The Doctor comes to us highly recommended professionally and we are glad to welcome him to our town.

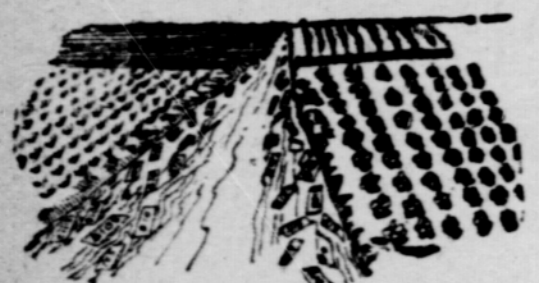

## Wealth Creators.

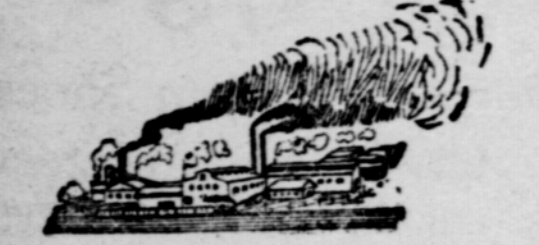
In building a house we must use material that is stable and durable, and in building a community we must use lines of industry that are constructive and active. The former promotes and the latter perpetuates prosperity. Among the classes of property that constitute building material for empires are public highways, railroads, factories, mines, irrigating canals, etc. These industries create and thrust values upon adjoining property, and the amount of unearned wealth they distribute depends upon their native characteristics and upon their surroundings, but it is more than likely that the irrigating canal makes the largest gift of permanent values to contiguous property. It takes the desert and swamp lands and fills uninhabited places with happy and prosperous homes.



Irrigating Canal.

All lines of industry that build countries have characteristics equally as meritorious as the canal.

Activity in property is as important as constructiveness. The factory, the railroad, the mine and the canal have not a single fiber of idleness in their construction, and inactivity inflicts upon them self-destruction. The land owner may let his farm lie idle and it will increase in fertility and value, but the manufacturer must run his factory as fast as the wheels will turn or his property decays and declines in value.



Industrial Activity.

What we have said of the factory is also true of all lines of constructive industry. The irrigating canal builds farms, the factory makes cities, and transportation facilities build both farms and cities, and any sort of property that has inherent characteristics of generosity and activity should be and all the people are vitally interested in public highways, says the invitation to industry, as the farm, the factory, the railroad, the mine encouraged. Improved public highways constitute a most convincing Texas Commercial Secretaries' Association.

A character study of property and an analysis of the requirements of a community are essential to the intelligent development of a locality. A commercial club is the architect of empires, and every citizen should join the local club and study property and its ability to develop the community.

## Lynn County Fruit Crop Good.

### ORCHARDS ALL YOUNG

A Few Facts About Our Orchards And This Year's Crop Prospects As Gathered By Our Editor.

That the Plains is an ideal country is not generally known by those who live at a distance, and think of this portion of the world as a place set apart from all others: where hardship walks hand in hand with the home maker, and loneliness steal about the solitary dweller wringing his heart with memories of home.

We should like to dispel this erroneous idea and to do so have made it a point to visit several orchards about town and one in the country.

Mr. Leedy as Nursery man received our first attention. the Nursery while only three years old is a fair example of what may be accomplished by intelligent work and adapting varieties to conditions which suit them best.

The Nursery contains several thousand trees and vines in a thrifty condition and most of the stuff set with fruit.

The Nursery is only three years old nevertheless the first sight that greeted us was a rose bush as tall as a mans shoulder, literally covered with roses. several varieties of roses were in bloom along the drive way, and the flowering willows and honey suckle were at their best.

Austin dew berries were as full of fruit as there was room on the vines, the first ones just beginning to ripen and some blooms still on the vines. We passed to the grapes which were full of well formed bunches, the Concord was well represented and several other varieties, the names of which we did not learn

The Plums next claimed our attention. The Pooles Pride were as thickly set with fruit as was possible, limbs from 18 inches to two feet long so thickly covered that the limbs could not be seen, the trees were well grown, considerably taller than a man, and set with the first crop. America was set with a fairly good crop of well grown plums. Gold was only indifferently fruited this year, having borne a good crop last year.

Among the peaches, Dwarf Blood and Guin, especially attracted our admiration, the fruit being finely formed and the trees very full, the peaches being finely grown for the time of the year.

There was a good showing of pie plant, considerable having been cut from it this year.

The gooseberries were about half grown and a fair sprinkling on the bushes, this being their first year.

We drove out two miles, to the country place belonging to Hall Robinson, the hardware man.

The place has been set out to fruit and forest trees for three years. The front yard and several acres west of the house was devoted entirely to forest trees, black locust and cottonwood predominating, ranging from 15 to 20 feet tall. A row of Lombardy poplars along the

As a safeguard against telling too much about Lynn county fruit, we took our father, E. H. Crie, with us to look at the orchards; he being a new comer made us stick to the truth and only tell facts, and if any one who reads this, fails to believe, just come to Tahoka and the Lynn County News will see that you visit these same orchards or better ones.

The News has made it a principle never to tell of what Lynn county will do, until we ourselves have seen the evience.

## Our Citizens.

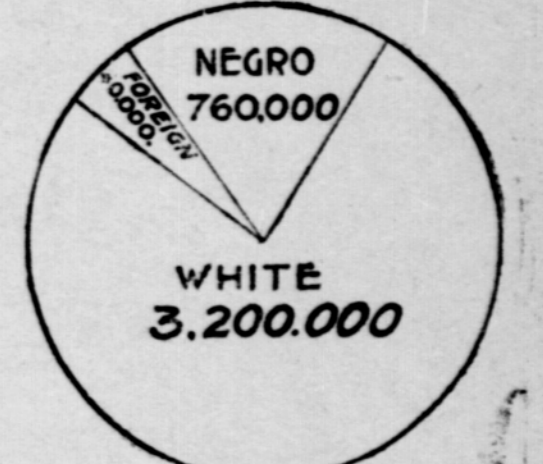
The density of population and the activity of the citizenship has largely to do with the prosperity of a community. We must look to the stork and the immigration agent to increase our population. Texas has the largest families of any State in the Union. The size of the average Texas family is 5.25, and the size of the average family in the United States is 4.75. We have in Texas 122,000 births annually, which is a birth every four minutes.



Texas Stork.

We have 43,734 deaths, which is one death every twelve minutes. We have a net gain in population of nine per hour, or 75,266 per annum. Our birth rate is 33 per 1,000 population per annum, and the death rate 11 per 1,000 population per annum, making a net natural gain of 22 per 1,000 population per year. We find that 30 per cent of the people born in Texas go to other States, which leaves us a net gain in population of 16 per 1,000 population per annum, or a total of 56,000 per year. It would take the stork sixty-five years to double the population of a community, says the Texas Commercial Secretaries' Association. The stork is a splendid bird, but too slow for Commercial Club work.

Ninety-eight per cent of the population of Texas speaks English. We have 107,110 more males than females. Seventy-one per cent of our population is native born white; 19 per cent is negro, and 10 per cent foreign born.



Race Comparison.

There are 325,000 unmarried women in Texas of marriageable age, and any one desiring a wife should not fail to investigate our opportunities and advantages along matrimonial lines. We have 869,864 children of scholastic age. In 1900 Texas ranked sixth in population in States of the Union. We had twelve counties that show a population of less than 100 people in 1900. The annual increase in white population is relatively 2 per cent greater than the colored population.

The stork can travel faster over good roads, and the improvement of our public highways will encourage an increase in population.

To vote in the Democratic Primary July 23rd, a man must believe in Democracy, and he pledges himself to vote at the General Election for EVERY successful Democratic candidate.

New is the time to get things into shape for an exhibit at the State Fair. If we wait until fall to begin to get ready, it will be altogether too late.

On another page of this paper will be found the program of the Methodist District Conference, and if it is possible to do so, our delegation will bring the Conference to Tahoka next year. We have a railroad now and our citizens should secure every gathering of this kind that it is in our power to do.

A petition has been signed up asking for an election to determine whether we shall issue bonds to build a \$20,000 school house in Tahoka or continue to use the one we now have. Of course there is not a shadow of doubt as to the result of this election. The Tahoka citizens are all alive to the fact that we must have a new building before fall, and we all know that it would be throwing money away to build a cheap house that would be inconvenient now, and would be too small in a couple of years. We have used our old building as long possible, so that when we did build we could build and furnish a house that would be safe, comfortable and large enough to accommodate our fast and steadily growing population. We have been ashamed of our school house for so long, that we want a change, we want a building that we can take some pride in. When the time comes let's do as we have always done, in matters of moment, all get together and make it unanimous for the \$20,000 school building, and help Tahoka grow.

Bring in your best crop samples next Trades Day, the 6th of June. It may look foolish to a farmer to bring in samples of growing wheat, oats, corn, cotton or other crops that he is so familiar with. But, he should remember that what to him is common, is often a rarity to us city folks, but the main thing is that many strangers doubt our being able to raise many of the things that we do raise here to perfection. Bring in your samples and show what old Lynn county can do.

C. W. Onstott, of mile 26, was in The News office Saturday and told us that the rains last week filled the fire pit and he had to knock off work on the grades for several days.

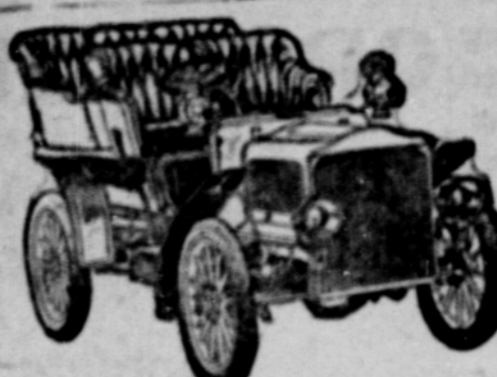

### Peanut and Cowpea Growing.

Dr. H. H. Herrington, director of the Texas Experiment Station A. & M. College of Texas, contributed the following interesting bulletin on building up worn out soils:

There is a class of crops known as "legumes" that have the property of restoring nitrogen, which is the most expensive element of plant food, to the soil. These legumes include cowpeas of the various varieties, velvet beans, soy beans, and the various varieties of garden beans and peas. It includes all the clovers, red, white, crimson, and various varieties of burr clovers, as well as common alfalfa and all the other varieties of alfalfa; all the various varieties of peanuts, so that in the process of restoring to fertility a worn out soil, one of the first things to do is to arrange a crop rotation in such a way that these legumes can be grown with some profit to the land, even when the crops are removed. They have this power because the tubercles or little knots that grow on the roots of these plants enclose bacteria, which in some way unknown to us, assimilate the free nitrogen of the atmosphere and give it to the plant life, and store nitrogen in the soil even after the vines and fruit have been taken away; but, of course, it is best on very thin land, and especially if deshed to rapidly restore its fertility, that

you plow under the legume crop, vines and all.

But there are two other elements of plant food that must be given to the soil: One is potash, and the other is acid phosphate. The first comes as a sulphate, the muriate or chloride, and an impure salt known as kainit. Phosphoric acid usually comes as an acid phosphate and a bone phosphate commercially. So that you would want to buy some acid phosphate and use a little cottonseed meal mixed with this under your legume crops. Suppose you want two acres in cowpeas: I would fertilize at the time of planting with 200 pounds of acid phosphate and 100 pounds of cottonseed meal to the acre. drilled in under the seed of the crop. Cottonseed would add humus or organic matter to your soil, which is a very important element itself in this improvement of the soil. You could plow your land too and plant cowpeas, especially the velvet bean, and get good results. Even with a considerable sod of Johnson grass on the land, the velvet bean would improve your soil and make a good crop. When mature, the vines should be plowed under, preferably with a disc plow, and then the Johnson grass kept down for the remainder of the season by plowing it necessary, and following with a drag or section harrow, so as to expose the roots of the grass to the sun as much as possible.

Your peanuts could be pastured by your hogs or you could pull up vines, or plow them up and save the hay, and give the nuts to the

hogs. All the barnyard manure around your place should be heaped up in your lot and allowed to undergo fermentation and decay; after which it ought to be spread on the land. Follow the velvet beans in the fall with winter oats and hairy vetch. Cut this hay off in April or when it is ripe, and follow that with a cotton crop, fertilized again. Or, if you cannot get the hairy vetch seed in time, sow fall sats, graze them through; plow them under in the spring, and follow with cotton and corn. Introduce burr clover on your pasture land where the Johnson grass is. Do that next fall, and it will make a good late winter pasture for your hogs, while the oats will make an early winter pasture. Your peanuts and cowpeas will afford summer feed, and you can finish up in the fall with a little corn chops and cottonseed meal observing the precaution to have your pigs in fairly good condition before they are put on feed.

The letter to the county chairmen is as follows:

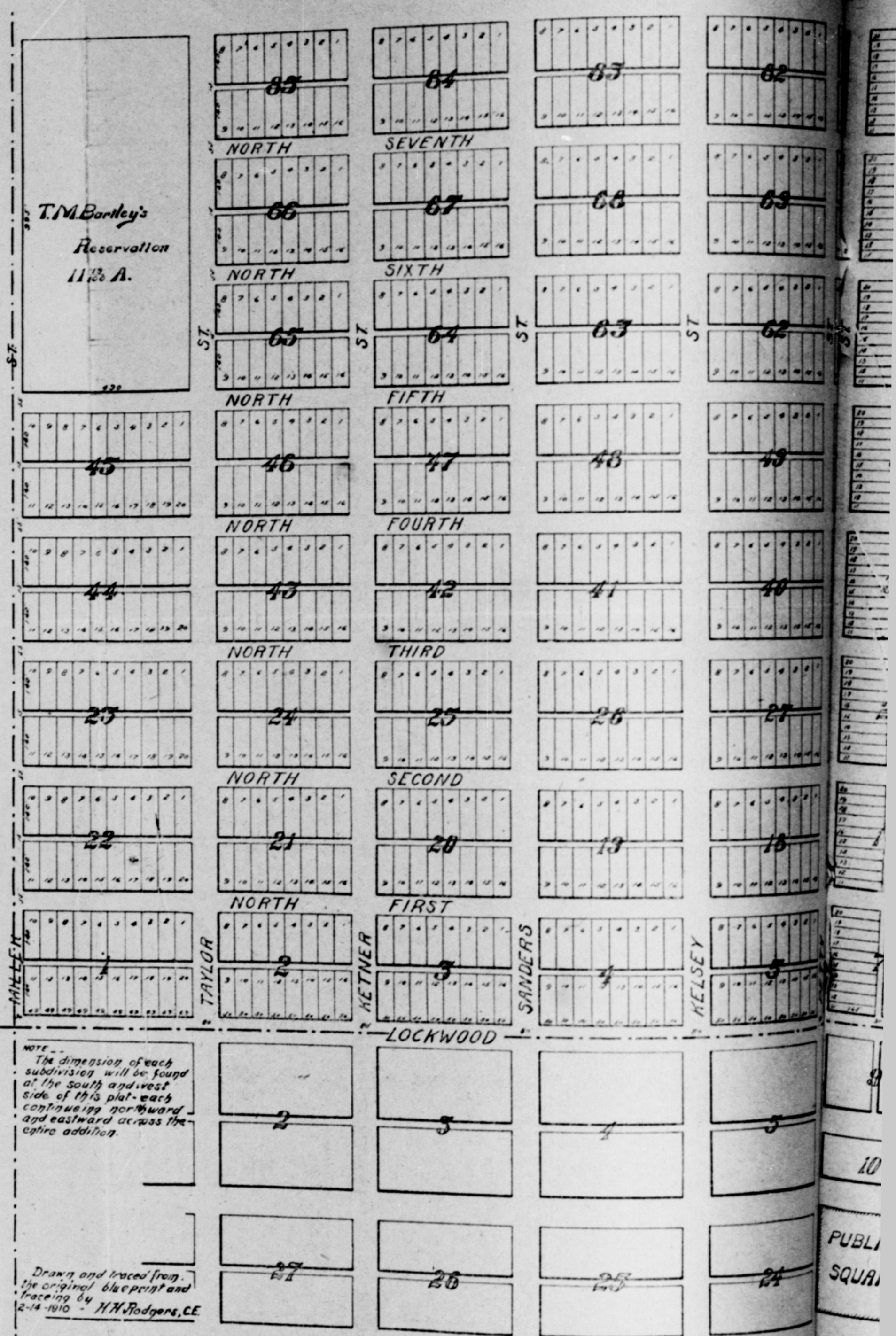
Headquarters state Democratic Executive Committee of Tex. San Antonio, Tex., May 10, 1910.
