By so doing it is possible to cover a larger amount of land with the same quantity of water than would be possible with a small stream, a fact which every practical irrigator recognizes. Coming Down from the Mountain; and the Work Awaiting Them There. -Vs. 9-18. On the way down the disciples asked Jesus about a subject which perplexed them. 

ganized by men who are not directly connected with any Christian church, but who are sincerely desirous of assisting in the reformation of their countrymen. Their purpose was to start an antigambling league, and with this in mind they called a public meeting, which was attended by some hundreds of Chinese scholars and business men, and resolutions were rassed in approved public meeting style, approving of a campaign against the gambling vice. Members of the Chinese Young Men's Christian association were asked to assist in the meeting, and to demonstrate by the means of games the possibility of recreation without vice. Suitable addresses were given by prominent Chinese, and the chief organizer of the movement is one of the government education inspectors for the provinces of Kiangsu and Kiangsi. A Chinese Roman Catholic teacher gave a violin solo, a Chinese secretary of the Young Mens' Christian association rendered two cornet solos, and a Protestant missionary sang to the gathering. The whole meeting was conducted in so orderly and orthodox a fashion that it was scarcely possible to realize how tremendous a reformation in the whole Chinese outlook upon public life this meeting revealed. Twenty years, even ten years, ago such a meeting would not have been within the realm of possibility. Today we have a class of public moralists arising who have undoubtedly learned from Christianity in their midst the ideals

Soil Should Be Harrowed Down Smooth When Plowed.

Stirring Ground Breaks Up Capillary Circulation and Keeps Water From Surface, Retarding Evaporation.

Last year we had an early drouth. Many farmers were obliged to postpone planting until too late for best results. The corn ground lay in ridges just as the plow had left it, with not a particle of moisture above the furrow bottoms. Following my usual practise, I harrowed as fast as I plowed, and at least every week thereafter, writes C. A. Umoselle, in Country Gentleman. When I got ready to plant, there was moisture in plenty. It was not until about June 4 that rain came and made it possible for others to get their ground in order. It was late, but that was not all; the spring moisture had been leaving the rough-furrowed fields, and it is pretty sure to be wanted before the summer is over.

The opening of spring usually finds the soil saturated with moisture-several hundred tons to every acre. In winter and spring the rainfall is, as a rule, largely in excess of evaporation, while in summer it is the other way. Scientific Method to Be Used on Mil lions of Acres of Land Not Possible to Irrigate. The future of South Africa is likely

to be changed by the adoption of dry farming. It has long been supposed that the development of her agriculture depended upon irrigation, and numerous government rrigation projects are in process. But there are millions of acres to which water cannot be taken, and here the government proposes to introduce the science of dry farming. The Transvaal department of agriculture freely admits its debt ir this field to the three pioneer workers of the United States: Professor Hil gard of California, our most eminent agricultural chemist; Dr. Widtsoe of Utah, who secure the first legislative measure in support of dry farming. which provided six experimental farms; and W. H. Campball of Nebras ka, the agricultural revivalist, who preaches throughout the west the gospel of better tillage and the merits of his machine, the sub-surface packer South Africa belongs to the Interna tional Dry Farming congress and has a government dry farming station in the center of the dry land zone for experiments in conservation of soil and moisture, tillage methods and drought resistant crops. Experiments of seven years' duration have demon strated that corn can be grown ir the dry land zone, of 180 million acres, of the earth rapidly. Large Volumes Are Lost by Absorprtion and Seepage.

One of Most Common Sources of Loss Is Poor Preparation of Soil Too Shallow Irrigation Is Another Cause.

Recent investigation made by the experiment station have shown that the quantity of water which plants use forms but a small part of that which is diverted from streams for irrigation purpose. Large volumes are frequent and there lost by absorption and seepage in the earthen channels of canal systems. Similar losses occur in the ditches which supply farms, and a large part reached are not of the remainder is wasted in irrigating crops. One of the most common sources of loss of water is poor preparation of the surface. When the soil is irrigated by flooding from field laterals an uneven surface causes needless waste of black flea beetle water, extra labor in spreading it over the surface, and smaller yields. Another common cause of waste is the lack of attendance. Water is often turned on a portion of a field and permitted to run without attention for hours and even days. On some farms the irrigators look after the water for ten hours and turn it loose for the balance of the day. Under this practise the low places receive too much, the high places little or none, and a large part flows off the field to the injury of the road and adjoining

Too shallow and too frequent irrigation is another source of waste. Wetting the surface and neglecting to cultivate it afterwards may result in the loss by evaporation of threefourths of the water which is applied in this way. 




