Allied Forces Strike Axis In Tunisia

Twenty-three Jap Ships Sunk In Solomons Battle

American Fleet Scores Victory In Greatest Battle

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16. (AP) — A smashing victory over the Japanese in the Solomon Islands, with 23 enemy ships destroyed and seven others damaged in the greatest naval battle of the war, was announced today by the navy. ... This was accomplished, the navy announced, with the loss of two light cruisers and six destroyers, the only American naval units reported sunk in the action.

Rommel's Army Falls Back To El Aghaila

CAIRO, Nov. 16. (AP)— Marshal Rommel's broken army—cut down by 75,000 casualties and captives—sped westward in the Libyan desert as far as El Aghaila, beyond Bengasi, yesterday while the British announced they occupied the landing ground at Martuba and strafed and bombed the axis forces for miles along the coastal road.

Enemy Told To Hold On At Any Cost

LONDON, Nov. 16. (AP) Driving eastward "as fast as possible, according to plan," a joint American-British force was reported at grips today with axis troops acknowledged by Berlin and Rome to have been rushed across the Mediterranean to make a fight for France's key North African protectorate.

Rent Ceiling To Go Into Effect Dec. 1

Beginning December 1 all residential rents in the Big Spring defense-rental area will be cut back to the level of March 1, 1942. Regional OPA Administrator Max McCullough announced today in Dallas. ... An impending struggle of tremendous scope for possession of the strategic Guadalcanal-Tulagi area of the Solomons was indicated, the navy said, when aerial reconnaissance early this month disclosed a heavy concentration of Japanese warships, transports and cargo vessels in the New Britain-Northwestern Solomons region.

LONDON, Nov. 16. (AP)—General Charles De Gaulle and the Fighting French committee which he heads announced officially today they were "taking no part" in allied negotiations with Vichy representatives in North Africa. ... The Liquor measure was reached on the senate's routine calendar and when its consideration met with a verbal objection, Senator O'Daniel (D-Tex.) moved to take it up. Led by Senator Russell (D-Ge.), who forced five time-consuming quorum calls in a space of 55 minutes, the southerners forced a roll call vote on O'Daniel's motion.

(AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Claude Wickard told the New York Herald-Tribune forum on current problems today that it was a political necessity that starvation disappear from any country occupied by American forces. Wickard said that there might be chaos behind the lines if freed people were not fed, but that when the work went out that freedom meant a square meal "the people in territory still under the conqueror will work just that much harder for liberation."

Callaghan, 52, was naval aide to the president from 1938 until April 1942, when he assumed command of the San Francisco.

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# Midwest To Attract Spotlight In Football Wars This Week

## Michigan And Ohio State To Lock Horns

NEW YORK, Nov. 16. (AP)—That interesting part in the football season, when most of the talk swings to bowls and bowl opponents, is here again but it's just so much chatter to the folks around the Big Ten conference, where they play their games in season and quit when December rolls around. Against post-season games, has the

The Big Ten, with its polley laugh on the promoters of the January classics, for in that loop they play at least one game each week which would fill any bowl in the land any day in the year.

Another in this weekly series is on tap for Saturday when mighty Michigan, which lam- basted Notre Dame, 32-20, last week, takes on Ohio State, a team that humbled powerful Illinois, 44-20. It will renew a rivalry that has drawn more than a million fans in the last 15 years and might go a long way toward settling the conference championship.

Minnesota, 27-7 conqueror of Ohio, meets Wisconsin, which tripped Northwestern, 20-15, after losing to Iowa the previous week. A third game in the last full week of Big Ten play sends Indiana against Purdue, while Northwestern meets Notre Dame and Illinois tests Great Lakes Naval, 24-0 victor over Marquette, in non-conference games.

In the east, where there seems to be nobody left with enough power to find out just how good Boston college really is, Ivy leaguers and intersectional battles will highlight Saturday's play. After crushing Fordham, 56-6, Boston college meets lightly regarded Boston university in its next-to-last game of what looks like a perfect season. Harvard, fresh from a 7-0 victory over Brown, has its annual Ivy-clad argument with Yale, which dumped Princeton, 13-6. Missouri will be at Fordham and Oklahoma at Temple. After surprising Pennsylvania, 13-7, Penn State takes on Pitt.

Like Boston college, Georgia Tech of the Southeastern conference draws a breather this week, but its co-leading neighbor, Georgia, may have things a little tougher. Georgia Tech, which kept its record clean by blanking Alabama, 7-0, has Florida as its opponent, while Georgia, 40-0 winner over Chattanooga, smacks into an Auburn team that walloped Louisiana State, 25-7.

Other Southeastern headlines find Alabama meeting Vanderbilt and Kentucky playing Tennessee, tangle in the Southern loop's best Duke and North Carolina State offering as unbeaten but once-tied William and Mary steps out for a fling at North Carolina pre-flight. Texas Christian, which left the Southern conference a three-way possibility by stopping Texas, 13-7, meets Rice in one of two loop tilts. The other sends Baylor, which lost to unbeaten-untied Tulsa, 24-0, against Southern Methodist. U. C. L. A. still in position to overhaul Washington State for the Pacific Coast conference lead, meets a Washington team that held St. Mary's pre-flight to a scoreless draw. Stanford, which trounced Oregon State, 49-13, moves in against California, 13-0 winner over Montana, while Oregon faces Oregon State in a third loop tilt.

With Nebraska out of the Big Six to play the Iowa pre-flighters and two other teams meeting eastern foes, Iowa State and Kansas State will have that conference to themselves. Tulsa can sew up the Missouri series and will mix with each other Valley flag against Creighton.

# Tulsa Challenging Boston College For Sugar Bowl Berth

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 16. (AP)—Tulsa stepped up today to challenge Boston College for a New Year's day berth in the sugar bowl here with the Southeastern conference champion, while most observers agreed the two teams might bang away at each other if the west coast should grab off Georgia.

Tulsa and Boston college answered their critics who charged "bowl schedules" Saturday in their easy victories over Baylor and Fordham, respectively. And Michigan put on end to hopes that Frank Leahy would coax Notre Dame down this way.

That was the talk, at least, while sugar bowl sponsors worked silently on an official announcement expected in two weeks—just after Georgia plays Georgia Tech for the Southeastern title.

Most people were taking it as almost a sure thing that the Georgia-Tech winner would come here, but unofficial word trickled in from Athens, Ga., yesterday that Georgia already had promised the Rose bowl, which might seem a little presumptuous to the Atlanta Engineers.

On top of that came news from California that efforts were being made to cut red tape for an early invitation to an eastern team—before the southern bowl sign

the best eleven.

Experts here who like to dabble in team speculation insist the Dixie bowls have a big selection edge this season with so many good teams nearby. Eligible schools might not want to go west, they say, for several reasons. The day coach trip would be long and hard, and with college courses speeded up, players might rather be away from home for the shortest time.

For instance, the experts argue, the Cotton bowl could pit Texas, Texas Christian or Baylor (whichever comes out of the conference middle) against the southeastern runner-up or even Tulsa without involving much travel.

The Orange bowl might take one of the topflight southeastern teams, including Alabama or Tennessee, for a match with the southwest's runner-up or William and Mary of the south.

### MODERN ROBIN HOODS

## Border League Classic Looms

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Nov. 16. (AP)—This week's two Border conference games are more than likely to decide the loop's final top and bottom positions.

At the top, unbeaten and untied Hardin-Simmons University of Abilene faces its long-awaited showdown with Texas Tech, who has not been scored upon in circuit competition but boasts only two conference victories to the Cowboys' three.

It's the Cowboys' last conference game, and if they win it, their title is secure. But if Tech's Red Raiders upset the dqpe, they still have to face the third-place University of Arizona Wildcats, who have four victories to their one defeat and are apt to give Tech some trouble on November 28.

So, theoretically, it's still possible for any one of the top trio to pick up the loop crown.

Arizona, only team of the three which had a conference game last week, took fifth place West Texas State 19 to 7.

Outside the circuit, Hardin-Simmons won 47-13 over Louisiana Tech, while Texas Tech was handed a 13-6 beating by Creighton University at Omaha.

## Pappy Says His Amendment Good For War Effort

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16. (AP)—Senator O'Daniel (D-Tex.), joining in support of the teen-age draft bill in its final form with his own important amendment eliminated, declared the very fact his proposal had been incorporated in the measure even temporarily should have a beneficial effect on the war effort.

The O'Daniel amendment had provided that the 18-19 year old youths inducted into the army should have at least 12 months training before being assigned to foreign combat duty. The senate wrote the amendment into the bill when originally passed by that body. The house refused to accept the proviso, however, and in the end the senate yielded.

Commenting on the measure as finally agreed upon, O'Daniel on the senate floor said: "I have the feeling that the wide spread discussion of this amendment has been beneficial to our national war effort, because those in charge of the training must now realize that they alone will carry the full responsibility of properly training our teen-age boys. "If these boys should be sent into foreign combat duty with less than 12 months' training and meet serious reverses, certainly no blame can be placed on any of the 29 senators who voted my amendment into the bill."

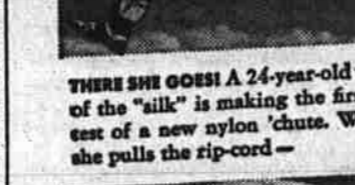

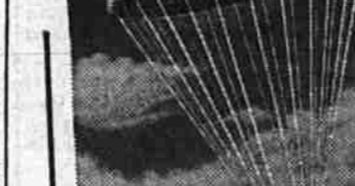

Thursday and Friday are rush days, and the latecomer is apt to discover that all appointment hours have been filled. Likewise, late afternoon hours are the only times when most business girls can get away from their jobs, so housewives, who are their own bosses, should arrange homework around a morning visit to the beauty shop.

Observing these little rules will be a big help not only to the operator but to the patron who will find that she is disappointed fewer times and is happier realizing that she is sacrificing in the other little instances for her country, busily at war.

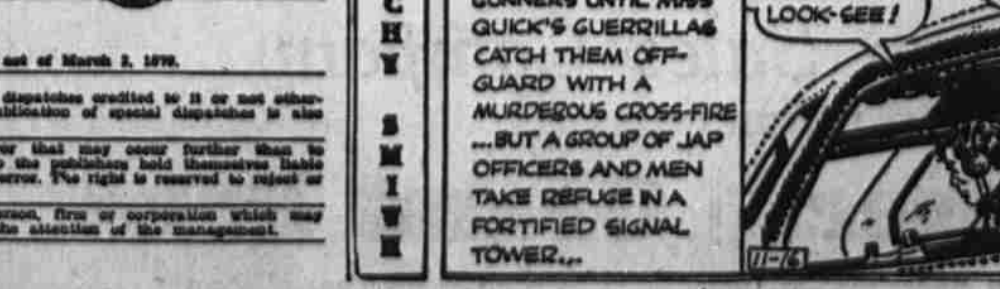



### Stalingrad Holds, Reds Gain Ground In Another Area

MOSCOW, Nov. 16. (AP)—With a frigid, wintry wind sweeping across the steppes, the Red army again beat off German attacks within besieged Stalingrad, advancing slightly in the Caucasus and, in a surprise move far to the north, snatched a "place of great tactical importance" from the Germans on the Volkhov front between Lake Ilmen and Leningrad, the Russians announced today.

The Russian troops broke into the German-occupied community in an unnamed sector of the Volkhov front, forcing the Germans to withdraw, and then held it against all counter-attacks, the Soviet midday communique said.

The action seemed to indicate that the Red army planned to take advantage of the German high command's preoccupation with the new front in North Africa with winter jobs at the long German line in Russia.

### Casualties Are Put At 48,956

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16. (AP)—Announced casualties of the armed forces now total 48,956.

In a recapitulation today, the office of war information said the total included killed, wounded, missing and prisoners of the army, navy, marine corps, coast guard and Philippine Scouts since the outbreak of war, but not casualties in the African campaign.

Most of the army's casualties are classified as missing. A majority of these were in the Philippines and in Java and are presumed to be prisoners of war, although information is lacking due to the absence of prisoner lists from Japan.

As of Nov. 12, army casualties totaled 32,429, divided as follows: Killed, 1,069; wounded, 1,531; prisoners, 161; missing, 29,668. Of the missing 17,000 were American troops in the Philippines and 11,000 others were Philippine Scouts. Fort Worth troops were reported missing in Java. Of the 1,531 wounded, 652 have returned to duty.

Marine Corps: dead, 784; wounded, 703; missing, 1,900.

Announced navy casualties between Dec. 7 and Oct. 31: dead 3,854; wounded, 1,190; missing, 7,972. Coast Guard: dead, 37; wounded, 47.

Some of the missing in the navy's lists are presumed to be prisoners.

### Lease-Lend Aid Growing

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16. (AP)—Instead of sharply declining, as forecast by the axis, lend-lease aid to America's allies has risen greatly since our entry into the war and is likely to show a "growing increase" in 1943.

President Roosevelt, announcing a new monthly record of more than \$915,000,000 worth of lend-lease goods and services furnished beneficiaries in October, said the figures "show how wrong the axis was in assuming that our aid to our allies would sharply decline once we had been brought into the war."

"We have never intended and do not intend to diminish our lend-lease aid in the slightest," he asserted.

### Galveston Man Heads Jewish Organization

DALLAS, Nov. 16. (AP)—The 1942-43 president of B'nai B'rith is Sam Perl of Brownsville, who was elected at the organization's one-day state conference here yesterday.

Other officers for the new year are Morris I. Jaffe, Dallas, re-elected vice-president; D. Lipsitz, Corpus Christi, secretary; and Julius Gensberg, Wharton, treasurer.

The 100 delegates from 30 Texas cities heard Rabbi Newton J. Friedmann of Austin declare that Jews must sacrifice to win the war lest they again become slaves.

BOSTON, Nov. 16. (AP)—In one of the greatest tolls taken by a Boston fire since the turn of the century, six firemen lay dead and two score others were under hospital care today after being pulled from the debris of old armory hall in Maverick square, east Boston.

Fire Chief Samuel J. Pope said the fire started in grease on the kitchen stove of a restaurant. He estimated damage to the four-story structure at \$45,000. In addition, a \$30,000 aerial ladder truck was crushed when a wall of the building collapsed.

Firemen said that not since the so-called Merrimac street fire of 1896, when six lives were lost, had so many persons perished in a fire in this city.

Forty priests joined the firemen in the rescue work. One priest, wading in knee deep water in a section of the basement, gave conditional absolution to the trapped men. Another priest, climbing a ladder to the top of the masonry pile, administered last rites as the dead were carried away.

### McGee Urges Tires Be Surrendered

FORT WORTH, Nov. 16. (AP)—Texas OPA Director Mark George issued an urgent appeal today to all Texas motorists to turn in their extra passenger-type tires as quickly as possible this week to the nearest Railway Express office.

"Everyone should bear in mind that it will be illegal after November 22 to possess more than five passenger-type tires for each passenger car owned," the OPA official pointed out.

"The government will pay for these tires so this collection of excess tires does not mean giving them away."


