Out of five lumber yards in Aspermont there is one that does not believe in advertising, says there is "nothing in it." Well, now this is the first time we have ever heard of a business man making a remark like this. We do not believe it is a personal grudge against the paper, but only a lack of good judgment. No fair minded business man would make a statement like this. We would thank our readers to patronize those who advertise in the home paper.—Aspermont Star.

That is where most of the trouble lies. The buying public do not pay enough attention as to what merchants advertise and what ones do not. Some merchants tell their customers that they "cut out this expense of advertising and give the customer the advantage of the saving." Either they do a mighty small business, or they put their customer down as a fool. The average country merchant who has one or two clerks besides himself, seldom spends more than \$5 a month on advertising. Estimate how much he sells in a month and see what proportion of that \$5 you get the advantage of in a dollar purchase when he cuts out this great expense? Another thing the buying public does not seem to understand is that the non-advertiser, can and does charge more

than the advertiser, especially if he gives prices in his ads. A merchant never quotes prices unless he knows he is underselling his competitors. The non-advertiser depends on personal friendship, accommodations, and chance: The advertiser depends more on his prices and the higher quality of his goods to make a sale to the customer the ad has brought him. Therefore the buying public should watch the local newspaper and see who are advertising and then buy from them and you will do better than if you trade with the man who has never asked you for your trade.

The Lynn County News has put on a Woman's Corner to that valuable paper, and we predict that if it is well managed that it will be of great help to the women of that territory as well as add many new subscribers to the News. Keep it going and make it better as fast as you can.—Crosbyton Review.
