him. In every town there are some people, who if they have a relative or friend staying with them, they not only will not call the paper up over the phone and tell them about it, but if they see the editor coming they will turn and go down another street so as to avoid his questioning, and then after the friend has been gone a week or two, they will meet the editor and say, "Why my friend came to see me and staid a week, and you said nothing about it." Or they will meet a neighbor who does not take the paper, and they will tell him, "You need not take the paper because they don't get hardly any news, for my friend staid with me a week, and they said nothing about it."

The right thing to do, and you owe it not only to your county paper, but you owe it to your relative or friend as well. When you bring him or her down town to see and to be seen, bring them over to the newspaper office, or if

you are rushed with work, why point out the office to them, and send them over, and although the paper may be small, we can manage to give them two or three lines any way, and the good Lord knows that our heart is large enough to give a hearty welcome to every visitor or prospector that comes to Tahoka or Lynn County.

The land agent who lets a prospector leave town without bringing him to the News office misses a great chance to advertise both himself and his county, for every prospector who subscribes for the local paper for six months or a year does a large amount of free advertising for that town, that is other wise lost to it.
