ARTHUR WASSON ACQUITTED.

After being out about 10 hours the jury brought in the verdict of not guilty, June 15th 11 P.M.

This case was carried to Colorado on a change of venue from Dawson county.

This is practically the finish of this hard fought case, as the cases against Claude Wasson and A.L. Grant were dismissed at the January term of court, at which time Sid Wasson was tried and acquitted.

To County Superintendents:

The law provides that examinations for teachers' certificates shall be held "if necessary" by the county board of examiners "on the first Friday and the Saturday following of the months of May, July, August, September and December of each year.

The next county examination will be on July 5 and 6, the examination in the first series of summer normal institutes will be on July 10, 11 and 12, and in the second series of summer normal institutes on July 31, August 1 and 2. There will be county examinations on September 6 and 7, and on December 5, 6 and 7. There will be no county examination in the month of August, for the reason that the other examinations render a county examination during said month unnecessary.


