## Mutscher To Speak At Chamber Banquet

G. F. (Gus) Mutscher will be the speaker at the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce Farmer-Businessman Banquet to be held Monday night, January 26, 7:30 p.m. at the Tahoka School Cafeteria.

Gus Mutscher, native of Brenham, Texas, and recognized as one of Texas' young leaders, was chosen January 14, 1969 as Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives.

His election by the House membership was preceded by eight years of service as the representative from the 29th District comprising Austin, Burleson, Lee, Waller and Washington Counties.

Rearred in the William Penn Community of Washington County, Mutscher attended the community's primary school before transferring as a tenth grader to Brenham High School.

Graduating from high school in May, 1950, Mutscher continued his education at Blinn (Junior) College, Brenham.

At the junior college from 1950-52, Mutscher was active in Gamma Delta, collegiate Lutheran organization, the newspaper and yearbook staffs and was a baseball letterman.

He served as president of both the student body and sophomore class, was a member of the junior college champion debate team and was chosen Blinn's most popular student.

Entering The University of Texas at Austin, September, 1952, Mutscher became highly interested in the work of Gamma Delta and served as both State and International president of the Lutheran organization.

He earned a Bachelor of Business Administration degree in June, 1956.

Mutscher served as a commissioned officer in the United States Army.

In 1955, he joined the Borden Company in Houston as a field representative and earned recognition as the Outstanding Young Business man of Harris County.

Mutscher was extended an offer to join Homer Thornberry, former United States Representative, as his assistant in his Washington, D. C. congressional office, but decided instead to seek his own political future.

Returning to his home area, Mutscher filed for the 29th legislative seat, was elected handsily, and in January, 1961 took his oath as a member of the 57th Texas Legislature.

Recognized as a young progressive representative, the Texas Junior Chamber of Commerce in 1967 saluted Mutscher as one of the five Outstanding Young Texans.

In seeking the leadership of the Texas House, Mutscher's campaign knew no geographic bounds. A part of the rural delegation, Mutscher still was able to mold together both the urban and rural factions. Mutscher was unopposed for the Speakership and was chosen unanimously by his House colleagues.

His leadership of the House in 1969 brought more progressive legislation in the areas of teacher compensation, medical education, and governmental services than in any other session in the history of the Texas House.

During the first term of his Speakership, he was chosen for membership on the Southern Conference Advisory Committee of the Council of State Governments and was honored by the College of Business Administration, The University of Texas, Austin, as a 1969 Distinguished Alumnus.

Mutscher, 36, is married to the former Donna Axum of El Dorado, Arkansas.

A farmer-rancher, Mr. and Mrs. Mutscher reside permanently in Brenham.

Along with Mutscher will be E. L. Short, State Representative of the 73rd District and other politicians have been invited but have not been confirmed at this time.

## Hansard Announces For District Judge

George H. Hansard of Lamesa announced this week that he would seek election as judge of the 106th Judicial District, which includes Dawson, Gaines, Lynn and Garza Counties. Hansard is currently serving as District Attorney.

The Hon. Truett Smith of Tahoka, now occupying the bench, also announced this week that he would not run again when his term of office expires Dec. 31. Smith has held the post for the past 12 years.

Hansard, 43, has been District Attorney since September 1959, being elected after serving six years as County Attorney in Dawson County. Prior to that he was engaged in civil practice in Lamesa as a partner in the law firm of Clement & Hansard. The candidate has maintained his partnership in the firm in addition to his public duties.

An honor graduate of Lamesa High School in 1943, Hansard earned his Bachelor of Arts degree and completed law school at Baylor University after interrupting his studies to serve with the U.S. Marines during World War II. Upon graduation in 1951, he returned to Lamesa to begin private practice.

Active in civic and church affairs, Hansard is currently serving as president of the Lamesa Noon Lions Club and is vice-president of the Lamesa Boys Club board of directors. He is also chairman of the Quana Parker District of Boy Scouts of America. A deacon at the First Baptist Church in Lamesa, Hansard also teaches an adult Sunday School class.

A resident of Lamesa since 1938, Hansard and his wife, Melba, have four sons, George Jr., 12; Mark, 10; Jeff, 7; and Sam, 6.

"It was after much thought and consideration that I chose to announce my candidacy for the office of District Judge," said Hansard. "In addition to the sincere belief that I possess the temperament essential for a person serving on the bench, I feel that experience and the knowledge that I have gained through many years of civil practice and as District Attorney speak well of my qualifications for the office."

## Congressman George Mahon Speaks At Rotary

Congressman George Mahon, in a talk before Tahoka Rotary Club last Thursday, declared a new farm program to be passed by Congress this year will almost certainly not be as favorable to Plains agriculture as in the past.

It seems George and two other Congressmen in Washington, were talking a few years ago about what they would do if they inherited a million dollars. The first fellow said he would buy a big ranch and build a big house on it and retire. The second fellow declared that as long as he lived he would never work again and would become a world traveler. Well, George says, the first thing I would do would be to get on an airplane and fly straight to Lubbock, Texas and the first fellow that came up to me and said hello there George, do you know who I am?, I am going to say, "No, I don't know who you are and frankly I don't give a damn."

For several years we have been under the impression that the American Football League was not up to par with the National Football League. In the field of welfare, more emphasis may be placed on getting able bodied people off relief rolls and into gainful employment.

Defense spending trend is down, but we must continue to spend a tremendous sum to guarantee long-range security.

One of the big problems in Congress, a Majority is willing to appropriate more and more for present programs and new programs, but these same people are unwilling to pass tax increases to take care of the programs they want increased or initiated.

## Amos Davis At Hill AFB, Utah

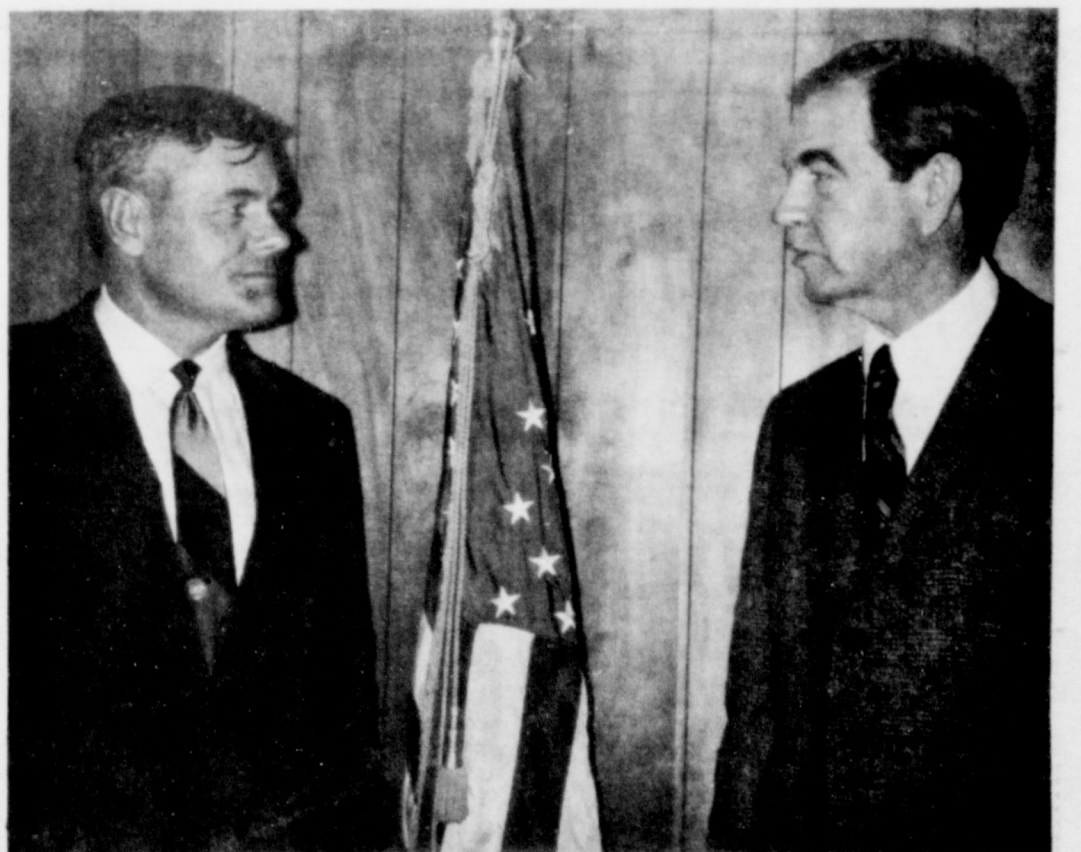

## Auto Registration Is Not Clear

The Texas Highway Department is sporting a red face. In recent news releases announcing the new computerized motor vehicle registration system, Department information specialists wrote: "Easy-to-follow instructions are printed on the three-part form." That must be a mistake.. because a lot of motorists have not been following instructions. And mistakes generate confusion.

This is the first year that the Department has gone to the new system, which includes an order-by-mail program for obtaining 1970 motor vehicle license plates.

But just to make sure that motorists do understand the "easy-to-follow instructions", they are:

1. Each motorist whose vehicle was registered last year has or will receive in the mail a long, narrow envelope with a printed message on the front reading: "Important—This is Your License Plate Renewal Application."

2. The envelope will contain a three-part form. Do not separate the three parts.

3. You may renew your motor vehicle license registration during January and February by mailing the three-part form (intact) and your check to your county tax collector. Add \$1 for postage and handling charges for each vehicle. License plates will be mailed February 1 and thereafter.

4. You may renew your motor vehicle license registration during February and March by taking the three-part form

(intact) and your check to the tax collector's office or substation.

That's it! Now see if you are one of the seven million-plus Texas motorists who can follow those "easy-to-follow instructions."

### SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

The major accomplishment shown in the Lynn County Soil and Water Conservation District's Newsletter was 1,428,222 feet of Parallel Terraces. This brings the total feet of parallel terraces to 5,238,963. There was also 11,834 feet of irrigation pipeline installed under SCS supervision in 1969. The Newsletter recently published has been mailed to the District Cooperators.

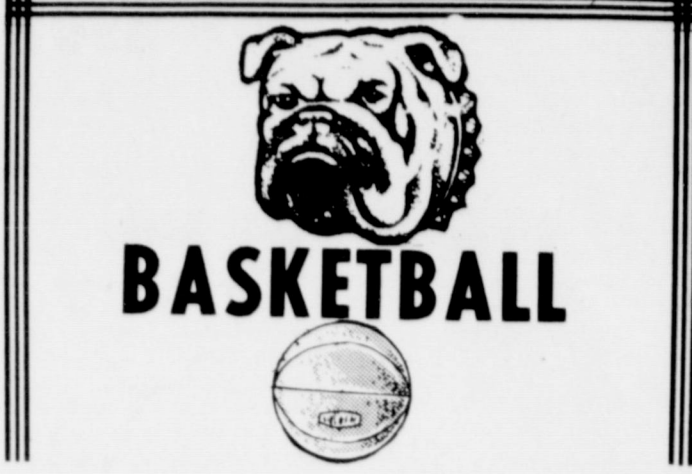
A non-profit, educational org-

# Highlights And Sidelights From Your State Capital

Texas' increasing narcotics problem is getting a multiple-front attack at the state level. State Board of Education endorsed two test projects to find the best ways of teaching young Texans about crime, drugs and driving. Latter will be offered in grades five through 12 under a new state law. A two-year study of driver education methods was assigned to the Texas A&M Transportation Institute. Gov. Preston Smith, Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes and Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin joined in a pledge to declare an "all-out war on drug abuse."

Smith called a meeting of state agency heads and set a February 1 deadline for reports on their plans to fight the use of narcotics and to decide what else can be done.

Agencies represented included State Health Department, Public Welfare Department, College Coordinating Board, Texas Education Agency, University of Texas, Department of Public Safety and Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation.

Governor Smith called the drug use "one of the most serious problems that confront the people of this state today."

Barnes urged local grand juries to conduct their own investigations and to bring such cases to a prompt trial.

A 24-month project will develop teaching materials for a public school course on crime and narcotics.

Initial training of 2000 teachers will begin in February. Model programs will be tested in public schools, 1971-72. Universities, schools, regional education centers and community groups will help with course de-

velopment work.

**Voters Signing Up.** About 1,347,040 Texans had registered to vote in the 12 most-populous counties by January 1, State Democratic Executive Committee reports.

SDEC says the medium-metropolitan counties have shown only a slight increase in registrations during the last 30 days. This group of 23 counties enrolled 282,851 or 35.9 per cent of a potential 676,680. Same counties a month ago had signed up 230,764.

Some SDEC statistics bore out, some contradicted the warning of U.S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough that registration is greatest in Republican and conservative counties.

Greatest percentage of registration in any big county, said SDEC, is Jefferson, a liberal Democratic stronghold where 75.9 per cent of a possible 90,609 already have enrolled.

Sign-up in liberal Bexar County is 62.8 per cent of quota, but conservative Dallas registers 70 per cent and Harris 69.9 per cent.

Midland County in medium bracket has 73.7 per cent registration, Braoriz 90.2 per cent. Midland is key conservative area.

SDEC, through its "Operation: Everybody" if offering awards to counties which meet registration quotas.

**Welfare Rolls Grow.** Assistance payments totalling \$364,673,953 went to Texans on public welfare rolls during fiscal 1969, Department of Public Welfare reports.

About 25 per cent of this, or \$90.4 million, medical aid payments \$147.9 million, aid to blind \$36.3 million and aid to permanently and totally disabled \$13.4 million.

More than 161.7 pounds of commodities valued at \$45.8 million went to 1.4 million participants, and \$7 million worth of food stamps were issued.

Average Texas old age assistance payment is \$59.25 a month, 15th from lowest in nation. Average monthly aid to needy families with dependent children comes to \$76.20, compared with top (New Jersey) of \$266.50. Texas AFDC payment is fifth lowest among states.

**Economy Strong.** Year-end reports by state agencies boast of strong economy and record breaking industrial development during 1969.

Texas Employment Commission says the labor force con-

tinues to grow rapidly. Employment went up four per cent from 1968, and the unemployment rate (averaging 2.6 per cent) was lower than for any period recorded by TEC.

Industrial development reached a new high. But what happened in 1969 was just a "drop in bucket" to what can be expected in the future, reported Texas Industrial Commission Executive Director James Harwell.

TIC reports an estimated 350 new plants located in Texas last year, compared with 291 in 1968. About 465 plants reported expansions of facilities. Most of the activity was in the chemical, metal and transportation industries.

**Courts Speak.** Texas Supreme Court found no reversible error in the El Paso intermediate

court decision that the Maryland Casualty Company suit against a couple in an alleged embezzlement of \$17,000 from the El Paso savings institution must be tried again.

High court granted a \$154,640 damage award to a New Jersey resident who claimed a Dallas concern would not honor a contract to sell him Wyoming oil and gas property interests.

University of Texas student and faculty group filed a suit to restrain Travis County Dist. Atty. Bob Smith from prosecuting 21 persons indicted in a disturbance at UT's Chuckwagon in November.

**Fill Price Raise Asked.** Parks and Wildlife Commission recommended a raise from 10 cents per cubic yard to 25 cents for sedimentary fill dredged from state-owned bay bottoms. Governor must approve the hike.

PWC was offered a new million-dollar park site near Austin. A management study will be made by a professional firm.

Variety of public hearings will determine beach cleaning policies, procedures for licensing mobile businesses on public beaches, boat ramp development and policy on collection, propagation and zoological permits.

**SHORT SNORTS.** Texas Animal Health Commission adopted the minimum changes required by federal authorities to put new brucellosis eradication regulations in effect on Jan. 15 but it may take 60 to 90 days to enforce them and get distributed among state and federal health authorities.

Lloyd M. Bentsen Jr. of Houston announced as a Democratic candidate for the U.S. Senate.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler is seeking sixth term.

First of 269,000 boat registration renewal notices have been mailed by the Parks and Wildlife Department.

Governor Smith agreed to extradite from McKinney to Los Angeles, California, Charles Watson, who is accused of murder and conspiracy to commit murder in the Sharon Tate slayings.

A \$30,200 federal grant has been cleared for buying 40 acres in South Tyler to develop a park.

Governor's mansion has reopened for public tours after extensive renovations.

Thirty-one former Texas legislators, including a former governor and a one-time House speaker, signed on for state jobs to qualify for retirement pay.

By an eight to seven vote, the State Board of Education overturned a decision by Commissioner J.W. Edgar and upheld a Kerrville mathematics teacher's right to wear a beard in the classroom.

## Linda Huffaker, CHD Agent, Says.....

"Of course, they aren't like those meals Mom cooks, but I can't complain," a young combat soldier in Vietnam wrote about food packets now replacing infamous C-rations. The new packets are freeze-dried Long Range Patrol (LRP) rations.

Soldiers add water to the food or eat it dry like popcorn for light-to-carry, more nutritious and tastier meals. LRP rations weight half what C-rations do.

The advantage: LRP's are quick, easy to reconstitute, and are able to withstand free-fall delivery by helicopter.

If other conditions permit, servicemen on patrol missions in the DMZ area, their counterparts in the Central Highlands and men in comparable situations elsewhere can whip up a dinner in less than five minutes just by adding water.

Food scientists at U.S. Army Natick Laboratories in Massachusetts developed the food packets specifically for troops engaged in "unconventional warfare operations in remote areas."

U. S. Department of Agriculture researchers helped in technical studies and research on freeze-drying techniques which made production of the packets possible.

Each menu features one of the meat entrees: Chicken and rice; beef and rice; beef stew; pork and scalped potatoes; beef hash; spaghetti and meat sauce; chili con carne and chicken stew. The latter three are especially popular.

Each meal includes a dessert, usually a cereal, fruit or chocolate bar, freeze-dried coffee and often a cocoa beverage mix.

Each flexible film-package Long Range Patrol food packet has more than 1,000 calories.

## Water Depletion Maps Available

Frank Rayner, manager of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1, announced that the 1969 cost-in-water-depletion, income-tax allowance maps have been released by the District.

These maps are constructed annually by the District and are used by property owners throughout the High Plains area to claim an income tax allowance on the amount of the depletion of the underground water supply beneath their property.

Although the District charges \$1.00 plus postage for each map, covering an entire county, the income from such map sales goes only to defray the cost of printing and mailing the maps and to pay for the land appraisers fee for developing cost in water tables for each county. These tables can be secured without cost from the District.

## Larry McClendon Attending Basic Hospital School

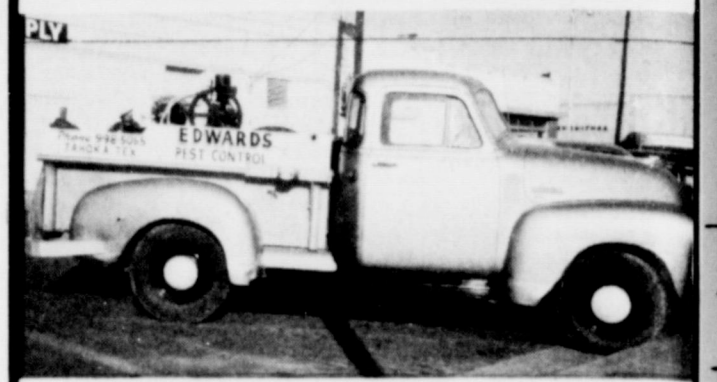
