Big Things for Big Springs.

A large force of men are now at work grading a place for the location of shops, extra switches, etc. New coal chutes, stock pens, etc., will also be erected. The new shops will be built of steel and will be three times as large as the present building. Work will begin on this structure at once.

The machine and erecting shop will be 240x119 feet, the boiler shop 119x80 feet, the blacksmith shop 102x60 feet, power house 40x60. There will be 24 stalls in the round house, the diameter of which will be 304 feet. The turn table will be 65 feet in diameter. In the erecting shops a 100 ton electrical crane will be installed.—Big Springs Herald.
