New Registration System Devised For Texas Drivers

Texas drivers will find registering their motor vehicles for 1970 easier than ever before, thanks to a new registration system devised by the Texas

Highway Department. The Department expects more than seven million vehicles to be registered during the year and there will be several new wrinkles.

First, license plates will have a new color scheme - light blue on a reflective white background.

Second, for the first time, motor vehicle registration renewal applications will be mailed to every vehicle owner in Texas during January. The registration period begins February 1.

The renewal application will arrive in the mail in a slender envelope marked, "Important-This is Your License Plate Renewal Application."

The application itself has instructions printed on it. It is a three-part form "Which should not be torn apart."

When the registration period begins, the vehicle owner need only take the application-and the fee-to the county tax office. Or he can order his plates by mail.

With the application, he will no longer need to present his certificate of title or the last year's registration receipt.

If he decides to go to the county tax office or a substitution, he will find shorter waiting lines. With the application, the clerk will need only to receive the fee, affix to the application a sticker showing the registration number and other data and hand over the 1970 plates.

Some vehicle owners may find it even more convenient to go through the registration process by mail.

Although owners can register their vehicles in person until April 1, there is a March 1 cutoff date for mail registration. This allows 30 days for delivery before 1970 plates must be displayed on vehicles.

If the vehicle owner wants his plates mailed to him, he should send his registration application to his county tax collector, with the registration fee plus \$1, which is the statutory charge for handling and postage.

If the address on the renewal application is incorrect, the vehicle owner should print his correct residence address on all three parts of the application.

The new registration renewal system is the product of an extensive computerization of the Highway Department.

Work To Begin On Lynn Co. Highway

Austin-Contracts for highway construction in the Lubbock district have been awarded by the Texas Highway Commission.

The work will be under the supervision of District Engineer O. L. Crain, and will be in Garza and Lynn counties.

State-Wide Contractors, Inc. of Dallas was awarded a contract for grading, asphalt stabilized base, hot mix asphalt concrete pavement, seal coat and two and three course surface treatment on sections totaling 24 miles of US Highway 84 and Loop 46 in Garza County. Low bid was \$1,383,528.76.

The project extends from 3rd Street in Post to the Scurry County Line and from US 380 in Post southward to US 84. Julian F. Smith of Post is the Highway Department engineer in charge of the project which will take an estimated 200 working days.

In Lynn County, Henry L. Stafford of Lubbock was awarded a contract for grading, structures, base and surfacing on sections totaling 32 miles of US 87, US 380, Loop 472 and Farm to Market Road 3112. Low bid was \$909,768.90.

The project is located from 5 miles south of Tahoka; from the north edge of the Tahoka to the south edge of Tahoka; from the Terry County line to the AT & SF Railroad in Tahoka; and from US 380, 6 miles west of Tahoka, southward to FM 2053. H. M. Ables of Lamesa is the Highway Department engineer in charge of the project which will take an estimated 280 working days.

Cut and destroy unwanted credit cards. This eliminates keeping track of them and running the risk of a stolen card. By keeping the credit card, you have accepted the terms under which it was issued, even though no formal agreement was made. Unsolicited credit cards may arrive through the mail from many sources: banks, oil companies or department stores.

Get a new sweater for Christmas? Don't ruin it by hanging it in the closet. This will stretch it out of shape. Instead, fold loosely and arrange it in a drawer. Put light sweaters on one side and the darker ones on the other side for quick identification.

If you stain clothing with a beverage, fruit or nuts, don't try to remove the stain with soap. If heat later is applied to the cloth, the alkali in the soap may combine with the staining material to produce a permanent spot.

Hanging clothes on a shaped hanger and drying them in a cool place will help them retain their original shape through harsh winter weather. When all moisture is gone, brush clothes thoroughly and press them if necessary.

To open Palm-N-Turn you

have to put the cap in the palm, press against it and turn. It is easy for adults' frustrating for children.

Recipe of the Week
Oriental Turkey

1/4 cup whole almonds
1 tbs. oil
1/2 c. cornstarch
1 1/2 tps. sugar
1 tsp. ginger

1/4 c. soy sauce
3/4 c. water
3 chicken bouillon cubes
3 cups cooked, cube turkey
3/4 c. sliced scallions

1 jar pimiento, drained and chopped (4 oz.)
1 package frozen pea pods (7oz.)

Brown almonds in oil; set aside in a saucepan, combine cornstarch, sugar and ginger. Blend in soy sauce and 1/2 cup cold water; stir in remaining 3 cups water and bouillon cubes. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Add turkey, scallions, pimiento and almonds. Cook over medium heat 3 to 4 minutes; keep warm. Two minutes before serving, stir pea pods into turkey mixture. Serve over rice or macaroni.

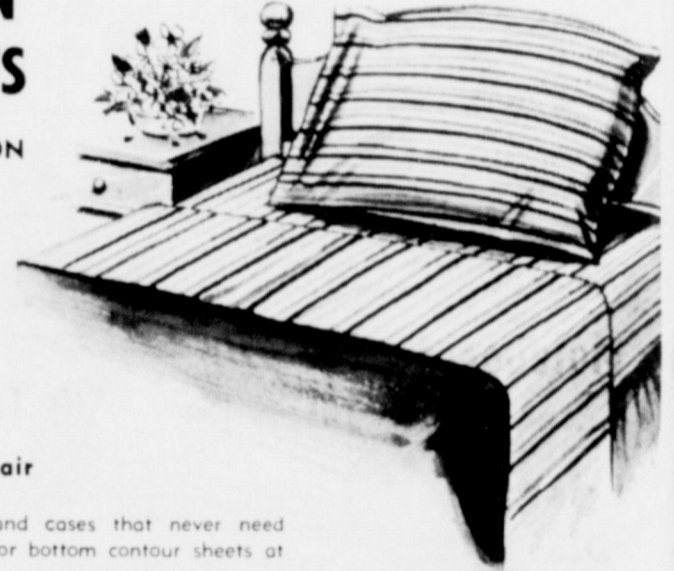
