Sunday Law To Be Enforced.

STATE OF TEXAS) To the
County of Lynn.)

Hon. L. S. Kinder Dist. Judge:
The Grand Jury for this term of the Court beg to report to your Honor that we have completed our labors: We have inquired into all infractions of the law and have returned Bills of Indictments where the facts justified: We have found no infractions of the law amounting to felonies, and we congratulate the people of Lynn County upon the apparently good conduct of the citizens of our County.

It has been brought to our knowledge that there has been infractions of the Sunday law, especially in regard to performing manual labor on the Sabbath, some of which is inexcusable under any view of the law or circumstances; and we suggest that those who have been guilty of such; desist for the future and further that since this warning has been given, that the next Grand Jury investigate such infractions of the Sunday law more thoroughly than has been done heretofore, and return indictments against every person where the facts justify such action.

Thanking your Honor and the other officers of the Court for their help and courteous treatment we respectfully ask that we be discharged. We also ask that the editor of the Lynn County News publish this report.

The Travelers Wardrobe.

The NEW IDEA WOMAN'S MAGAZINE for June anticipates this problem in an article "The Travelers Wardrobe" by Elise Morien, who suggests the costumes suitable for short or longer journeys. For the actual wear and tear of traveling she recommends a "tailor made costume on severe lines," of mohair serge panama or covert cloth, or else a separate skirt of one of the modish invisible plaids in light woolen, worn with a tailored blouse and a long coat of plain material, such as tan covert. In regard to the "trotter" skirts so well adapted to traveling the writer says, they "are again worn quite short this season, several inches from the ground, or ankle length, being mas frequently seen. However, older women and those inclined to be stout adopt nothing shorter than one and a half inches from the ground. Miss Morien also advises "a complete costume suitable for street wear as well as for formal occasions," made of one of the more dresy materials, such as chiffon broad cloth, or checked or embroidered veiling. This suit is, of course, to be worn with dainty blouses, and the princes skirt bolero are suggested as a prevailing mode. For a longer trip whe a sojourn at a large hotel may be included a dainty complete dress is a good thing to have, and the article winds up with a few notes on kimonos and comfortable dressing jacket.
