## Post City Locals.

There is one store building erected at the new town, Post City.

The new town is situated 22 miles east and two miles north from Tahoka and about one mile from the edge of the cap rock.

The surveyor will begin work immediately laying off the town.

Gravel is being hauled to make cement blocks for the principle buildings

Two well drills will be kept busy digging one well for four houses.

Forty odd dwelling houses will be erected for the use of tenants

Experimental farms will be put in for the culture of the sugar beet and cantalopes for shipping purposes.

Application has been made for a post office, the mail line run to from Tahoka to Post City.—Capt. Capp.

The new town will be a fine thing for Tahoka as we will be the base of supplies. The hack line for passengers, will have to go from here as the country is too rough for a hack to come direct from Big Spring. If the sugar beet industry succeeds and there is no reason why it should not Tahoka will be their shipping point, or better still they will run a tap from here to the new town. The more folks and the more towns on the Plains the faster we all will grow. Ed.

Mr. Jack Alley has just returned from a trip to Floydada where he sold an auto to some of the Floyd folks. It takes a young town like Tahoka to teach some of the old Plains towns how to step lively.

The grading of the auto line between Tahoka and Lubbock was completed this week. The machines will begin to make regular trips about the middle of the month.

Dr. Overton, of Lubbock was called in consultation Friday by Dr. McCoy to see Len McCormick who is very ill with pneumonia. The doctor made the trip in about an hour and quarter in his auto.

When we came to Tahoka there were only three wind mills in sight now you can count 20 and there will soon be six or eight more.

It is getting time for the water supply to be carefully looked after. One of the public tanks have been made the resting place of some stale eggs, which are alright to run undesirable characters out of town, but are hardly a delectable addition to the drinking water. Let some public spirited citizen look after this at once.

There have been complaints made about the promiscuous dumping of carcasses on and about the resident portion of the town section. This practice is unlawful and measures should be taken to protect the people against such a public nuisance. It is not only disagreeable, but endangers the health of our town and we don't want to get the name of being in a sickly locality.

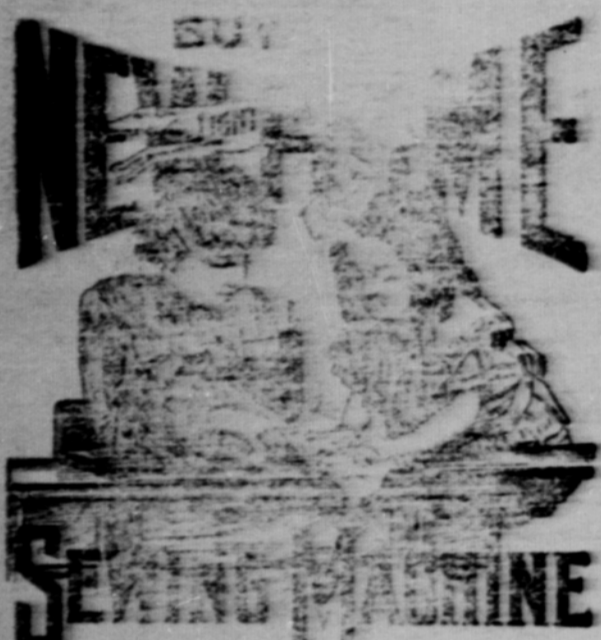
