A. C. WILMETH'S RECORD

Hon. A. C. Wilmeth Gives An Account of his Stewardship As Representative of the 101st Legislative District and Asks Indorsement of His Course.

To the voters of the 101st district of the State of Texas:

You having honored me by selecting me as your representative two years ago, I now take pleasure in giving you a brief summary of what I did or attempted to do as your spokesman in my legislative capacity. Not attempting to give in detail everything I did or did not, but such things as I feel you would like to know my action thereon.

I introduced 14 bills, four of them died in the committee rooms, being reported on adversely. Ten bills were reported favorably not even amended by the committees that passed upon them, four of these passed the House and Senate and became laws. Six died upon the Speaker's table, not being reached on the calendar of the House. The bills I introduced were as follows:

An act providing appeals in felony cases and providing the giving of bonds pending appeal.

An act to allow the deposit of money for bail or appeal bonds.

An act to prohibit any corporation not created under the laws of Texas from owning or operating a railroad in this state.

An act to prohibit the giving of

ance companies could invest their capital stock in.

An act attaching Cochran and Hockley counties to Lubbock for surveying purposes.

An act further providing methods to enforce the collection of tax.

An act to provide a state sanitarium for the care and cure of consumption.

An act authorizing the Land Commissioner to deduct from sales or leases, lands heretofore occupied by railroads as right-of-way.

An act authorizing the United States to put into effect the Reclamation Act in this state.

An act regulating the fees of county attorneys.

I also introduced one concurrent resolution, to wit: Asking the federal government to make a forest reservation of the mountain range running up through New Mexico. I offered thirty-one amendments or substitutes for measures, 12 of which were defeated and 19 adopted. I voted for the following measures: Alamo purchase bill, the bill limiting time which suits could be brought on school land to a year, a bill authorizing the parole of convicts, a bill locating the venue in suits against railroads where there were two or more lines involved, a bill authorizing the investment of sinking funds, a bill creating a statutory lien on the progeny of live stock, a bill requiring a tax upon franchises, a bill requiring persons to pay for the timber and stone taken from public free school land, a bill requiring corporations owning the public utilities to make reports to the city councils of their investments

for the county and state auditors bills, the assumed risk bill, for each of the constitutional amendments, the banking law, the Terrell election bill, and, in the special session and before, for every proposition that would assist in securing the blanket primary.

I voted against the new land law, the militia law, the Blount squirrel bill, the raise of the district judges' salaries, against all of the merger bills and many other propositions that did not become law, and against the raise of the ad valorem tax bills.

I was not absent a single day of the entire three sessions, except three days that I was visiting the Denton Normal and Industrial schools, in obedience to an order from the House. I tried by a conservative course to win the respect and support of those around me, and to ascertain what success I met with respectfully refer you to the record of the House.

If my course meets with your approval, I would be pleased to be commissioned again as your representative, promising you as in the past fidelity to your interests as I see them. I do not presume to have met the desires of all of the many people that compose this varied district. I shall feel satisfied to know that I have met the approval of the greater number of you, and feel that I have done my duty in so doing. I have tried to look beyond today and do the best for you and the state in the time to come. I cannot tell you half that I desire to in this letter

and, therefore, will now address you upon things I think of greatest importance to you and this district in the coming campaign.

The past year has brought us many painful illustrations of the graft and greed of man, and while I am proud to say I do not think there is much if any in the official family, I think it behooves us who are so far from the allurements that caused others to fall to beware, lest we forget. Therefore I ask you not to think I am prejudiced or blinded by prejudice when I again call your attention to the free pass evil. It is an evil, and one that cost the state more than money can estimate in the past session. If the members had not been furnished free transportation, I feel certain in saying the session would have been one month shorter. But it is not the Legislature alone; this evil pervades every official position. It reaches from constable to governor, and to every judge that sits on a bench, and would seek the juror, if it was not that the court holds that it disqualifies them; and strange doctrine that the judge is so honest and the juror so corrupt.

If you commission me to again represent you, I shall advocate an amendment to the constitution to relieve from taxation, all artificially grown forests. My reason for so doing is to encourage the growing of forests throughout the state, but to specially encourage in this and the territory north and west. Building material is prohibitive in price; the wood problem will grow each day and it behooves us to prepare for the future. I do not think I should need to add

white or black, got his vote registered and counted. There are many defects in the law. What great piece of machinery made with human hands but there would be defects in? We are not half through the battle yet; every age will find something better and I look for the next session to bring new propositions to better this and to simplify it. And of course not one who went through this session but knows that the blanket primary proposition becomes a law at the next.

I hope to be able to meet most of you before the primary. You all know this is a very large district and I cannot make a personal canvass of it. I shall try, though, to speak at all the county seats in the district and acquaint myself with each one's views and desires. To those I should fail to meet, I would be pleased to hear from you upon anything you believe of interest to the district or state that I can aid in securing.

I wish to thank those who have taken an interest in my election heretofore, and especially the newspapers that have given my work notice. Knowing I have served you faithfully, I confidently expect your approval.

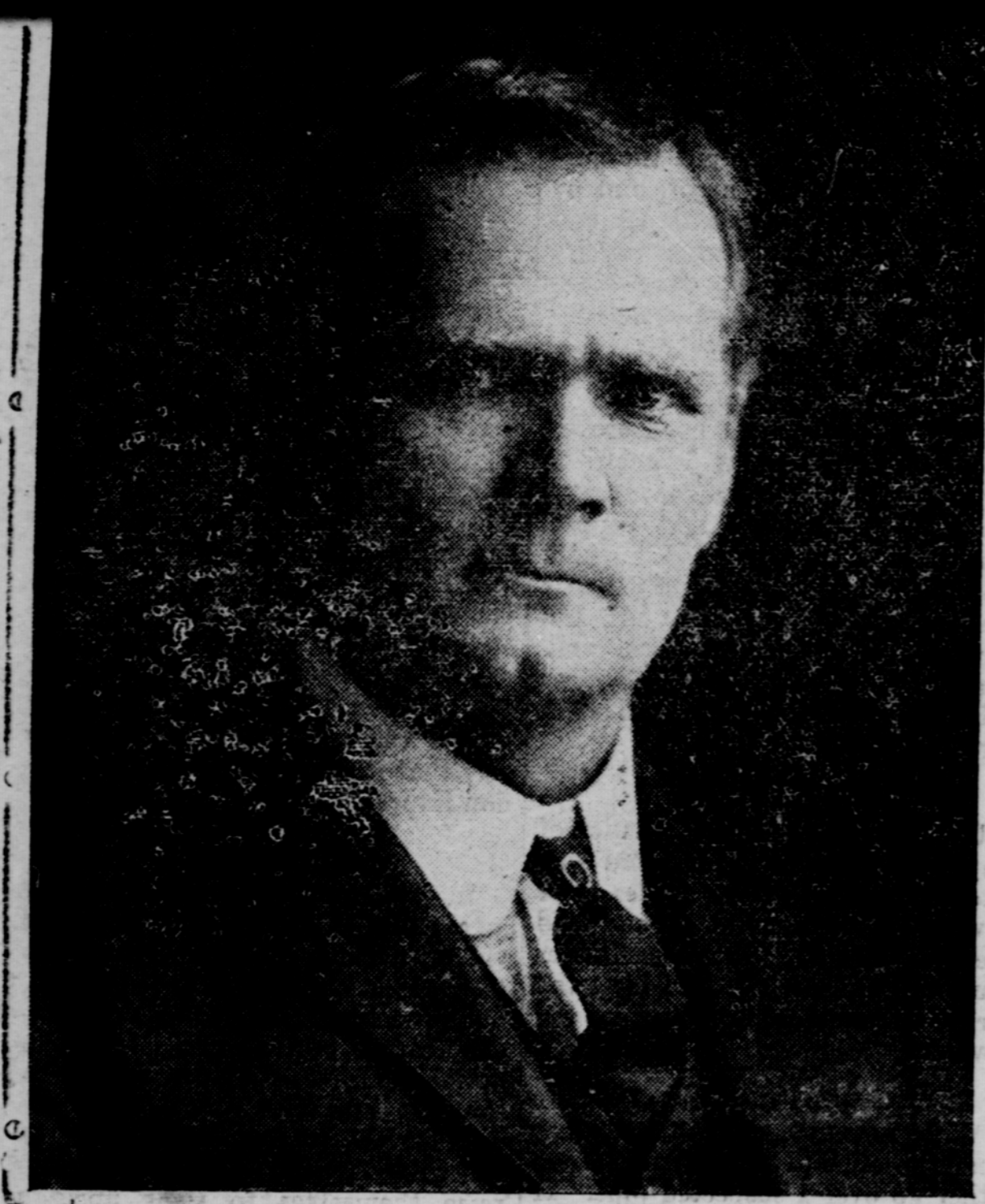

An act to amend the law so that counties having less than 750 voters could compel an election by a petition signed by one-third of the voters in local option matters.

An act declaring what insur-

chase certain lands from the state for depot and tank purposes, a bill prohibiting roping contests, a bill taxing timber that had been sold to individuals and which had not been severed from the state land, a bill authorizing charters for electric light, motor, water, cottonseed

oil mills all under one charter or company in towns of less than 10,000 inhabitants, a bill requiring lights on all railroad switches, a bill authorizing a charter to persons desiring to build causeways, a bill relieving this district from the scalp law, a bill authorizing the United States to condemn and purchase whatever ground needed for its purposes, a bill prohibiting ten-pin alley, billiard and pool table owners from allowing minors to enter or play in such houses, a bill prescribing the duties and liabilities of a public weigher, a bill authorizing the redemption of land sold for taxes to the state, a bill for the protection of the fish and oyster of the state, a bill regulating dentistry, a bill relating to the sale of mineral school lands, a bill making a diploma from the law department of the University a license to practice law, the reclamation bill, a bill regulating jury service, a bill regulating the sale of feed, the drainage bill, a bill putting a tax upon the dealer in unearned wages, a bill for the eradication of scab in sheep, a bill regulating appeals, a bill regulating the putting up of mill products, a bill requiring oil, artesian and gas well owners to stop the flow of the same when not in use, a bill regulating the sale and growth of commercial fruit trees, the irrigation act, a bill requiring cities and towns to choose a depository, a bill revising the public school law, a bill providing further method of collecting delinquent taxes, a bill authorizing the assessment of lands incorrectly assessed, for the Love, Kennedy, Brelsford and Bower tax bills, a bill authorizing cities to regulate the

The tax problem is one that has not been fully settled yet and one that calls for the ablest of statesmanship. To treat all alike is the first duty of a law maker; but in making tax laws I have found individual graft nearly as great as corporate greed. The wealthier counties under-value their holdings, and to make a law that would coerce them to a fair valuation and yet not trench upon others' rights is an unsolved problem. I was very proud to represent a district that did not shrink in any way its burden due the government. I represented Anglo-Saxons, the purest in the world, and their sense of fair-dealing I never forgot in my action upon the tax measures. I voted for the different gross-earnings bills, believing that it was the nearest and best way to ascertain their true tax-paying power, and still think I have done justice to the capital invested in the corporations so taxed. If returned, I shall continue to do till proven that it is unfair and unjust.

Pure ballot is necessary for pure government. I voted for Terrell election law and added what I could to the common fund of making it better than the first and am painfully surprised to see a great many persons condemning without reading. Especially am I pained at the action of some of the minority party in this state to find, after we who never forgot their rights, and over the wishes of many of the dominant party in the closely contested portions of the state, wrote so that every man, be he

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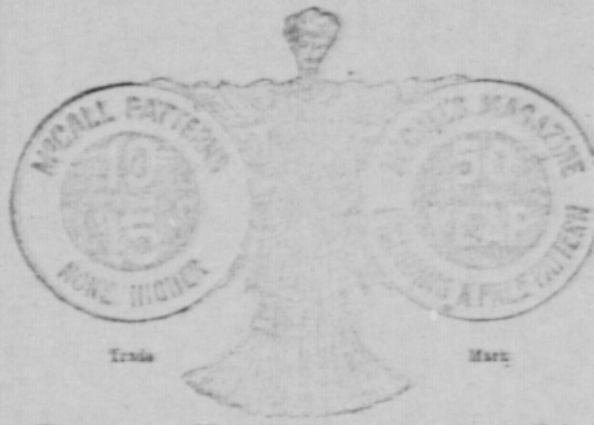
